

HORNBROOK Clawson Services Held

Hornbrook-Military funeral services for Joseph Edwin (EB) Clawson were held by Ross Nielson post of the American Legion Thursday afternoon at the graveside in the Henley-Hornbrook cemetery. Burial was in the family plot.

Mr. Clawson died at his home in Hornbrook Monday, after a long illness. He had been released from the hospital about two weeks ago. An autopsy showed death was due to a heart condition. Mr. Clawson was born in the old town of Henley on May 22, 1887, one of eight children born to Joseph F. and Mary Deal Clawson.

He was a telegrapher with the old Postal Telegraph Cable company and later the Western Union for 42 years, with his headquarters in Seattle, Wash. At his retirement in 1952, he returned to Hornbrook to live. He served with the Army during World War I. Mr. Clawson never married. His survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Ora (Peggy) Souza of Hornbrook, Mrs. Hetty Heans of Berkeley, Calif., and a brother, Henley C. Clawson of Hornbrook.

At a special election held here on Tuesday, Nov. 17, voters registered almost unanimous approval of a fire protection district to be formed in this community. Of a total of 85 votes cast, 80 favored establishment of the district, with only two opposed and three apparently abstaining. Official returns on the proposal and on election of five fire protection district commissioners gave Frank Cardoza 79 votes, Ralph Bennett, George McCann and Tom Watt each 77 votes, and Frank Ward 76.

A Court of Honor for Boy Scout troop No. 38 and Cub Scout Pack No. 38 was held Friday evening, Nov. 13, at the multipurpose room of the school house. W. E. Tallis of Hill, as speaker of the evening, reviewed the history of Troop No. 38, recalling that 1959 marked the 25th anniversary of scouting in Hornbrook. Tollis, assisted by Scoutmaster Ron Rhodes, presented the awards for Troop 38 to Mike Turnbow, a first class badge, a senior patrol leader badge, a den chief card and his second year pin; to George Chadwick, a scribe badge and a second year pin; to Darrell Jones, Steven Farmer, Guy Sanders, Douglas Bennett, and Randy Peters, second class badges and one-year pins.

Receiving tenderfoot badges were Danny Metzen, Bruce Goodman, Ernie Burcell, Tommy Watt, Bobby Hutchins, and Danny Thompson.

Cub Scoutmaster Frank Cardoza, assisted by the four den mothers, Mrs. Marion Grieb, Mrs. George Smith, Mrs. "Ike" Dooley, and Mrs. Frank Cardoza, made the awards to the Cub Scouts. Bob Cat badges were presented to Arthur Freitas, Gene Farmer, Johnny Aseltine, and Danny Yeager. Mike Dooley was awarded a wolf and denner badge. Rusty Smith received a wolf and assistant denner badge, and the same awards went to Johnny Burcell.

Dale Farmer received a wolf, a bear and a denner badge. A denner badge also went to Danny Thompson and an assistant denner badge to Bobby Hutchins. About 90 persons attended the Court of Honor, which was preceded by a potluck dinner.

At a meeting of the Parents club Nov. 12 a plaque of appreciation was awarded to the

club from the Cancer society for its cooperation in showing the Cancer film. The presentation was made by Mrs. Bertha Bradley, representing the Cancer society.

In other business, the club began working on plans for the school's community Christmas program, tentatively scheduled for Dec. 17. Surveys Start for Transmission Lines

Washington - (UPI) - Surveys have begun which ultimately will provide transmission lines to carry electrical power from Oregon to Nevada, Sen. Alan Bible said today.

The survey will lead to construction of a \$2,500,000 Bonneville Power administration line from Redmond to Burns, Ore. The 120-mile line will deliver power to Harney electric Cooperative which in turn will spend \$15,900,000 for service lines supplying power to northern Humboldt county in Nevada, Bible said.

Bible said BPA had held up construction of the transmission line following release of Rural Electrification administration loans to the Oregon Co-op. He was assured that all requirements had now been met and the loan funds had been released.

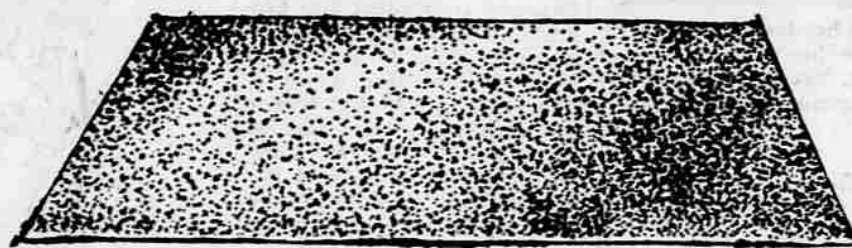
Bible hailed the start of the eight million dollar project as the first delivery of Bonneville power to Nevada. He said mines and ranchers should be getting the electricity by December of 1961.

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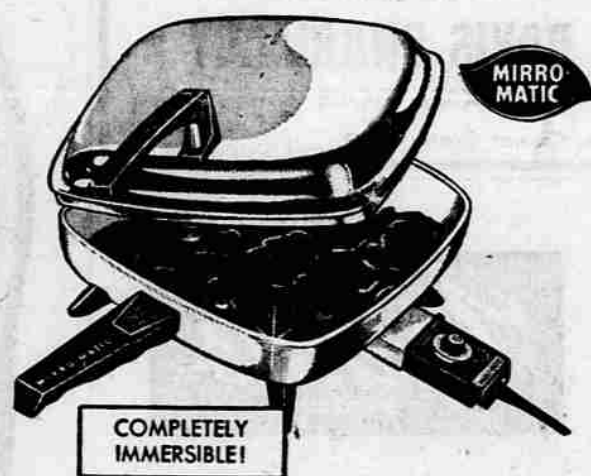
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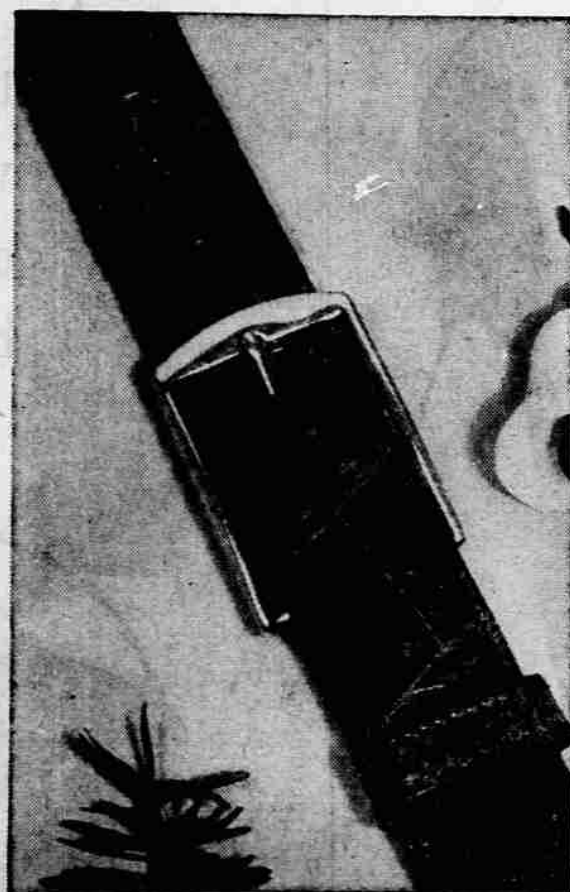
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
