Governor and Wife Move Into New-Old Salem Home

Salem — Central theme of the new-old home here of Gov. Mark Hatfield and his family is gold. But there is a little bit of everything in it. Gov. and Mrs. Hatfield showed their new home to newsmen Sunday. They moved into the four-bedroom house two weeks ago.

The "at home" affair was the second bit of entertaining thus far. The new house, which they are purchasing, was the scene of a celebration honoring the golden wedding anniversary of the governor's parents a few days after they moved in.

The 87-year-old house is dotted with their antiques, paintings, objects d'art and other mementos. There's a bit of the state built in, too.

One of the items is a stained-glass window containing the state seal, acquired when the old Lane county courthouse was razed.

There is a flag pole from Roseburg and some concrete from the old Capitol building. Myrtlewood paneling for the den is from the Coquille area.

The house—green on the outside—has four bedrooms and a nursery, two bathrooms and a powder room, living room, dining room, den, two fireplaces, a kitchen and a half-basement, where the utility room is located.

There is a big back yard where eventually a patio and barbecue will go.

Gold Dominates
Gold dominates the living and dining rooms, the walls, rugs, drapes, picture and mirror frames. There are two telephones, one red—an emergency line to the capitol.

Still unfinished are the den, kitchen, nursery and circular driveway. Pending completion of the latter, the governor's official car—a new gold-brown Lincoln—has been parked on the street.

There is an announcing system. You press the door bell, say who's calling and buttons strategically placed open the door.

Many of the rooms are plush. The main floor bathroom is done in red, the walls a pattern of lions.

It wasn't always like this. When the Hatfields were
