

Medford Gridders Seek To Make 3rd Occasion A Charm

Medford's Black Tornado, deep in talent and manpower, and ranked No. 1 in Oregon, will attempt to make the third time a charm this Friday night when it encounters Jefferson at Multnomah stadium in Portland in finals for the state's Class A-1 high school football crown.

Twice in the past three seasons Medford fought in the A-1 finals but came out second best. The Tornado fell to Marshfield 40 to 19 in 1956 and to Jefferson 21 to 7 in 1958.

The Black Tornado, a state playoff competitor for six successive years, is considered best equipped this fall to wrest its first grid mantle since 1944.

Medford's depth of personnel is possibly its best in history and it has the most versatile attack of Tornado teams in many years.

Today's activity on the practice field marked the last heavy workout for the Medfordites before they meet the defending title Democrats in an effort to even the score for last season's finale loss. School was to be dismissed early this afternoon for the Thanksgiving holiday weekend. And, the Tornado, coach Fred Spiegelberg and his staff of mentors, hoped to make the most of the opportunity and the extra daylight time. They were to make every minute count.

Much of Tornado concentration this week is aimed at stopping the wing T offense of the Portland team. And, Spiegelberg was quick to admit that "it's going to be a job." The Demo offense is different from any attack that Medford has met before this fall—the first time that the Tornado will face the wing T in its "true sense."

Not even last year's experience against the Democrats will serve to help since Jeff has switched from the multiple offense it employed in 1958.

And, Jefferson has the personnel to make its Wing T go. There's the evidence in 11 straight victories so far in 1959. Speed is a feature of the backfield with Mel Renfro state low hurdles champ and transfer Mike Wyborney last year's sprint titlist of southwestern Washington.

Mike Barnes is a speedster, too, as is another Mike (Hoey). Good Backfield Weight Mel and the three Mike's also give plenty of heft to the backfield. Renfro, Hoey and Barnes are 180 pounders and Wyborney is 175. They also have a lightweight in Ron Hergert, 145, who takes over at quarterback when Renfro shifts to left half. Renfro is the all-time high scorer of the Portland Inter-scholastic league.

Roll out passes and naked reverses are part of the attack which maintains the best features of T and single wing offense. Jeff operates with a balanced line with a flanker, or "peel off" man, on every play.

Spiegelberg has told a Portland publication that he feels the Tornado will cross the Jeff goal line Friday but that he thinks the Demos will cross Medford's too. He foresaw an even battle but he was confident the Tornado can move the ball.

The Medford mentor said that his charges will work out at 10:30 a.m. tomorrow and that he felt the players will work up a "pretty good appetite" for Thanksgiving dinner. The squad will leave by bus for Portland at 8 a.m. on Friday. A workout of about 80 minutes was held yesterday.

The Medford squad was produced in good shape physically. Line man Reggie Breeze and back George Clearwater were with the crew yesterday after missing Monday drill. Breeze had the flu over the week end and Clearwater had a cold.



Burford of Stanford Lone West Coast Player on All-American Picked by Coaches Association

Chicago —UPI—The South, with four players and the East, with three, dominate the 1959 All-American football team selected today by the American Football Coaches Association.

Chosen as the finest 11 collegiate players in the land by the 550 coaches who are members of the association were:

Ends—Chris Burford, Stanford and Bill Carpenter, Army.

Tackles—Dan Lamphear, Wisconsin and Don Floyd, Texas Christian.

Guards—Roger Davis, Syracuse and Zeke Smith, Auburn.

Center—Max Baughan, Georgia Tech.

Quarterback—Richie Lucas, Penn State.

Halfbacks—Ron Burton, Northwestern and Billy Cannon, Louisiana State.

Fullback—Charles Flowers, Mississippi.

All are seniors. Cannon, who was the only junior on the coaches' All-American team last season, is the only repeater.

Baughan, Smith, Cannon and Flowers gave the South the strongest representation geographically with the East following with Davis, Lucas and Carpenter, the "lonely end."

The Midwest, which usually dominates most All-American teams, placed only two men—Lamphear and Burford. The Southwest and Far West each won one berth—Floyd and Burford, respectively.

Davis is the giant of the team standing 6-3 and weighing 228. The line averages 215 pounds; Burford at 198 being the only lineman below the 200-pound mark. The backfield averages 194 pounds with Cannon at 208 the heaviest and also the tallest at six, one.

This 1959 All-American team is the 70th annual selection in the tradition originated by Walter Camp at Yale in 1889 and popularized for more than a half century in Collier's Magazine. Camp made the selections until his death in 1925, when he was succeeded by Grandland Rice.

In 1948, the coaches association undertook the responsibility of selecting the All-American team on the basis of a new and impartial principle—rating the leading All-American candidates week by week by slow-motion game movies. UPI Exclusive Distributor

When Collier's discontinued publication in 1956, sponsorship of the coaches' All-American was assumed as a public service by General Mills. United Press International distributes the coaches' All-American team exclusively.

The coaches' association set up a 10-man board, headed by association president Wallace Butts, University of Georgia coach, to make the final selections. It studied the ballots of the 550 coaches at more than 150 colleges. Their votes reflected on-the-field observations, comprehensive scouting reports and expert analysis of game movies.

Serving on the final selection board with Butts were Jack Curtice, Stanford; Leonard Casanova, Oregon; Jess Neely, Rice; William Murray,

Duke; Boddy Dodd, Georgia Tech; Hugh Daugherty, Michigan State; Jordan Oliver, Yale; Bud Wilkinson, Oklahoma and Rip Engle, Penn State.

This year, for the first time, the coaches association is producing a half hour film, adaptable for television, of its

1959, All-American team. It runs 26½ minutes on 16 mm sound and will feature the All-Americans in action, plus campus and practice field sequences with leading coaches among those doing the commentary. Butts said the film has been sold to sponsoring groups in 68 cities.

Jack Kemp To Back Up John Brodie

Cleveland, Ohio —UPI—Quarterback Jack Kemp, back in the National Football league after a tour in Canada, will backstop John Brodie in the San Francisco Forty Niners' contest against the Browns here Sunday.

The signing of Kemp, who played with Calgary this season, was announced Tuesday by Dan McGuire, public relations director for the West Coast club.

Kemp was signed following an injury to Y. A. Tittle, the Forty Niners' regular signal-caller. Tittle was taken to Mary's Help hospital after returning to San Francisco Tuesday. He suffered a knee injury in the Forty Niners' 45-14 loss to Baltimore last Sunday.

Kemp, a 1957 graduate of Occidental, has been traveling with the Forty Niners for two weeks. He saw action with the New York Giants in 1958 before going to Calgary.

Defensive halfback Bill Atkins was placed on waivers to make room for Kemp.

At San Francisco Tuesday, Tittle said he hoped to be ready for the return match with Baltimore a week from Sunday at Kezar stadium. Despite the pessimistic prediction of his doctors, the Forty Niner quarterback said his right knee was "not real seriously hurt."

Goteborg, Sweden —UPI—Heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson said today, "Jack Dempsey can testify that I have the right to pick the site and date for my return fight with Floyd Patterson."

Ingemar, who arrived here in his old home town Tuesday night from his new home in Geneva, Switzerland, added, "and I want the fight in New York next June or July."

The champion explained: "When the latest contracts for the return match were signed here in Goteborg, Dempsey was my witness. And Jack said in a recent letter to Edvin Ahlqvist he is ready to testify under oath that I have the right to pick the site and date."

Ahlqvist of Goteborg is Ingemar's advisor.

Johansson stressed that Vincent J. Velella of New York, new head of Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc., never had any authority to select the city or the time.

Velella announced recently that the fight would be held at the Miami (Fla.), Orange Bowl in early March.

But what if ex-champion Patterson refuses to try to recapture the title in New York, because the license of Manager Gus D'Amato has been revoked in that state?

"If Patterson doesn't want to fight in New York," smiled Ingemar, "I'm sure Archie Moore will oblige."
