John Litster of Gold Hill Dies Unexpectedly

John Litster, 73, of Gold Hill, died unexpectedly at his home Friday. He developed and was operator of the Oregon Vortex at the House of Mystery on Sardine creek.

Mr. Litster was born April 30, 1886, in Alva, Scotland, the son of a British foreign diplomat.

He was reared in South Africa, returning to England later where he received his mining engineer degree from London university, and his master of arts and science from Glasgow university.

Mr. Litster was employed for many years as a mining engineer by the Guggenheim Corporation. He was a graduate of the Kilmarnock academy in Scotland, where as was a classmate of Sir Alexander Fleming, the discoverer of penicillin.

He spoke nine languages fluently.

In 1930, in Oakland, Calif., he was married to Mildred F. Forsyth, who survives.

Mr. Litster also was a writer, many of his writings appearing under the pen names of Alva Romanes and John Litster. He moved to southern Oregon about 30 years ago, where he developed the Oregon Vortex at the House of Mystery.

Surviving besides his widow is a son, Jack Litster, who is living in eastern Oregon. Private funeral services will be read by a Christian Scientist in the Conger - Morris downtown chapel Monday morning. Committal will be private.
