

What Is The Law?

YOUR PERSONAL RIGHTS WILL BE PROTECTED

More than 20 years ago a judge in Boston granted an injunction, at the request of Mrs. Freedman, ordering Mrs. Feldman to stop making "any rude or improper faces, grimaces, or jeering or scoffing" at Mrs. Freedman. This judge was using the remedy of the "injunction" to protect Mrs. Freedman's "right of privacy."

News stories frequently relate rather unusual applications of the law. A great many of these involve the protection of personal rights, or the "personality", and are not contained in official reports because they never get to a state supreme court or other court of record.

Just a few years ago a Chicago court enjoined a city sewer employee from "snapping his fingers under his wife's nose."

New Jersey Case

In the history-making New Jersey case a court granted an injunction, at the request of a young lady, enjoining her jilted boyfriend from killing himself on the young lady's doorstep. The jilted boyfriend had threatened to do just this if the young lady refused to see him again. In granting this injunction the judge advised the boy "to seek affection elsewhere."

A Chicago court ordered a husband not to commit suicide. The husband had threatened to throw himself under a train unless his wife would give him a divorce.

It is interesting to note that a court enforces such orders by punishing a person who violates them. It would seem to be difficult to punish a person who has violated a court order not to kill himself.

A very unusual set of facts came from Chicago several years ago. A wife had, some time prior to present difficulties, "creased her husband's skull and broken his arm."

Decides to Kill Him

She later informed him that she had decided to have him killed because she felt that wives who kill their husbands get pretty lenient treatment from courts. She attempted to hire some men to kill him. These men visited the husband and told him that she had asked them to work for her in this capacity. They assured the husband, however, that they would not comply with her wishes until she advanced them some money. At that time she had paid him nothing.

The husband went to court and sought to have his wife enjoined from drawing money from their joint bank account. He said he would feel safe as long as she could not get money. The judge granted the injunction and observed that if the wife was to carry out her plans she would have to use the milk money.

Cases of this type get a considerable amount of attention because of the human interest involved. Fortunately, however, they do not come along very often.

Springfield Man Mistaken for Deer

Springfield—UPI—Neil Castleberry, 34, Springfield, was in Sacred Heart hospital here Saturday with a bullet wound in his skull as a result of a hunting accident.

Castleberry's son, Neal Allen, 13, suffered an injured shoulder when a piece of a tin hat Castleberry was wearing, chipped and struck him.

Police said a 270 caliber bullet fired from a distance of 475 feet creased Castleberry's right temple and apparently struck the hat and chipped it. The bullet was fired by William Edward Gates, 34, also Springfield.

Gates told officers he thought the white hat was a deer's tail and fired.

The accident occurred in the Mohawk valley about eight miles northeast of here.

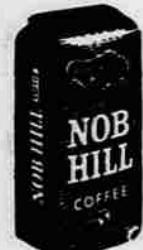
