## The Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a Judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

**Roberta J.**—Jack looks like a hoodlum.

**Harold J.**—The kid is just going through a stage.

**Roberta J.**—I am very worried about my 15-year-old son Jack. He has taken up with an awful bunch of boys and goes around looking like a hoodlum.

Jack spends hours of dressing, putting a wave in his hair and a duck tail in back. Then he puts on a pair of jeans, a dirty sweater and maybe a leather jacket. That's his costume. It looks awful but it's the only way he'll dress.

Since taking up with these boys he has played hooky several times and hardly ever does any homework. He hasn't gotten into any trouble so far but I'm worried. His father says let him alone.

**Harold J.**—My idea is don't trouble trouble until it troubles you. This is just a stage in the kid's growing up. Jack thinks he's being a regular guy when he puts on his zany costume to go out.

As for playing hooky, my brothers and I did it many times and we all go through high school. Two of my brothers went to college. Boys will be boys. Roberta was brought up in a family of girls and she takes these things too seriously.

I try to laugh the kid out of his hairdo, but it doesn't do much good. I can't figure out why they like that feminine get-up.

**The Council:** Roberta is right to be concerned about her son's manner of dress. The outfit she describes has become virtually a uniform for delinquents and Harold is being unrealistic in the obvious fact.

It is true that not all boys who wear such outfits are equally bad or that all get into the kind of trouble that

creates headlines. Yet the mere wearing of these clothes indicates that trouble exists.

Boys who find satisfaction in schoolwork and wholesome outside activities do not take to this outfit. They may be attracted to a uniform, but they select one that has prestige—athletic's sweaters or military-style outfits. Jack's outfit has been taken on as an antisocial costume. The boy is saying, in effect, that he feels he doesn't rate in the ordinary world but that he belongs to a secret, elect society in which his prestige is high.

Boys cannot be "laughed out" of this style of dress. To them it represents prestige and they consider those who attack it their enemies. The humiliating laughter reinforces their idea that they cannot win status in normal society.

A father's guidance is very important to a boy at this stage. Harold should get over his theory that one should wait for trouble. We live in a far too dangerous world for that today. Even hooky, which may have made for a little amusement when boys went fishing on their day off, becomes a serious matter in a society where boys on the loose look for far more bizarre thrills.

Jack's parents should be more firm about his schoolwork. They should not only see that he does his homework, but that he is encouraged to put his best foot forward on the subjects for which he shows aptitude. He should be encouraged to join supervised group activities and develop his athletic abilities. He should be respected as an individual in his family and be helped to formulate goals for his future.
