

## Underdog Navy Gets 43-12 Victory

Philadelphia — (UPI) — Bounding Joe Bellino, a stocky junior halfback from Winchester, Mass., rolled up three touchdowns Saturday and led underdog Navy to a 43-12 victory over Army before 100,000 at Philadelphia stadium.

## Humboldt Raider Foe This Week

Ashland-Basketball is here again and preparations are underway at Southern Oregon college for a two-game series against Humboldt State college next Thursday and Friday in the Red Raider gym at 8 p.m.

It will be the first action for either team this year as the 1959-60 season gets underway. Humboldt State downed the Raiders twice last year in Arcata, Calif. On the other hand, the Raiders have never been beaten by the California college on their own hardwood since the new Raider gym has been in use.

Gone from the Raider squad this year are Dave D'Olive and Jim McAbee, two first team men that gained mention on the Oregon Collegiate conference all-star team last year.

Raider coach Ted Schopf has been using two Medford players in his front line with Glen Peterson at 6-5 and filling in for the graduated D'Olive. John Payne has been working the forward spot vacated by the injured Punk Biddington. Payne is also 6-5 and gives the Raiders some height they have not seen in the past three years.

Gordy Carrigan is back at his all-conference guard position and teaming with him in the opening lineup will probably be Dennis Conner, a first year player at SOC.

Don Vannice or Tom Bernert will fill the other forward. Both of these players could see action from time to time when Payne plays the center position.

For the first time in many years Schopf feels he has one of the strongest benches in the conference. He has letterman Dick Smith at forward or center. Jayvee graduates Dick Puhl and Dave Gardner can play forward or guard while Puhl is a left-hander to give the Raiders some variety in that department.

Brad Flannery is the other guard with Puhl on the second unit. Flannery is only 5-9 and a freshman from Bend, but he can shoot the long two-hander and drive very well according to Schopf.

Humboldt faces the job of rebuilding their complete front line. They have two starters from last year returning in guards Billy Caver and Eddie Thomas. Caver shoots the jumper and likes to drive. Thomas, on the other hand, shoots the long set shot.

Following the pair with Humboldt State, the Raiders will travel to California to play two games against Chico State. On December 22 and 23, the Raiders will host Westmont college in Ashland. December 29 and 30 the Raiders will again be playing at home against Seattle Pacific.

**Whips Auburn With 10-0 Score**  
Birmingham, Ala. — (UPI) — Alabama pony back Marlin Dyess scooted 33 yards with a flat pass for a touchdown and sophomore end Tommy Brooker boomed a 27-yard field goal Saturday to whip Auburn 10-0.

The Crimson Tide, a one-touchdown underdog and heavily outweighed in the line, outscraped the Tigers for the first Alabama victory over Auburn since 1953. It was Bama's seventh 1959 victory against only one loss and two ties.

A capacity crowd of almost 44,000 saw Alabama fritter away one break on penalties but return for Brooker's field goal late in the second period, then push Auburn around almost at will in the second half.

Brooker's field goal climaxed a march from the Bama 25 and Dyess' run, in which he outran two defenders and slipped out of the arms of a third, came on a flat pass from Bobby Skelton on the Auburn 39. The Tide had moved from its own 25.

team. Saturday's total of 55 points was the highest ever scored in the game.

It was a great day for Bellino, who had been slowed by injuries in all four games Navy lost this season. He dashed 15 and 16 yards for first-period touchdowns, intercepted a pass to set up Navy's fourth touchdown and personally scored it on a one-yard plunge.

Navy's Joe Tranchini had the show all to himself in the anticipated quarterback duel with Army's Joe Caldwell, keeping the Navy attack rolling with pinpoint passes and twice scoring himself. In addition, Tranchini passed for three two-point conversions.

**Cut Navy Lead**  
Caldwell, though harried no more than in previous games this season, had a miserable afternoon with his passing. After six early misses, he hit lonely end Bill Carpenter for a 29-yard touchdown pass in the second period to give Army a brief hope by cutting Navy's lead to 13-6.

But the Army ace continually overthrew his targets until the issue was settled late in the fourth period. At one time in the third period, halfback Bob Anderson, who ran 12 yards for an Army touchdown in the second period, took over the passing chores from Caldwell, but he had little more success.

Anderson had one toss intercepted to set up a Navy touchdown in that period and Caldwell had one picked off in the fourth to set up a one-yard plunge by Navy's Ronnie Brandquist to complete the scoring.

In the vast crowd banked around the concrete horseshoe stadium were 3,800 members of the Naval Academy brigade, the 2,400 Army Cadets, Speaker Sam Rayburn of the House of Representatives, and seven cabinet members including Secretary of Defense Neil McElroy, Secretary of the Army Wilbur Brucker and Secretary of the Navy William B. Franke.

These weren't great football teams meeting in the 60th service game. Army went in with a 4-3-1 record and Navy was 4-4-1.

But they played with typical service rivalry ferocity and at times, particularly on Navy's two first-period touchdowns, the hitting was terrific. Later, two personal foul penalties against Navy helped Army to its second touchdown.

## Point Margin Said Bad Luck

Cleveland, Ohio — (UPI) — That 10-point margin the odds-makers give the Cleveland Browns in their clash with the San Francisco Forty-Niners Sunday is something the Browns would like to forget about.

The consistency with which fate upsets those odds, and along with them the Browns, is one of the reasons why the Browns are now fighting for survival in the Eastern division of the National Football league.

In each of the three losses inflicted on the Browns this season, they've been favored to grab the marbles. Instead, they were rapped 10-6 by the New York Giants, and by 17-7 and 21-20 margins by the Pittsburgh Steelers.

**Bookies vs. Browns**  
Even more significant is the fact that the Browns were favored by the same 10-point gap to steamroller the Steelers in the game last Sunday.

The bookies are causing the Browns nothing but grief. Coach Paul Brown indicated he will stick, with slight variations, to the same inside-outside running attack, coupled with the pitching of quarterback Milt Plum against the explosive Forty-Niners. With considerable logic, he figures that if the Forty-Niners can stop the whole works they'll be the first to do so this season.

**GILDED CAGES**  
Ithaca, N.Y. — (UPI) — Hens kept in cages averaged 230 eggs a year, compared with 198 for those who did their laying on the floor, according to a study conducted by Prof. Kendall Carpenter, agricultural economist at Cornell University. Carpenter also reported that caged hens needed only 95 pounds of feed, as against 104 pounds for the "floor birds." The death rate was six per cent among the former compared with 15 per cent for the latter.

## Ex-Masters Champ Ties For Third Day Lead

West Palm Beach, Fla. — (UPI) — Ex-Masters champion Arnold Palmer tied young Dave Ragan of Orlando, Fla., for the third-day lead in the West Palm Beach open golf tournament Saturday with a 66 and clamped the pressure on the 22-year-old Floridian.

Ragan, who turned pro only 18 months ago, scrambled to a 70 and held a share of the lead with a three round 205. The lanky youngster was in and out of trouble in sharp contrast to Palmer's precision game.

Jay Brewer of Crystal River, Fla., in second place Friday, shot a 68 to stay as high as third with a 206. He might have been out front but for a double bogey seven on the final hole.

Defending champion Pete Cooper of Lakeland, Fla., shot his third straight sub-par round, a 68, and held fourth place with 207. In fourth place was Bill Johnston, Provo, Utah, with a 67 that gave him 209.

Palmer had to make up four strokes to catch Ragan and he did it over a cold, wind swept course. His put-

ting was nearly perfect as he dropped two 20-footers. He birdied the first two holes after close approach shots and dropped a 10-foot birdie putt on six. He rolled in a 20-foot putt for birdies on nine and 10. Two long wood shots put him at the foot of the green on the long, par five eighth and he chipped up only four feet from the cup. He dropped that one for a birdie, too.

## Lenoir Rhyme Champ in NAIA

Kansas City — (UPI) — Unde-feated, untied Lenoir Rhyme college today ranked tops in the final football poll this season by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The North Carolina school packed 326 points for a record total in the three years of the NAIA small college poll.

Second place in the final tabulations went to undefeated Western Illinois and third is Hillsdale of Michigan (8-1). Western Illinois and Lenoir Rhyme each had 910 records this year.

Others in the top 10 were East Texas State, co-champion with Texas A & I in the Lone Star Conference, fourth; Texas A & I, fifth; Presbyterian, sixth; Louisiana Tech, seventh; Southern Connecticut, McMurry, and West Chester (Pa.) State.

## Huskies Pass Grabbers

Seattle — (UPI) — Washington football fans used to shudder when an opposing player dropped back to pass.

## Hockey Head Plans Apology

Boston — (UPI) — The "thoroughly ashamed and disgusted" president of the U.S. amateur hockey association Saturday planned a letter of apology to the Russian ice hockey federation for the off-ice actions of a visiting American team.

Walter A. Brown who sponsored the 15-day Soviet tour of the Boston Hockey club, made the announcement after it was reported the American players had drawn complaints during a four-game stay in Moscow.

The coach of the team, Louis A. Duhamel, denied the charges made by Edmund Stevens, Moscow correspondent for Sports Illustrated magazine. He said his players may have been "tourists first and hockey players second," but added that the 20-member squad did nothing that affected their play.

Duhamel differed sharply with Stevens. The magazine article author charged that the players continually broke training and while at Moscow's Metropole hotel, "lounged in the lobby, wolfcalling the ladies and making passes at female guests and help in elevators."

## Grid Playoffs To Be Retained

Portland — (UPI) — The Oregon School activities association's legislative body voted 17-6 Friday in favor of retaining football playoffs despite an amendment introduced to eliminate them.

The decision will apply to all high schools in the A-1, A-2, B 11-man and B 6-man classifications.

Oden Hayes, secretary-treasurer of the group, said they also voted down 22-18 an amendment to change the starting date of the high school basketball season from Dec. 1 to Dec. 15 and to reduce the number of games from 22 to 18.

The present starting date and number of games will remain in effect.

Two new members were elected to the association's board of control. They were Frank Smith, superintendent of Sheridan schools and Walter McPartland, superintendent of Nyssa schools. Both will represent A-2 schools.

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
