Chinese Trying To Block Conference

London - (UPI) - Chinese Communist leader Mao Tse-tung is trying to sabotage an East-West summit conference for the second time, diplomatic dispatches reported today.

Mao succeeded in blocking a summit conference in August, 1958, after an emergency meeting in Peking between Premier Nikita Khrushchev and now is slowing down Russian pressure for an early summit meeting.

Diplomatic sources said there has been an almost total absence of pressure from Moscow for a top-level meeting and that Khrushchev himself has been notably silent on the conference he long has demanded.
