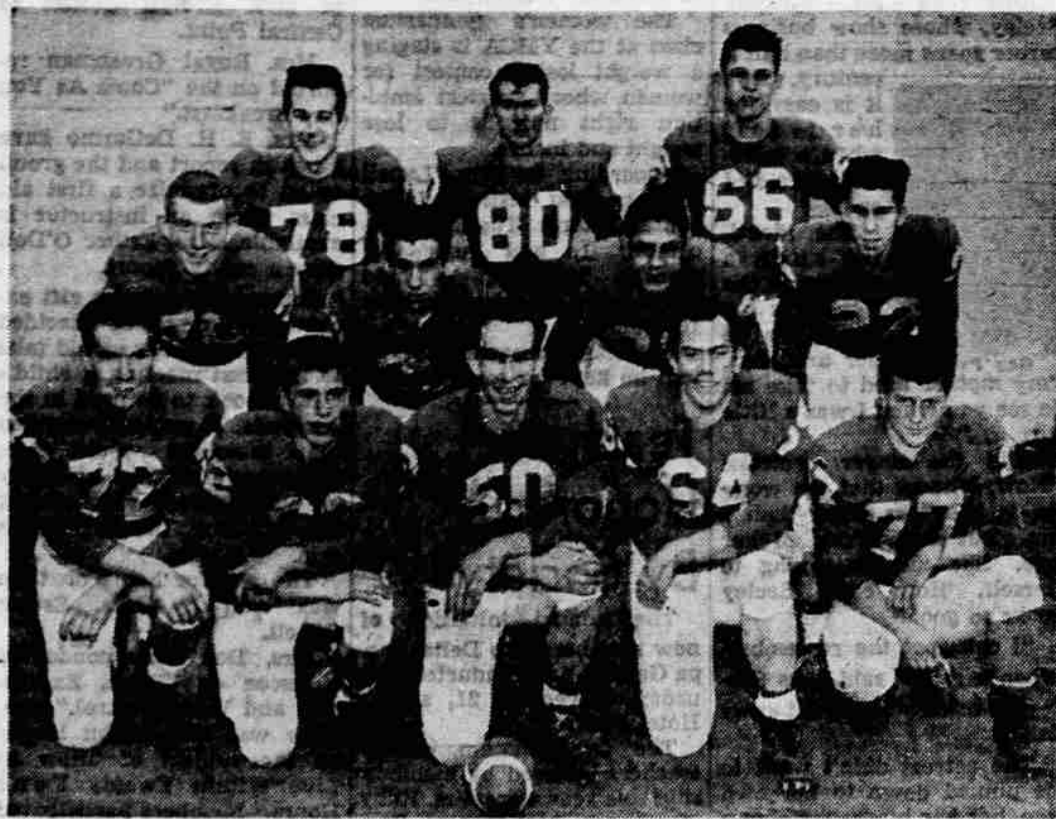


SM Crusaders Take On Yoncalla Here Saturday In B Title Game

Two glittering football teams are their presumptive claimants to Oregon's Class B high school crown. On Saturday night one will earn the right to reign alone or they will share the throne.

St. Mary's of Medford and Yoncalla vie at 8 p.m. tomorrow on the Medford High school field for the state's 1959 small school honors. Victor will pick up the titular hardware. A tie will make co-holders of the trophy.

Medford's parochial Crusader gang has a title claim as conqueror of Merrill, the 1958 banner winner. The Eagles of Yoncalla bid as logical successor as last year's runner-up to Merrill.

But, more important Yoncalla and St. Mary's have earned the right to battle in Saturday's payoff mix. Each fought to its District championship and up through the quarter and semifinals.

A pair of fine T formation teams are expected to produce a score-filled tangle. St. Mary's, as it has done through the season, probably will rely strongly on its running game. Brilliant passing has been an Eagle feature. Each club has speed in its backfield. A trio of 200-pounders will help give Yoncalla a big edge in forward weight. Both elevens are good blocking teams.

Neither team has been beaten in Oregon contention this fall. Yoncalla is 11-0 for 1959 and St. Mary's 9-1 with lone setback at the hands of Yreka, Calif. The Eagles' only loss in 23 games has been the 80 to 7 defeat by Merrill in last season's final game.

Stellar quarterbacks direct the offense for the rival clubs. St. Mary's has Bob Evans, an adept ball handler and faker. He can pass and he can run. For Yoncalla Ron Revelle has gained stature as the outstanding passer in this year's Oregon prep play. He's hit receivers on 108 of 181 aerials.

Dick Evans, Alex Mete, Terry Cooper and Fred Lucas are among the Crusaders running backs while the Eagles have Cliff Emory, Orlan Wiley, Doug Holman and Don Noffsinger to pack the ball. Jim Booth and the foregoing Yoncalla backs are Revelle's targets. Emery and Noffsinger also alternate at end. Bob Evans' receivers include Roger Hout and Andre Knutson at flanks, in addition to the backs.

Guard Don Macpherson was a cause yesterday for Medford team concern. He was in bed ill and missed the SM practice session. The Crusaders need his weight, for, at 185 pounds, he heaviest on the team.

SM Coach Bill McKibbin reported that end Ron Dailey, out of action because of a broken collarbone, will be in uniform as an honorary captain but will not play.

Coach Ron Anderson's Eagles were to arrive here some time today and have let it be known that they are coming here to win. Whiel Yoncalla is in the state finale for the second year, this is St. Mary's first experience in a state football championship game.

Gates open at 7 p.m. at the Medford stadium and all seats are general admission. This will be the first state prep grid championship game on local turf since Mohawk won over Talent for the six-man mantle in 1948.

Cotton Bowl Berth Goes To Longhorns

While some folks nursed holiday indigestion, officials of the Cotton Bowl licked their chops today over the completed pairing for their New Year's Day game - top-ranked Syracuse vs. fourth-ranked Texas.

The Longhorns won the right to represent the South-west conference in the Dallas classic by turning back a fighting Texas A&M team, 20-17, Thursday in one of the greatest thrillers in the 66-year history of this storied series.

Texas, a 10-point favorite, picked up only one first down in the first half and left the field at intermission trailing 10-0. A pair of touchdowns by Mike Dowdle enabled the Longhorns to open a 14-10 lead early in the final quarter but the Aggies went ahead again on quarterback Charley Milstead's second touchdown pass of the game - a five-yard flip to end Jack Estes.

Then, with less than 2½ minutes remaining, quarterback Bobby Lackey climaxed a 75-yard march by sneaking over from the one for the Longhorns' winning touchdown.

Syracuse Sends Scouts
Syracuse, which accepted a bid to the Cotton Bowl almost two weeks ago, had scouts at the Thursday game. However, head coach Darrell Royal of the Longhorns admitted "we haven't scouted Syracuse and frankly I haven't even read much about them."

The Cotton Bowl game should be one of the best of the post-season classics, matched only by a possible meeting between second-ranked Mississippi and third-ranked Louisiana State in the Sugar Bowl. Ole Miss reportedly will accept a berth opposite LSU in New Orleans if it whips arch-rival Mississippi State as expected Saturday.

Pennsylvania and Virginia Military also celebrated Thanksgiving Day by wrapping up conference titles. Penn won the Ivy League crown over Cornell while VMI surprised Virginia Tech, 37-12, in a showdown clash for the Southern conference championship.

Cornell was leading Penn, 13-0 in the third quarter when the Quakers caught fire behind quarterback George Koval, who tossed three touchdowns passes to sink the Big Red and perhaps save Coach Steve Seo's job. Penn finished its season with a 7-1 record - its best in 12 years.

Title Eludes VPI
Quarterback Howard Dyer also tossed three scoring passes and plunged for another touchdown in firing VMI to its runaway victory over Virginia Tech, which was looking for its first conference championship in 38 years.

North Carolina turned in the most explosive exhibition of the holiday by handing the Duke Blue Devils their worst defeat in 30 years, 50-0. Full back Don Knochak sparked the Tar Heels with two touchdowns, including a 93-yard runback of the second half kickoff.

Three touchdowns galloped by Bernie Dailey carried Colgate to a 33-14 upset victory over Brown; Richmond turned two William & Mary bobbies into touchdowns for a 20-12 victory over their ancient rivals; Wichita spoiled Tulsa's bid for a share of the Missouri Valley conference title by upsetting the Hurrittle, 26-21; Washington State rolled to a 32-16 victory over Houston, and Jerry Hill's two touchdowns helped Wyoming blank Denver, 45-0.

Rams Suspend Captain Putnam

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Duane Putnam, co-captain of the Los Angeles Rams and an all-pro guard since 1955, was under indefinite suspension today for breaking training.

Peter Rozelle, general manager of the disappointing Ram team, said Putnam's conduct was "detrimental to the best interests of the Ram football team."

There was no further explanation. The eight-season veteran from College of Pacific was flown here from the Ram training base at Bear Mountain, N. Y.

The disclosure came as the Rams battled to break a five-game losing streak. They play Baltimore Sunday. Regarded as a definite contender for Baltimore's Western division crown before the season started, Los Angeles has won only two of eight games and head coach Sid Gilman is reported under fire as a result.

Maurice Rocket Richard, hockey's greatest scorer, can't seem to shake the injury jinx.

Packers Capitalize On Fumbles To Top Lion Eleven 24-17

Detroit - (UPI) - The Green Bay Packers scored 24 points in the first 22 minutes to defeat the Detroit Lions 24-17 Thursday in the second game in a row where the Lions lost while outgaining opponents.

Detroit rolled up 354 yards to 242 for the Packers and had 21 first downs to only 12 for Green Bay.

But the Packers took advantage of three fumbles for two touchdowns and a field goal, and marched 65 yards in six plays for another to beat the Lions for the second time this season.

Last Sunday, Detroit lost to the Chicago Bears 24-14 while gaining more than double the yardage Chicago could muster.

Lions Take Lead
Detroit got an early lead Thursday with a field goal set up when Bill Butler fumbled the Lion opening kickoff and Dick Le Beau recovered for Detroit on the Packer 19.

Green Bay rolled back with the ensuing kickoff to score, then added another touchdown less than two minutes later after John Dittrich recovered Terry Barr's fumble on the Packer kickoff.

Paul Hornung scored both the first touchdowns and kicked a 39-yard field goal for Green Bay as the first period closed. Bill Forester fell on a Lion bobble to set up the three-pointer.

The final Green Bay touchdown was scored by Jim Taylor with the second period nearly seven minutes old. Henry Jordan recovered a Lion fumble to start that drive.

Stay In Fourth
Detroit got two touchdowns - one on a 27-yard pass from Earl Morrall to Jerry Reichow and the other on a five-yard dash by Hopalong Cassidy - before the half and that ended the day's scoring.

Detroit stayed in fifth in the Western division of the National Football league with a 2-6-1 record and Green Bay stayed in fourth at 5-5.

Detroit and Green Bay are idle Sunday while the San Francisco 49ers meet the Cleveland Browns, the Philadelphia Eagles take on the Pittsburgh Steelers, the Wash-

ington Redskins play the New York Giants, the Chicago Cards meet the Chicago Bears and the Los Angeles Rams play the Baltimore Colts.

Dale Hackbart Big 10 Leader

Hackbart, running for 74 yards and passing for 122 in directing the champion Badgers to victory over Minnesota, amassed a seven-game total of 686 yards, outsting the former leader, Olen Treadway, also a quarterback, had a 637 yard total in six games.

Hackbart's final surge also placed him among the top five runners, along with a pair of Illinois heroes - fullback Bill Brown and halfback Johnny Counts.
