

Four Bowls Consider Georgia; Coach Butts Calls Meeting

Georgia's "Cinderella" football team is being courted by no less than four bowl selection committees.

Promoters of the Orange Gator, Blue Bonnet and Liberty bowls are bidding for the Bulldog, who bounced back from a dismal 4-6 record last season to win the Southeastern conference title this year.

Coach Wally Butts scheduled a squad meeting for today, presumably to discuss all four bowl invitations.

Doctors' Report On Pro Gridder Not Encouraging

San Francisco (UPI)—Quarterback Y. A. Tittle of the San Francisco Forty Niners was scheduled to arrive here from Baltimore today for further treatment on his injured leg.

Liam O'Grady will handle further treatment here. The loss of Tittle means that second string quarterback John Brodie will have to carry the load against Cleveland this week end, and probably against Baltimore and Green Bay on the following Sundays.

Their report was not encouraging. "Y.A. could not stand up when he tried to," Dr. Meyer said. "It is my opinion he won't be able to play for at least two weeks, and it is doubtful if he will be able to play at all any more this season."

Baltimore and San Francisco currently are tied for the Western division lead in the National Football league race.

Promoter Loses Money

Santa Monica, Calif. (UPI)—Fledgling boxing promoter, Ron Waller, former halfback for the Los Angeles Rams, is missing a sizable chunk from his bankroll today.

Butts underestimated his team. True, there were few sophomores. But the veterans reached new heights and when Georgia upset beefy Auburn, 14-13, 10 days ago it gave the Bulldogs an 8-1 record and their first SEC crown since 1948.

Waller's first promotion, Mexico's Mauro Vazquez vs. Jimmy Hornsby, was a fistic but not a fiscal success Monday night at Civic Auditorium.

After all, Georgia was 10th last year with an over-all 4-6 record and Butts himself had said that there were no great sophomores on hand to change that picture.

Hornsby lost a unanimous decision, and Waller lost plenty of money by guaranteeing his two main events \$8,750 while grossing only \$8,895 on the 2,100 crowd. A profit of \$145 won't be enough to pay off the preliminary boys, the landlord and Uncle Sam.

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The bout was a farewell show commemorating the Hollywood, Calif., Legion Stadium, which recently closed after nearly 40 years of boxing.

It marks the fourth fight in a comeback for Carter, who now is a sheet metal worker and weighed 160 pounds last January. Jimmy, now pushing 36, so far has scored a decision and knockout over Kildo Nunez and flattened Irish Jimmy Smith since he took up boxing again last August.

San Francisco (UPI)—Tackle Al Bansaavage of USC and end Gael Barsotti of California were named today as the Big Five's "co-linemen-of-the-week."
