

Liquor Licenses Are Approved by Council

The Medford city council Friday noon renewed several liquor licenses and denied one.

Liquor license renewals were on the council's agenda Thursday night, but action was continued to a special meeting Friday noon to give the council additional time to consider the applications.

All renewal applications were renewed except one for Henry's Broiler, 1206 North Riverside ave. The council gave no reason for denying approval of the application.

At Thursday's meeting, a request by Ping's Gardens, 2330 North Pacific highway for a liquor dispensing license was tabled indefinitely because there are too many liquor dispensing establishments in Medford at present, the council explained.

Commission Request
The council said the Oregon State Liquor Commission requests there be no more than one liquor outlet for every 2,000 persons. Medford is already over this suggested quota, the council said.

Wallace Wong, one of the owners of Ping's Gardens, was told his request came

with favorable recommendations, but would have to be tabled until there was an opening for another dispensing establishment.

The council's approval or disapproval of liquor dispensing applications is not binding on the state liquor commission, but is taken into consideration, the council said. Ultimate authority lies with the state commission.

The council approved a change of name and ownership of the Community Grocery, 1101 East Jackson st., formerly owned by John L. and Mildred Duke Arzner, to Yoakley's Community Grocery, now owned by O. Earl Yoakley.

Approves Incorporation
It also approved the incorporation of Brown's Cafe, 101 East Main st., with Glenn F. and Wanda J. Willford, the officers and sole stockholders.

A request for a change of ownership by the North Riverside Tavern, 1701 North Riverside ave., was rejected by the council.

The council approved changes of names from Hinson's to Pruitts Fountain Lunch, 436 West Main st., and Dad's Hideaway to Don's Hideaway, 1182 Court st.

It was agreed to let The Hi-Way, 12 North Riverside ave., and Don's Hideaway, drop partners in their businesses.

All councilmen, except Fred E. Robinson, were present at Friday's meeting. Mayor John Snider, who returned Thursday night from the American Municipal association conference in Denver, also attended.

Committee to Study Park Areas

An "exploratory" committee meeting on possibilities of park and recreation area construction in the Bear Creek area will be held in the county courthouse Tuesday afternoon, County Judge Earl Miller has announced.

"This is a voluntary exploratory meeting to determine the possibility of cooperation (among federal, state and local agencies) for establishing a reasonable amount of recreation area between Seven Oaks and Ashland as part of the new Pacific highway freeway construction," the county judge explained.

Miller said he hoped to develop some factual information on a proposed construction program.

Those invited include Elmer Biegel, Ashland city superintendent; Chester Corry, architectural engineer, Ashland; Robert Duff, Medford city manager; Vernon Thorpe, Medford city engineer; Ned Langford, Medford planning commission technician; Robert L. Haworth, Medford parks and recreation director; Freeman Mason, Central Point mayor; Paul Rynning, county engineer; Robert J. Carstensen, assistant county engineer; and Jack Eaton, county planning commission technician, and the county court.

Jacksonville Man Hurt in Accident

A passenger was injured in a two-vehicle accident on Jacksonville highway early Friday morning between Matlack's grocery and Oak Grove school, state police reported.

Sherman Elvin Meeds, 28, of route 2, box 1F, Jacksonville, was taken to Rogue Valley hospital with an injured right shoulder. He was reported in fair condition late Friday.

A truck and trailer driven by George Earl Wrightman, 35, of Eugene, was angled across the eastbound lane of the highway backing into Clover lane when a car driven by Ralph James Lawrence, 44, of North Stage rd., Jacksonville, collided with it.

The truck driver was advised he would be charged with failure to operate on the right side of the highway, state police said. The left side of the trailer received minor damage and the front end of the Lawrence car received heavy damage.
