

Humboldt Subdues Red Raiders 65-56

Ashland - The Lumberjacks of Humboldt State college pulled away in the final minutes of play at Raider gym here Thursday night to trim Southern Oregon college 65-56 in the basketball season opener for both teams.

Ahead by only 55-52 with three minutes remaining, the Jacks outscored the Raiders 10-4, mostly on free throws, and thus clinched at least a split in the current 2-game series.

High man for the Californians in what for the first 30 minutes was a nip-and-tuck affair was guard Eddie Thomas, HSC captain, with 18 points. Raider veteran Gordy Carrigan topped SOC with 19.

Humboldt's strong finish started with a jump shot by forward Punky Rogers. John Payne countered for the Ashland crew with a long one-hander but the Jacks then poured in eight straight points and were never headed.

Schools Here Start Saturday Recreation Slates This Week

Saturday recreation program of Medford school district for boys will begin this Saturday, Dec. 5. It will continue through March 12 except for closure for two Saturdays, Dec. 26 and Jan. 2, during the Christmas and New Year holiday period.

The program of activities will begin this Saturday at all schools except the senior high, Hedrick Junior high and Griffin Creek. First day on the Hedrick and Senior high schedules will be Dec. 12 and initial Saturday at Griffin Creek will be Jan. 9.

Seventeen gymnasiums, in all, will be involved in the program. The facilities will be open from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. or from 10 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m. at the option of each school.

Grade schools will offer informal competition in basketball, volleyball or other appropriate games. There will be special contest days. Free play and basket shooting. No junior or senior high boys will be permitted at grade school gyms except at Rush, Jacksonville, Lone Pine, West Side, Griffin Creek and Howard.

The junior highs will offer basketball instruction and intramural games, tumbling, volleyball or badminton or other activity suited to the group. In the senior high school regular league play is planned starting Dec. 12.

Just when you think you've got the Boston Celtics on the run up pops the "Cooz."

Take Thursday night for instance. With the Celtics nursing a one-point lead and 11 seconds left to play, Cousy went into one of his famed dribbling acts, and would have kept on, except that one of the exasperated Cincinnati Royals fouled him.

Cousy, the National Basketball association's highest paid player, then stepped to the foul line and dropped in two shots with one second remaining and the Celtics finally wore down the Royals, 114-111.

Warriors Win
It was the first game of an NBA doubleheader at Philadelphia, and the victory proved a big one, because the Warriors whipped the Minneapolis Lakers, 123-109, in the nightcap with Wilt Chamberlain scoring 41 points.

Had Boston lost, Philadelphia would have moved to within a game of the Celtics, who lead the Eastern division race.

In between his dribbling and play-making acts, Cousy also tossed in 25 points, including Boston's last three points. The Royals' Jack Twyman hit for 32 points to take game honors.

Chamberlain, rapidly becoming the star of the pro circuit, canned 18 of his 41 points in the last 12 minutes to break a close game wide open. Twice he teamed with Paul Arizin to take the Warriors on a scoring spurge in the late stages and the Lakers couldn't match that one-two punch.

Carrigan, Brown Gain Mention on Little All-Coast

San Francisco - (UPI) - Whittier, Fresno State and San Francisco State, three of the top "small college" teams in the country, each placed two men on United Press International's Little All-Coast Team announced today.

But the other five spots were divided among five schools reaching from Los Angeles in the south to the Canadian border.

The big battle this year was over the quarterback berth, won by Jimmy Sochor, San Francisco State. Sochor, signed to a pro contract by the Los Angeles Chargers, led the 'Gators to an undefeated season-10 wins in a row-and the Far West Conference championship to get the nod over Jim St. Clair of Santa Barbara and sophomore Denny Spurlock of Whittier.

The professionals, taking a closer look at the small schools, drafted or later signed several of the All-Coast stars this year, including fullback Hank Marshall of San Francisco State and guard Doug Brown of Fresno State.

The competition for end slots on both the first and second teams was very close, with Bill Cole of Whitworth and Darol Foster of Humboldt State nosing out such good men as Tom Whittaker, Nevada; Curt Hill, Cal Poly; and Ray Simonsen, Linfield.

San Francisco - (UPI) - The Baltimore Colts flew into town Thursday night confident that they can break their Kezar "jinx."

The Colts, tied with the Forty Niners 7-3 for the Western Division lead in the National Football league, have never won a game in Kezar Stadium and come up for their seventh try against the Forty Niners Saturday.

"Every Colt is in good shape and ready for Saturday's Forty Niner game," said Baltimore publicist Herb Wright.

The odds favored the powerful Baltimore club, who walloped the Forty Niners 45-14 in a ground and air attack Nov. 14, by 6 points, with the margin expected to hit 7 points by game time.

New Program of Chamber to Start Here Wednesday

A new program by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, "Action in Practical Politics," will get under way at a 7:30 a.m. breakfast meeting Wednesday, Dec. 9, at the Jackson hotel.

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Round Butte Dam Objections Heard
Portland - (UPI) - Oregon's Fish and Game Commissions Thursday gave their objections to Round Butte dam on the Deschutes river at a Federal Power Commission hearing here.

The hearing, on Portland General Electric Company's application for a federal permit, was in its fifth day today.

The Fish and Game Commission spokesmen said the dam would result in reduction of downstream minimum flow below Pelton dam to 3,000 cubic feet per second in March, April and May.

This, they said, would expose gravel beds in which trout eggs are deposited during these months. They said the flow should be 5,000 cfs.

Benson Reported In Good Condition
Washington - (UPI) - Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson, 60, underwent surgery today for removal of his gall bladder.

He was reported "in good post operative condition" at Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

The operation on Benson took an hour and a half.

It was performed by Army Surgeon General Leonard D. Heaton, who operated on President Eisenhower for ileitis in June, 1956.

Benson entered the hospital Tuesday night. The operation was decided upon because he has been suffering from "intermittent acute attacks of gall bladder colic."

December Weather In Warming Trend

Early - December weather shone fair and warm over most of the nation today, apparently in repentance for one of the nastiest Novembers on record.

But Florida, hard-hit by an earlier cold wave, shivered under another icy blast which blustered through the state Thursday, dropping temperatures to below 30 degrees in the north and near 35 in the south.

Elsewhere, temperatures rose 10 to 20 degrees Thursday night from Texas in a fan embracing Colorado and Western Illinois.

Montana, where last month's storms struck with full fury, reported a 20-degree rise in the mercury and Council Bluffs, Iowa, recorded a new Dec. 3 record of 64.
