Brussels Relish

Here is a brand new relish just invented for the holiday season and in tribute to our big crop of distinctively flavored Brussels sprouts. Recipe makes about 3 cups relish for passing with fresh or cured pork or with poultry.

1 10-ounce package frozen Brussels sprouts.
1/2 cup chopped green onions
1 small orange, finely chopped
1 teaspoon celery salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup dairy sour cream

Thaw and finely chop the Brussels sprouts; combine with all other ingredients, mixing well. Chill. Anticipate praise and requests for recipe.

Mashed Yams

Whether you choose the dry-fleshed sweet potatoes or the moist-fleshed yams, there's nothing sweeter eating. Boil, bake, roast, glaze, candy, mash or fry "sweets". You can also put them in patties, pies, puddings, rolls and biscuits.

One of the most complete foods known, sweet potatoes (yams) are high in energy, high in vitamins and have good quantities of minerals. They should be baked... or cooked in their jacket if possible, conserving the nutrients and making the vegetable easier to peel.

Cook and mash sweets or yams as usual using plenty of butter; then season to taste in any one of these interesting ways:

Spiced Sweets. Add juice of pickled peaches or apples to mashed sweet potatoes.

Fruited Sweets. Fold drained crushed pineapple or orange juice and grated rind into the mashed potatoes. A few finely chopped cooked prunes will add flavor, texture.

Fluffy Sweets. Fold a little whipped cream into the mashed potatoes and season with salt and a bit of nutmeg or cinnamon. Or fold miniature marshmallows into very hot mashed sweets and shove under broiler for a minute or two before sending to table.

Pot Roast With Root Vegetables

Beef pot roasts are flavorful roasts of less-tender cuts of beef cooked in moist heat. Vegetables usually are added during last 45 minutes of cooking. Four fine pot roast cuts are arm or round bone (chuck), blade bone (chuck), boned rump, or choose a boneless sirloin tip pot roast.

Brown roast on all sides in a little fat taking 15 minutes or so for this and being careful not to scorch. Slip a low rack under meat for long cooking period. Add 1 cup water, 1/2 cup sliced onion, a few peppercorns and 1 bay leaf; slow-cook 3 to 3 1/2 hours.

About 45 minutes before roast is done, add pared or scraped carrots, peeled onions,

stalks of celery cut into 2 inch lengths, pared medium-size potatoes and other mild flavored roots in whole or good-size pieces to retain their identity at serving time. You may be surprised at those who ask for the turnips, rutabagas, kohlrabi or parsnips.

How to Get the Most Out of Vegetable Dollar

With market bins filled to overflowing with Autumn harvest of fresh vegetables, we review ways to buy, store and cook them in order to make the most of their flavors and health values — get the most for your money.

1. Buy only fresh, really fresh vegetables and that is easy here so near growing areas where they are rushed from field to market often within hours of harvesting.

2. As soon as vegetable is in the kitchen remove any withered leaves, discoloration.

3. Store onions, potatoes, garlic, winter squash and other less perishable vegetables in a container where cool air can circulate around them. Refrigeration is not necessary. Do not wash before storing.

4. Wash other fresh vegetables as soon as they come from the market. Never soak vegetables. Rinse head vegetables under running water but keep intact. Do not cut open and do not loosen leaves before storing. Remove excess moisture after washing. Store immediately in crisper pan of refrigerator or wrap before placing in refrigerator.

5. Cook vegetables correctly or serve them raw. Keep them bright, nutritious and delicious; a) Cook vegetables in the least possible amount of water; b) Cook in the shortest possible time; c) Cook in their skins whenever possible or spare very thin; d) Serve vegetables promptly.

Best Buys
Besides galaxy of seasonal fresh vegetables at reasonable cost, there are good buys in most cuts of pork, many cuts of beef and lamb. Enliven menus with any of the plentiful, reasonably priced, coast-caught fish that are so well displayed in local markets.

Poultry prices continue to encourage chicken dinners. Decide now on that Thanksgiving turkey or will it be a rack of pork?
Fruit stands offer apples with Delicious, Newtown Pippins and Home Beauties most abundant. There's a big avocado crop, many varieties of grapes, plenty of oranges and grapefruit. Winter pears and seasonal persimmons and pomegranates are here for surprising and pleasing the family.

Home Replaces Church as Main Market for Organs, Firm Says

New York —(UPI)—The home has replaced the church as the dominant market for organs, according to Stanley M. Sorensen, president of Hammond Organ Co.

He made that statement as he estimated earnings for his company would set a new record high for the fiscal year ending next March 31.

Hammond's previous record year was the one ending March 31, 1957, when earnings totaled \$4,888,000 or 13.26 a share. They dipped to \$3.06 a share the following year and to \$2.85 a share for the 1958-59 year.

For the six months ending Sept. 30, 1959, the company earned \$1.68 a share, a gain of 73 per cent over the 97 cents reported in the corresponding period of the previous year. October factory shipments set a new monthly record in the company's 24-year history.

"We believe as firmly as ever that barring unforeseen circumstances, the 1959-60 fiscal year will set an earning record," Sorensen said.

"We expect, however, that the 73 per cent increase achieved in the first six months will not be maintained in the last half. In 1958-59 our first half was below normal and our last half strong. The measurements for the remainder of this year will be against this strong prior period."

Sorensen believes that Hammond Organ's growth has been strengthened in the past by an increase in leisure time.

"We believe the trend to expand, that there will be future help expand the number of organs for use in the home," he says.

"We are optimistic about the future of organ sales because we believe that the economy will continue to expand, that there will be future increases in leisure time, and that the number of households will continue to increase."

Sorensen reports that his company's organ dealers not only have been enjoying excellent retail sales, but they also have been building inventories to support a still higher sales level.

Hammond has put two new models into production this year — its extra voice organ, and a self-contained home model. It still is too early to measure the public's reception of these, he says, noting that neither is included in the first half year's earnings rise.

Current operations are near capacity levels.

"Production increases," says Sorensen, "are being maintained despite difficulties imposed on us by the steel strike. We are doing everything possible to hold to our accelerated schedule and will continue to do so."

More People Playing
The company finds more and more people learning to play the organ.

"Twenty-five years ago," Sorensen recalls, organ sales were mostly to churches. "Today, the home market predominates."

Hammond's exports account for about 5 per cent of its billings. The company has sold its organs in more than 60 foreign nations.

Since World War II, Hammond expanded from two plants to five plants, the fifth added in 1956. This expansion raised floor space to 565,000 square feet or 214 per cent. No expansion is planned for 1960.
