New York - (UPI) - The struggle between labor and management will continue through much of 1960 and it will bring new battles for power within unions, Trendex predicts.

The labor-management struggle will tend to increase public awareness that our country is going "soft" in the demand for more and more leisure, and the whole contest will be a contributing factor in the recession expected during 1961, the investment advisory firm points out.

It adds: "There appears to be little likelihood that railroads will be able to eliminate much feather-bedding in the 1960 negotiations."

Reynolds & Co. says Rubbermaid Inc. is an "interesting, low-priced issue" that holds a strong position in the molded rubber household products field. It has successfully diversified into plastic coated wares for a wide variety of end uses.

Union Official Eyes Shorter Week

Washington - (UPI) - A union leader said today a shorter work week might be the only alternative to mass unemployment in future years.

Al Whitehouse, director of the AFL-CIO Industrial Union Department, made the statement in a speech prepared for a labor conference on workers' retirement and leisure problems.

Whitehouse bitterly attacked New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller for advocating no reduction in the standard 40-hour week to promote the nation's economic growth.

With obvious sarcasm, the union official said that with the 40-hour week America has "managed to solve almost everything except how to keep our workers employed, our children educated, our old folks in reasonable comfort and other 'minor' problems of that kind."

Eisenhower will have been back from his long overseas trip less than 24 hours and it will be his first major opportunity to report to the American people on his goodwill mission.

There will be no golf on Eisenhower's trip which begins Thursday night. His schedule over 22,000 miles is so arduous that he's not even taking his clubs along.

If he has time for recreation it will be aboard the Cruiser Des Moines between Athens, Greece, and Toulon, France, and he's expected to try skeet shooting for relaxation while he is afloat.

The President is taking his own drinking water with him on this trip, but no special supply of food. He'll eat whatever the local palace has to offer in the way of groceries. Where he stays in America.
