

Nixon, Stevenson Add To Leads In Editors' Presidential Poll

Washington — Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Adlai E. Stevenson emerged as stronger-than-ever contenders for their parties' 1960 Presidential nominations in a poll of the nation's editors released today by Congressional Quarterly.

Nixon doubled his lead over New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller from a similar poll of editors last April. Stevenson more than doubled his April lead over Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (Texas), who moved past Sen. John F. Kennedy (Mass.) into the runner-up spot in the Democratic race.

Rockefeller and Kennedy were named by three-fifths of the editors as the parties' strongest possible Vice Presidential nominees.

Strongest Tickets
Some 456 editors from all sections of the country were asked by Congressional Quarterly their "current judgment on the strongest possible tickets the political parties could nominate for the 1960 election." The April poll drew 330 replies. In neither poll were the editors asked to state their personal preferences.

Stevenson gained 9 percentage points in the Democratic Presidential race, and Johnson picked up 3 points. Kennedy dropped 8 points into third place, followed by Sen. Stuart Symington (Mo.), who fell 3 points off his April score. Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (Minn.) slipped from 2 per cent to 1 per cent of the total vote and was tied for fifth by Sen. Frank J. Lausche (Ohio).

In the Republican race, Nixon moved from a 3-to-2 margin over Rockefeller into a 3-to-1 advantage.

Nixon led Rockefeller by margins ranging from 2-to-1 in the East to better than 3-to-1 in the South and West and almost 5-to-1 in the Midwest. He increased his lead in all sections but most notably in the South, where he and Rockefeller were almost evenly matched in the April poll.

In the Democratic race, Stevenson carried the East, Midwest and West by margins of almost 3-to-1 over the runner-up, but Johnson edged him out of first place in the South. Stevenson made his greatest gains from April in the East and Midwest.

Johnson moved up to take second place from Kennedy in Kennedy's home territory, the East, but he stayed in fourth place in the Midwest. Kennedy spurred past Symington and Johnson to become second choice in the West and he retained his runner-up position in the Midwest.

But Kennedy slumped badly in the South, dropping from a tie for first in April into fourth place in the latest poll. Symington was the third choice in the Midwest and South, fourth in the East and West.

Rockefeller boomed up from 39 per cent to 63 per cent of the vote for the Republican Vice Presidential nomination — a nomination he has said he would not take. Nixon remained in second place, but there were some interesting shifts behind him. House Minority Leader

Roads Committee Seeks To Head Off Federal Aid Cut
White Sulphur Springs, W. Va. (UPI) — The Governors Conference Committee on Roads and Highway Safety has called for a meeting with President Eisenhower in an effort to head off reduced federal aid to states in the government's interstate superhighway program.

Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff of Connecticut said changes in the program announced in October would reduce state allocations by \$1,100,000,000 during the next three fiscal years.

Ribicoff, committee chairman, said "we governors want to take a look at this and sit down with the governors, the Congress and the President." Ribicoff said the committee was especially concerned about "contract controls" put into effect by the government under the interstate building program.

He said these controls dictate to the states "how and on what basis" the roads will be built.

"The federal government is telling the states what to do and how to spend the money for the first time in 40 years," he said.

More than 20 governors were on hand at the plush Greenbrier Hotel for the three days of conferences.

New Treatment Used For Mentally Ill
Boston (Science Service) — "His very own" nurse and day hospital care are part of a radically new approach to the treatment of the mentally ill patient here at the Massachusetts Mental Health Center.

Aimed at providing better patient care, less isolation, and keeping the patient in closer contact with family and community, the center's new patient program includes the services of a doctor and social worker as well as a nurse. Some resident patients remain in the hospital day and night, others put in a "9-to-4 day."

So far, about 575 patients have received personalized service for as long as 12 weeks. While the Boston University School of Nursing, which has developed the program in conjunction with the center, has made no scientific measurement of the program's effectiveness as yet, its staff believes the new approach has much value.

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Charles A. Halleck (Ind.) moved from 10th position to third. Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, went from eighth position to fourth. Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield moved up from 12th slot to fifth. Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell dropped from

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Tropics Have Almost Half of Forest Area

San Francisco — (Science Service) — Almost half the world's total forest area is found in the tropics, I. T. Haig of the U.S. Forest Service, Washington, D.C., told scientists attending the Society of American Foresters meeting here. The United Nations' Food and Agricultural organization is studying these forests in America, Africa and Asia in order to improve forestry practices. These forests range from the luxurious "true rain forest" to dry scrub growth on arid land, Mr. Haig said.
