New Signs Being Erected on Oregon's New Freeway Routes

Salem - New signs designed, tested and standardized by the American Association of State Highway Officials are now being erected along the nation's freeways.

The big signs feature large reflective white letters on a green background. Signs are so placed that drivers are not only told where the next exit road will take them, but are told by advance signs that a decision must be made. And best of all the new signs can be recognized, read and understood at normal freeway speeds.

Oregon's first highway section to be marked with the new signs stretches from Roster Rock to Sundial Road on the Columbia River Highway east of Portland. This highway, formerly marked only as US 30, is now also signed with red, white and blue shields that identify the route as interstate highway 80N. These, along with the big green signs with their white lettering are now in place along with smaller guide, regulatory and warning signs.

Vary in Size
The new signs vary in size with the overall dimensions being governed by the type and length of the message. The messages used on guide signs are printed in both capital and small letters for maximum recognition and readability. The capital letter size on the guide signs used at major interchanges is 24 inches high. These letter sizes and the advance signing make it possible for the driver to have ample time to decide where he wants to leave the freeway before going beyond the proper exit.

Signs marking viewpoints, rest areas and other areas located along the highway proper carry green lettering on a white background. The minimum letter size on this type of sign is 12 inches. The complete reversal in the color scheme and the capital-letters-only style, keep confusion at a minimum.

The highway department has also provided signs that indicate which facilities are available along the highway near the interchanges. That is, if gas, food or lodging, or any combination is available it is so indicated. Another feature of the signing program is the use of signs to warn the freeway user if it is more than 15 miles to the next service stop.

Built to Last
The new signs have been built to last. They are made of steel and aluminum, and are finished with porcelain enamel surfaces which will require little maintenance in the years to come.

The signing of the interstate highways is being handled through private contractors, who will both manufacture and install the signs. The crest Memorial park.

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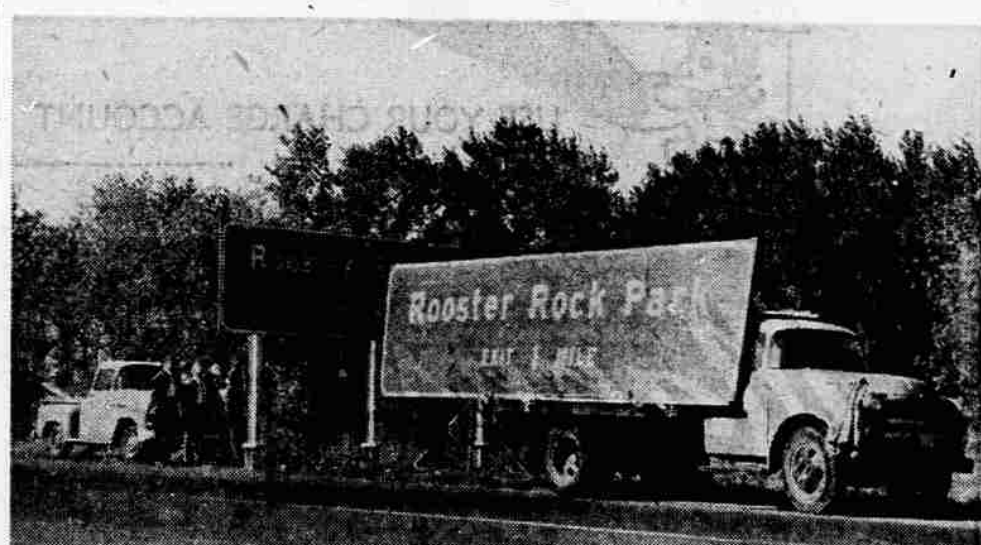

tion between Roster Rock Park and Sundial Road near Troutdale, under contract to the Electrical Products Corporation of Portland, was signed at a cost of \$36,510. Maintenance will be the responsibility of the state highway department.

The need for signing of this type was first recognized years ago after the first eastern freeways were opened to traffic. The design of the new freeways does not make provision for the slowing of traffic suddenly at interchanges to make a decision, or the extremely dangerous practice of slow-driving, or stopping or parking on the shoulders as has been done on other types of highways. These dangerous practices cannot be tolerated on the new freeways and the signing has been developed to reduce such habits.

Improved Signing
These problems led to improved signing, but added improvement was still indicated, mainly in standardization. Pressed by the accelerated Federal highway building program underway since 1956, the American Association of State Highway Officials and the U. S. bureau of public roads agreed upon the present program in 1958, and standardization of signing is now underway throughout the nation. Oregon is conforming to this program on all of its interstate highways and will use a scaled down version on all other roads within the state.

The motoring public will see more and more of the new green and white signs as the program progresses.
