Roseburg Indians Overcome Crater High's Cagers 60-57

Central Point — Roseburg high overcame a nine-point deficit in the fourth quarter here Friday night to slip by Crater's Comets 60 to 57 in the season opener basketball game for each school.

Crater led 53 to 44 with 5½ minutes left to play. The Indians tied up the game at 53 each with less than four minutes left and went ahead at 56 to 55 with 1½ to go.

Fouls hurt the Roseburg club through much of the contest but in the long run Crater personal infractions and resulting Indian free shots made the margin of difference on the score board. The visitors made 26 of 38 free shot tries to 15 for 31 by Crater. From the field, the Comets outshot the Indians 21 to 17.

Roseburg hoopers moved the ball well during the fray but were restrained by a leechlike Crater defense while the Comets had the better shots over most of the route. Crater cause was damaged, however, when Chuck Turner and Earl Cooper fouled out in the concluding stanza. The Indians lost Larry Hink and Ray Palm on infractions but were compensated by more depth in reserves.

Stellar Jim Jarvis, held in check effectively from the field by Cooper, headed the upsurge of the Indians in the fourth with 10 points, six on free shots. Jarvis was high point man of the evening with six field goals and 12 of 14 free heave tries for 24 markers. Loyal Higinbotham had 20 points and Dave Sharp 20 for the Comets. Each had eight field goals. Sharp hit four of six from the gift line and Higinbotham five of 10.

Sharp and Denny Edwards did some strong work under the backboards for Crater. Edwards had 14 rebounds and Sharp 11. Bill Mundt and Leroy Roberts led Roseburg with 10 and nine retrieves, respectively.

Roseburg was on top through most of the first quarter and held a 15 to 14 margin at the end of the stanza. Crater was in front 32 to 30 after the hectic second canto and 48 to 42 after the third.

Goals by Higinbotham and Sharp and a gifter by Higin-

botham for Crater, while Palm put in a jumper for Roseburg established the Comets' 53 to 44 spread. This was cut down on a long turning jump shot by Mundt and seven successive counters by Jarvis. The Indian capped this spurge with a jump shot from deep in the circle and a steal and a long shot from the side.

Roseburg took the lead, for their first time since the early second quarter, on gift heaves by Roberts making it 55 to 53. A long one-hander by Higinbotham knotted the game again but Jarvis put in a

single free shot and then a brace for 58 to 55 with a minute remaining.

With 37 seconds to go, Higinbotham hit a close in jump for Crater. The Indians played keep away and with 16 seconds on the clock Roberts dumped in a close in bucket.

Technical Called

During the second quarter, which saw three technical fouls called on Indian coach Curt Jarvis for his comments from the bench, Crater tied the score at 22-all on a free shot by Higinbotham and went 24 to 22 on charity throws by Sharp and Turner. Higinbotham's lay-in made it 26 to 22. Mike Brundage got a pair of free points for Roseburg but Sharp came back with a field bucket for 28 to 24. Sharp added a pair of foul tosses for 30 to 24. Then Palm goaled on a feed and he and Brundage each got two four heaves to tie up the game at 30-24.

Sharp's long pusher made it 32 to 30 with six seconds in the half.

In the first four minutes of the third chukker, Crater ran up nine points to Roseburg's three for a 41 to 33 advantage. The Indians cut it to 42 to 39, helped by a bucket by Hink on which the Comets were napping on a long pass from out of bounds.

Crater hit at a .388 average from the field and Roseburg .314.

In the preliminary Prospect varsity outpointed Crater jayvees 42 to 38 in a game closely battled through the second half. Craig Gardner scored 20 markers for Prospect and Dave Foote 15 for the Comets.
