Kentucky,
Cincinnati
Cool Cats

Those "cats" from Cincinnati and Kentucky needed only one game to prove why the experts are picking them as the "coolest" teams of the new college basketball season.

The Cincinnati Bearcats, with two-time All-American Oscar Robertson tossing in 45 points, rolled to a 107-62 victory over Indiana State and the Kentucky Wildcats clobbered Colorado State College, 106-73, Tuesday night to open the 1959-59 campaign.

Robertson, who hopes to become the first player in history to win the national scoring championship three straight years, got off to a flying start before 7,859 home-town fans. The 6-5 jumping Jack scored 11 of Cincinnati's first 17 points, and had 25 to his credit when the Bearcats left the floor at intermission with a 52-30 advantage.

Win 32nd Consecutive Opener
Kentucky won its 32nd consecutive season opener with a well-balanced attack that left Baron Adolph Rupp whooping with joy. The Wildcats, who zoomed to a 45-21 lead at half-time, were paced by senior guard Bennie Coffman's 18 points. Dick Carson and sophomore forward Jim McDonald, taking over for departed All-American Johnny Cox, added 14 each.

Jerry West, another returning All-American, and Jerry Lucas, Ohio State's heralded sophomore who also turned in impressive opening night.

West scored 21 points and grabbed 22 rebounds in leading West Virginia to a 77-69 triumph over Tennessee and Lucas tallied 13 of his 16 points in the second half as Ohio State wiped out a 42-37 halftime deficit to defeat visiting Wake Forest, 77-69.

Wally Frank, picking up where All-American Bob Bozzer left off last season, tossed in 35 points in sparking Kansas State to an 85-52 triumph over South Dakota State.

Pilots Led
By Rector

Portland - (UPI) - University of Portland opened its basketball season Tuesday night with an easy 68-37 win over cross-town rival Portland State.

The Pilots, playing with their tallest team in years, opened with a fast 24-7 lead with 5½ minutes left in the first half. Portland State rallied briefly to narrow it to 29-19 at halftime but couldn't cope with the taller Pilots in the second half.

With eight minutes to play in the game, Portland had a 54-29 bulge.

Frank Rector, Medford senior, topped both clubs in scoring with 15 points. Ten of those came in the first half. Captain Jim Altenhofen scored 14 points and snared 13 rebounds.

Jack Bertell and Ray Torgerson snared scoring honors for the losers with 8 each.

Portland's freshman team won the preliminary game topping PSC's Jayvees, 48-33.

Butts Chosen
Coach of Week

Athens, Ga. - (UPI) - He's had great championship teams before, but nobody figured this was going to be another one.

He's short, round, and cherub-faced - a likely candidate to play Santa Claus at this time of the year - but his well-drilled teams don't give away anything and now they have surprised the experts by winning the Southeastern conference championship and landing a berth in the Orange Bowl.

He's Wally Butts of Georgia, named today by United Press International as college football's "Coach of the Week" after Georgia's 21-14 triumph over arch-rival and Gator Bowl-bound Georgia Tech.

That victory brought Georgia to the end of the regular season with nine victories and only one loss, and Butts isn't kidding when he says he is surprised.

Butts, in his 21st season at Georgia, was sincere when he said in September that Georgia's prospects appeared bleak. He had lost some key players through graduation and pro offers and the 1958 Bulldog frosh had been way below par.

Joe Brown Defends
Against Charnley

Houston, Tex. - (UPI) - Joe Brown, a lithe lightweight who has knocked out five of seven foes who have challenged for his world 135-pound championship, defends the crown again tonight against Britain's Dave Charnley, a fighter who's never been knocked off his feet.

Brown, though, was a solid 12 to 5 favorite over the British boiler-maker, who is nine years younger than the champion with only 39 fights on his record compared to 103 for Brown.

Brown, as champion will get 40 per cent of the net gate and an equal share of the \$40,000 paid for television rights, while Charnley, who won the British Empire light-weight championship with a

10-round knockout of Willie Towel last May 12, will get 20 per cent of the same amount.

Both fighters, with no concern about scaling less than the mandatory 135 pounds at the official weigh-in, were confident of victory.

Brown, who has scored 35 knockouts in winning 73 fights, said he expected to finish off his foe in the early rounds, even though Charnley is a southpaw, a style which has given the champion trouble in the past.

Charnley, while not anticipating a knockout, indicated he expected to be around at the finish, regardless of how long the bout might go, and said he would make his first championship defense in London.

Forest Award

Eugene-Oregon's forest industries have doffed their tin hats to the Oregon division of the Izaak Walton League of America.

The forest industries, through the Oregon Committee of American Forest Products Industries, presented an award to the IWL's Oregon Division at the League's annual state convention here Saturday, Nov. 28, for its contributions to the forestry future of the state. The citation praised the League for "its devoted efforts in the field of resource conservation and its far-sighted leadership in promoting better understanding between sportsmen and forest industries."

The industry award was presented at the League's annual awards luncheon by S. W. Robb of Willamette Valley Lumber Co., Dallas, chairman of AFPI's Oregon committee.

In other major West Coast action Tuesday night, California's defending N.C.A.A. champions dumped a rugged Cal Alumni five 64-48; St. Mary's breezed past the Cal Aggies, 60-38; Santa Clara shelved Chico State, 74-54; San Jose State finished strong to whip San Francisco State, 54-41; and Washington State topped Gonzaga, 81-70.

Arrillaga, the 22-year-old "old man" of the Stanford squad, clicked home two straight jump shots in the overtime against USF.

The 6-3½ forward finished with 20 points, high for both teams. USF's hustle-bug guard Ron Cox netted 18.

The victory was Stanford's 16th straight at home, but the score was knotted 16 times before USF finally gave way.

Twenty-five players paraded on court in the UCLA-USC clash in the new Los Angeles Sports Arena and the win was the sixth straight over the Trojans for UCLA coach John Wooden. Southern Cal last defeated UCLA in 1957, 84-80.

Santa Clara, pre-season favorite in the West Coast Athletic conference, capitalized on a strong second half to whip Chico State.

Picked Over
SF Eleven

The Baltimore Colts are 5½ point favorites to whip the Forty-Niners at San Francisco Saturday and clinch at least a tie for the National Football league's Western Division title.

Baltimore and San Francisco are tied for the lead. Like the other 10 clubs, each has two more regular season games. Thus the winner of Saturday's nationally televised game will move a game ahead with one to go and will be certain of at least a tie for sectional honors.

The Cleveland Browns-Giants game at New York heads Sunday's five-game program. The Giants lead the Browns and Philadelphia Eagles by two games and can clinch their second straight Eastern title with a victory or a tie, choice to win.

The Eagles are 2½ point favorites to down the Redskins at Washington but Philadelphia's slender hopes will depend on whether Cleveland can defeat New York.

Bears Still Alive
The Chicago Bears, a game behind Baltimore and San Francisco, still are "alive" in the Western race. They are seven-point choices to defeat the visiting Pittsburgh Steelers, the team that has whipped the Giants, Browns and Eagles in the last three weeks.

In Sunday's other games, the Rams are favored over the Green Bay Packers by 5½ points at Los Angeles and the Lions are favored over the Chicago Cardinals by four at Detroit.

The Colts walloped the Forty-Niners two weeks ago at Baltimore, 45-14. But Baltimore never has won a game at San Francisco in seven tries in the NFL and four in the old All-American Conference. After Saturday's game, the Colts end their regular season Dec. 12 against the Rams in Los Angeles, where they have won once in seven starts.

Oregon's 1959 high school football season is history but the autumn campaign will be one not soon forgotten - at least in this metropolis of the valley of the Rogue. Two high school football teams and two state championships for one community. It's something to boast about and to be proud of. But we suggest that the townspeople take a cue from the players of both teams who are accepting their plaudits with due modesty. Let's remember that it was the boys and their coaches who won the laurels.

INGREDIENTS
What goes into championship football teams? Talented personnel, a high caliber coaching staff, willingness to subjugate the individual glory to the good of the team, willingness to bear the sometimes drudgery of practice to perfect assignments and the will to win - These are among the requisites the Black Tornado and the Crusaders had. Or, they would not have been champions in their respective classes.

SPIRIT LIKED
Said George Pasero, sports editor of the Oregon Journal, last Friday night of the Black Tornado after it had beaten 1958 champion Jefferson of Portland: "I like their spirit; I like their desire."

BEST WE'VE SEEN
How does the 1959 Medford high school football team compare to those which represented the school in the past. We do not claim to be an authority. We didn't see the great teams of 1944 and 1945 and those of the 1920s are of dim youthful recollection. The 1956 team was one among the best. This 1959 aggregation, however, is the best we've seen in watching Tornado clubs since 1946. We say this, in all respect to other teams, because of the versatile and potent offense of this year's crew and its wealth in talented personnel.

The 1959ers didn't establish the defensive reputation of the Tornado of last year. Still, when a team permits opponents an average of 6.5 points per game over a 12-tilt schedule, that's rather effective protection against encroachment of the goal. Only two teams scored more than one touchdown against Medford and only one more than two.

COLLECTION OF STARS
It would be unfair to point out one, two or three players on the Black Tornado football crew and state that they were the stars of the team. Rather, the Pear City A-1 powerhouse was a collection of stellar performers cast into a precision grid machine. Some of those who saw lesser service for the Tornado would have been welcome additions to other teams of the area.

IT'S WHAT'S INSIDE
The St. Mary's grid contingent was proof this fall that size doesn't always make the man. To paraphrase a well known commercial: "It's what's inside that counts."

The Crusaders, to us, are of the same mold and fiber as the 1954 aggregation which claimed the District 5B championship with spirit and ability, despite a shortage of manpower.

CREDIT TO COACHES
Credit is due the coaching staffs of the A-1 champion Tornado and the Class B co-champion Crusaders. For Medford - Fred Spiegelberg and his aides, Paul Evensen, Tom Marier, Dean Benson, Frank Roelandt, John Kovenz and Art Keith. (The latter three were Jayvee tutors.) For St. Mary's - Bill McKibbin, Bill Stewart and Duane Daley.

BAD POLICY
The matters of rejecting Medford's request for a Saturday night game with Jefferson in the state finale and particularly the assigning of all Portland officials to the title game certainly did not set well with supporters of the Black Tornado.

Date change petition, of course, was a bid that came too late. But, there's no reason why change in arbiters for the game could not have been made. Assignment of an all-Portland crew definitely should not have been made in the first

place. It was just plain bad policy.

But, before Portland is blamed too much, it should be noted that only one member of the Oregon School Activities association board of control, which has the final say in playoff matters, is from Portland. Others prior to elections last week end were from Gervais, Henley, Knappa, Springfield, Athena and Pendleton.

Medford just better get used to the idea that there are places outside of Portland which don't mind seeing the Black Tornado take its lumps.

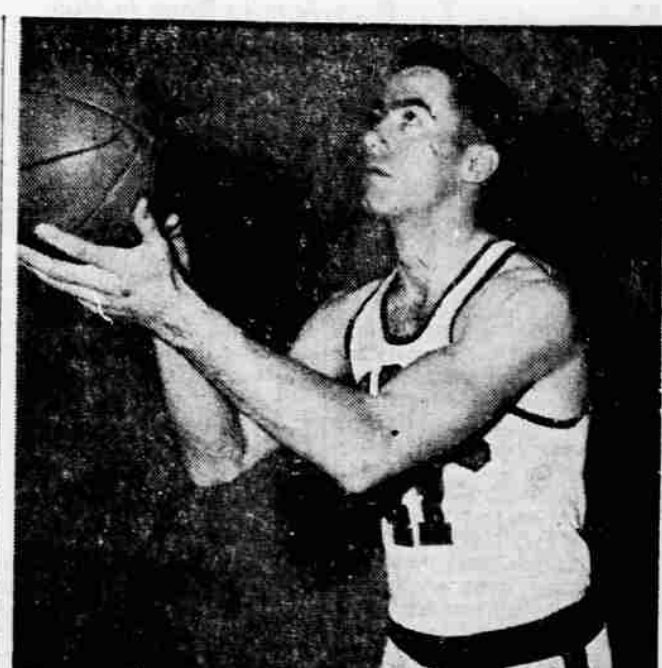
