Four Hospitalized After Accident In Ashland Area

Four persons were reported in good condition at Ashland General hospital this morning following a two vehicle collision on Highway 99 south of Ashland about 10:48 p.m. Wednesday.

Hospitalized were Adelbert Bradford Andrews, 52, of Corvallis, operator of a southbound automobile; Eugene Bernard Corey, 34, Reddy, Calif., driver of the panel truck which was northbound, and passengers in the truck, Mrs. Louella May Corey, 32, and Michael Corey, 6.

Mrs. Lorene Andrews, 46, passenger in the Andrews vehicle, and 14-week-old Patrick Corey, who was riding in the panel truck, were not hospitalized, police reported. Mrs. Andrews suffered minor cuts, it was reported.

Sweerves on Highway
According to state police, the Corey car swerved across the centerline of the highway to miss some deer standing on the roadway and pulled directly into the path of the Andrews vehicle. Both vehicles were heavily damaged.

The accident was the second reported to state police in less than 24 hours in which deer were involved.

The first occurred Wednesday morning on Highway 66 20 1/2 miles east of Ashland when a vehicle operated by Alexander Alvarez, 20, of 637 Cedar st., Central Point, went out of control after he swerved to miss several deer on the roadway. According to police, the car spun around twice before hitting the north bank and rolling over several times.

Alvarez was informed by police that a complaint for violation of the basic rule would be filed against him in district court.

Portland Consumer Prices Increase

Portland - (UP) - Consumer prices in Portland edged upward by 0.2 per cent over the July-October quarter, according to Charles A. Roumasset, Acting Western Regional Director of the U. S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The Bureau's Consumer Price Index for Portland was 1 1/2 per cent higher than in October, 1958, he said, a new all-time high.

Higher prices for gasoline and new cars, partly offset by lower prices for movies and food were the principal factors in the price movement over the quarter, Roumasset said.

The index for the period was 126.3. The 1947-1949 period represents 100.

'Assassination' Attempt Is Still a Mystery in France

Paris - (UP) - At midnight last Oct. 15, former French Cabinet Minister Francois Mitterrand crouched in a bed of geraniums in a Paris public garden while a few steps away his car - from which he had just leaped - was sprayed with submachinegun slugs.

World headlines reported the "attempted assassination" and linked it to the terror and hate spawned from loyalists torn for five years by the bitter warfare in Algeria.

The incident coincided with a massive 441-23 vote in the French National Assembly in favor of President Charles de Gaulle's plan to bring peace to Algeria.

It coincided with a fresh campaign against "sell-out" by that active and vocal minority of Frenchmen who want at all costs for Algeria to become fully integrated with France.

And it coincided with a sensational warning by Gaullist Deputy Lucien Neuwirth that "commandos of killers already have crossed the Spanish border. The public personalities to be rubbed out are on a list."

France was gripped with fear of another wave of civil unrest like that which brought down the government in the feverish days following the Algiers revolt of May 13, 1958.

Police assigned bodyguards to Mitterrand, a handsome, athletic man of 43 who had been wounded in action in World War II and had escaped from a German prison camp.

Mitterrand was minister of the Interior when the Algerian war broke out. At that time he said, "The only negotiation (with the Moslem rebels) is war."

He became a leader of the opposition to de Gaulle, an advocate of immediate negotiations with the rebels. He was a long-standing enemy of French right-wing extremists.

Threatening letters were a staple of his morning mail. For years he had refused police protection. But after the shooting-affray of Oct. 15, he accepted a police bodyguard.

Two plainclothesmen escorted his 13-year-old son to and from school.

Then, six days later, a former right-wing deputy named Robert Pesquet, 42, came forward with a sensational story. He said it was he who had driven the gunmen's car, that his handyman Abel Dahuron, 35, had peppered Mitterrand's car with bullets - and that it had all been planned by Mitterrand himself to arouse public opinion against the extreme right.

Pesquet said he had convincing evidence in the form of a pre-dated registered letter that would prove his story.

A court bailiff accompanied Pesquet to the post office to pick up the letter at the general delivery window. Pesquet handed the letter to the bailiff. Opened in front of investigating magistrate Andre Braunschweig, it described the "attack" in detail.

Mitterrand said it was a lie that he had been in on the plot. He admitted that Pesquet had indeed approached him before the shooting - but only to warn him.

He said Pesquet made a date with him the night of the incident at Lipp's Alsatian restaurant on the Boulevard Saint Germain, where sauerkraut is the specialty and French politicians are the star customers.

When Pesquet failed to show up, Mitterrand said, he drove home the usual way, making a slight detour around the public garden when he saw a car following him.

This, he said, explained Pesquet's ability to describe the place and hour of the attack.

French fears of a new wave of civil disorder gave way to public revulsion at what they were being told was a sordid intrigue.

De Gaulle ordered his minister of Justice, Edmond Michelet, to investigate the case. Making a false report to a French magistrate can bring a charge of contempt of court. Pesquet faced such a charge.

And he steadfastly insisted he had never taken part in cooking up a fake assassination attempt.

Small Worlds Around Us

Man Has Made Many Uses of This Weed

The world is just about covered with weeds - cultivated part, at least. And all of them are bothersome, most utterly worthless. Few weeds in the entire plant kingdom develop into plants that closely resemble trees except the witch's weed, the so called Jimson weed, which grows into a plant closely resembling a spreading oak.

This weed has smooth stems that are very branching, and has large, white tubular flowers. The weed is known by many names, depending on the part of the country in which it is found. It grows near abandoned houses, buildings and in vacant fields. Some of the names given to this weed are highly descriptive, such as Jamestown Weed, because it grew profusely near that city, and "White Man's Weed," a name given it by early American Indians, because the first time that the red man ever saw it was near the white settlements.

Devil's Trumpet
Because of the flower, someone thought it looked like the "devil's trumpet." The blossom is all of four inches long, later developing into a large burr-like fruit which suggested to someone else to name the plant a thorn apple. The fruit develops in the crotch of the forking branches. For one peculiar reason the great white blossoms open up late in the afternoon or in the early evening, for that is when the Sphinx moth is flying. It seems to be the insect the Jimson weed needs for cross pollination.

During the early evening, too, the flower has a mild fragrance. Just at dusk the moth flits, as quick as a thought, from blossom to blossom.

The juice of this strange but exceedingly common plant is poisonous, known to the pharmacist as "stramonium," and is used as an analgesic. This juice, as well as the roots, leaves and fruit pods, played an important part in early witchcraft.

Used By Gypsies
This rank, coarse weed, originally a resident of Asia, was introduced into many countries. It is actually a relative of the tomato, eggplant, petunia and potato. Because the Jimson weed possessed medicinal qualities, it was used for centuries by Gypsies in rites similar to those practiced by later day witches.

The juice of the weed has many strange characteristics. One drug, atropine, acts on the human eye, dilating the pupil. Even a casual handling of the plant's leaves, stems or fruit-will leave enough atropine on the fingers to dilate the eyes if the eyes are gently rubbed with the fingers.

This peculiar property of the Jimson plant is said to have been used by ardent maidens, probably as a result of the Gypsy influence, to dilate their eyes, making them bright and sparkling. A drop or two of the juice, containing the atropine, was dropped into the eyes just before the maiden was to meet her boy friend.

Stranger even than the strange Jimson weed itself are the uses man has found for this noxious weed.
