

Youngster To Get Gift of Hand

Washington - (UP) - Little Mike Plaugher had a good chance today of getting the one Christmas present he wants most - a left hand.

Six-year-old Mike was born without the hand.

His father, an \$85-a-week television and radio repairman who lives with his family of seven in nearby Alexandria, Va., said offers of money have been coming in steadily since Mike's story was publicized.

The father, Irvin Plaugher, said "letters and checks are pouring in." He told United Press International that three anonymous donors, two from New York and one from Boston, have offered to pay the full costs of equipping Mike with an artificial hand.

He said \$37 in donations came by mail and telegram Tuesday and that he was informed a Warrenton, Va., radio station had collected another \$177. He said all donations would go in a trust fund.

Longshoremen Agree To Pact

New York - (UP) - The International Longshoremen's Association agreed Tuesday night to a new contract, averting the threat of a renewed East and Gulf Coast dock walkout when a Taft-Hartley injunction expires Dec. 27.

Still unresolved was the crucial issue of automation, but the 70,000-member union agreed to submit the problem to binding arbitration if no solution is reached in 10 more days of negotiations.

Pay increases granted by the three-year pact will be retroactive to Oct. 1 if union members ratify the contract by Dec. 10, Alexander Chopin, president of the New York Shipping Association, promised.

The 40-cent-an-hour package officially covers only Atlantic coast ports from Maine to Virginia, but other ports traditionally follow the lead of the New York negotiations. It was reached with the aid of federal mediators and agreed on in a "memo of understanding" signed by the ILA and the shipping association.

Thornton To Meet With Attorneys

Salem - (UP) - Next week Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton will confer with district attorneys and law officers of five southern Oregon counties on problems of law enforcement.

The first meeting will be next Monday, in Roseburg. A conference later in the day will be in either Coquille or Coos Bay.

Tuesday Thornton will be in Gold Beach. A Wednesday breakfast meeting is slated in Medford with a noon meeting in Grants Pass.

Wecoma Man Is Bound Over Here

Charles Calvin May Jr., 35, of Wecoma, Ore., in district court yesterday was bound over to the grand jury on charges of burglary not in a dwelling.

May was brought back from California recently by sheriff's deputies to face charges here. He waived the right to an attorney and a preliminary hearing. He is being held on \$2,000 bail.

May is charged with breaking into Crater High school, Central Point.

Also appearing in district court was Milton Ramsey, 31, of Camp White, who was sentenced to nine months in the county jail for petty larceny. He had pleaded guilty previously to the charges.
