Washington - The Federal Communications Commission has questioned the "character qualifications" of TV producer Daniel Enright to hold half interest in a Florida radio station in view of his part in the TV quiz scandals. The agency, which polices the radio-TV industry, raised the issue Monday in ordering station WGMA of Hollywood, Fla., to submit a statement within 20 days as to whether Enright and co-owner Jack Barry are "qualified to own and operate a broadcast facility."

The FCC said testimony that Enright helped rig TV quiz shows "raises serious questions about the character qualifications of Mr. Enright."

New Juvenile Code Goes Into Effect in Oregon January 1

(Editor's note: This is the first in a series of articles written by Mrs. Kay Crowell, Jackson county juvenile officer, concerning the new juvenile code which becomes effective Jan. 1.)

County Juvenile Officer
Apprehension without the foundation of reason is being expressed among many segments of Oregon's population concerning the new Juvenile Code which becomes effective Jan. 1.

Since no one of our citizens would consider using an automobile manufactured 52 years ago and kept running by an accumulation of repairs and make-shift devices, it is strange that there should be any insistence that the State of Oregon continue using a Juvenile Code designed 52 years ago and so constantly amended by successive legislatures that one provision frequently contradicted another, and resulted in an absence of uniformity in juvenile court jurisprudence from county to county throughout the State.

It should also be remembered that Oregon's population, industry and economics have undergone major changes in the past 52 years, and juvenile law 52 years old is an ineffectual as a motor vehicle code designed to control traffic in 1907.

into several general types. Fortunately the largest number of persons apprehensive about the new code is found among the conscientious group of officials and workers who have given freely of their time and effort for the past eight years to achieve its preparation and passage and who sincerely believe that the new code is an improvement over the old and are desirous of understanding its provisions and of putting it into effect promptly and efficiently after Jan. 1.

To help in the accomplishment of this goal, the Oregon Juvenile Judges association sponsored a summer training school at the University of Oregon last July, and more than 100 judges, court workers, police, school and welfare personnel attended classes from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. for a full week. The Oregon Juvenile Council adopted the theme of the new Juvenile Code for its annual three-day conference this fall; the Oregon Study Institute for Juvenile Needs likewise made the new Juvenile Code the theme for its two day annual conference. The State Bar association and the District Attorney's association arranged conferences to inform their members.

The Oregon Juvenile Judges association is arranging seminars on the subject for law students in the state's law schools, and will devote one full day of their forthcoming annual conference to perfecting new legal forms for Juvenile Court use with the aim of achieving uniformity throughout the state. In practically every county throughout the state this fall and winter workshops are being conducted by courts, district attorneys, and court personnel to acquaint all officials with the Code.

One certain factor appears. There is a uniform approval of this legislation by the juvenile court judges of the state of Oregon. But what of those others who are sometimes apprehensive to the point of opposition to an improved Juvenile Code?

First, it must be admitted that there is little uniformity of opinion on the method of correction of juvenile delinquents. There is the faction who decries what it considers the juvenile court's "coddling" of delinquents; another bemoans the absence of penalties for "delinquent parents," and still another sees in the new Code the deprivation of the rights of parents and children, while another deplors the "secrecy" accorded juvenile hearings and demands that hearings be open to the public and that juveniles' names be printed in the papers.

Troops Withdrawn From Canal Zone

Panama City - (UPI) - The United States and Panama have withdrawn troops from the canal-zone border, and it appeared that anti-American feeling here has simmered down at least for the time being.

Routine police patrols took over Monday from the troops who had lined the border since Saturday, when rioters tried to "invade" the U.S.-administered zone.

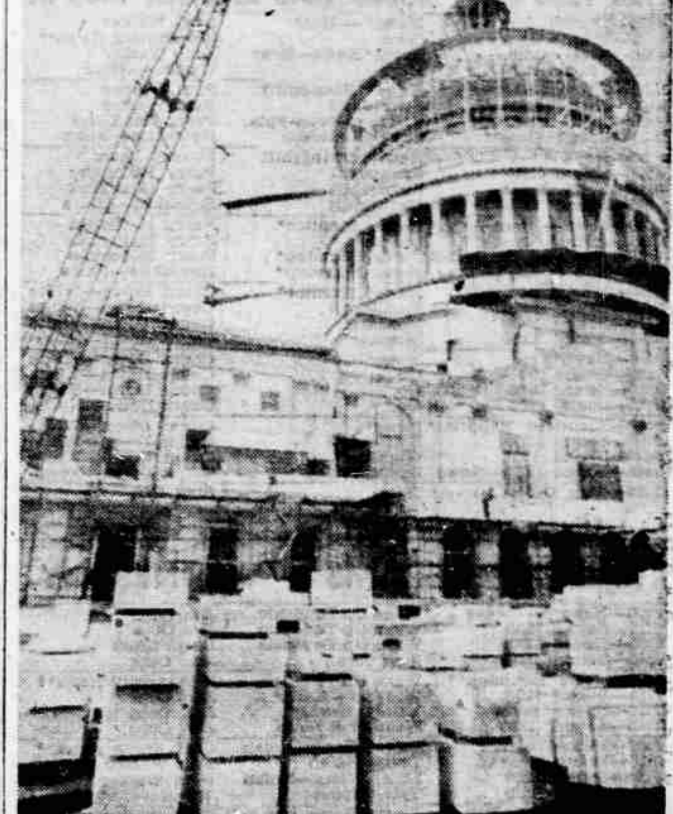
