APPLEGATE VALLEY Group Sees Obligation

Applegate Valley — Local homemakers were brought to realize an obligation beyond their community when Mrs. Wilfred Pearson spoke of the world's underprivileged people at a meeting of the Upper Applegate extension unit recently at the home of Mrs. John Byrne.

Mrs. Pearson, chairman of the unit committee on Associated Country Women of the World, quoted statistics and said Americans should stop thinking only of maintaining their own way of life and share their possessions or they wouldn't have any to share.

Americans have 15 times as much consumer goods as persons in other countries, and a life expectancy of 70 years, while that of other nationalities is 40 years. Mrs. Pearson said, adding that 6 per cent of the Americans have 50 per cent of the world's income. Unit members voted to give to UNICEF, United Nations children's fund.

Under the ACWW program, unit members voted on a study of India, and at the December meeting Mrs. Claud Williams will give a 10-minute report on India. In March, further work on that country will be taken up and members will offer daily prayers for world peace.

Two one-hundredths of an inch lower water in the Big Applegate river than was recorded a year ago is reported by Henry Mapston, who has charge of a government river gauge near their home below Copper. The 1.17 foot depth at the present time is contrasted with the 24-foot depth at flood stage in 1955.

A local farmer found his road blocked when he did the morning chore of feeding his cattle, and when a Medford businessman visited his mining claim, expecting to do a little hunting, he found six gunmen had preceded him.

Getting Bicycle Is Exciting Occasion

Getting a bicycle for Christmas is an exciting event to every child. Be careful that there's no let-down after the initial thrill. Be careful that the bike is not too big for the child to ride right away.

For a four to five year old child, a 16-inch wheel diameter should be right. Six to seven year olds can usually handle a 20-inch wheel bike. The 24-inch suits most 8 to 10 year olds; those over 11 generally need the adult size.

If it's a first bike, you may want to get the outrigger wheels which control balance.
