Eisenhower To Visit Iran, Wonderland On Top of Oil Pool

Iran, sixth country on the Eisenhower grand tour, is a desert wonderland of romance, antiquity and tumult sitting atop a vast pool of oil. Its very name, the one it bore for 3,000 years, is one to conjure with—Persia. Its ruler is one of the world's most handsome monarchs, Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, 40. His sad quest for a male heir to Persia's peacock throne has been all romance and fairy-tale sadness; Princess Farah Diba, the beautiful Princess Soraya, and now—with an engagement announcement expected any minute—the young, doe-eyed Farah Diba.

These in succession have shared or will share as queen one of the world's oldest thrones, once occupied by such names of legend as Darius, Xerxes, Cyrus and Artaxerxes. Once the rulers of the peacock throne held sway over an empire stretching from Greece to India, from Russia to Libya. Within the past 10 years, its occupant has had trouble holding his own palace.

Used To Tumult
Today Iran is the bullseye of the Middle East target for Russian propaganda and attack. But tumult is nothing new to Persia. It has been threatened, fought over and divided by Romans, Greeks, Arabs, Tamerlane's Mongols, British, Russians and Mohammed Mossadegh. Premier Mossadegh, nationalizing oil in 1951, managed to toss out both British influence and the Shah. A three-day revolt brought the Shah back and slapped Mossadegh in jail.

Since then, while the world has watched the Shah's romances, Iran has stood up squarely to a barrage of Soviet threat. It camps on Russia's southern doorstep, blocking the way to the Persian Gulf—and in March of this year it signed a defense treaty with the United States. **Great Oil Reserves**
Iran's 19 million people are spread thinly over a desert area bigger than Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado combined. Oil gushes from five major fields at the rate of 750,000 barrels a day. Yet further resources go a-begging; Persia's potential oil reserves are considered the largest in the Middle East.

Nature Blamed for Seaweed on Beaches

La Jolla, Calif. (Science Service)—Nature, not man, is mainly responsible for the piles of seaweed that sometimes strewn beaches in southern California, a 12-year study reveals. Prof. Claude E. ZoBell, Scripps Institution of Oceanography here, found that as much as 500,000 cubic yards (about 600,000 tons) of more than 100 varieties of seaweed may wash ashore on San Diego county beaches each year. The giant kelp, which is commercially harvested, makes up 60 per cent of the bulk. The harvesting operations seem to have little effect on the amount of kelp on the beaches and may even increase the amount that washes ashore.

Ham Radio Operator Helped Out of Mud

Gallup, N. M. — Jack Grogan, a ham radio operator, got himself out of the mud through use of the airwaves—via Panama.

His car got stuck while he was hunting and he used his car radio transmitter to summon help.

He couldn't pick up anyone locally but an obliging ham in Panama heard his "SOS" and relayed it back to three other Gallup amateurs. They came to the rescue quickly with tire chains.
