Bearcats Whip Miami U. 89-58

It seems a pity that college basketball fans will have to wait until next March for a possible scoring duel between Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson and Jerry Lucas of Ohio State.

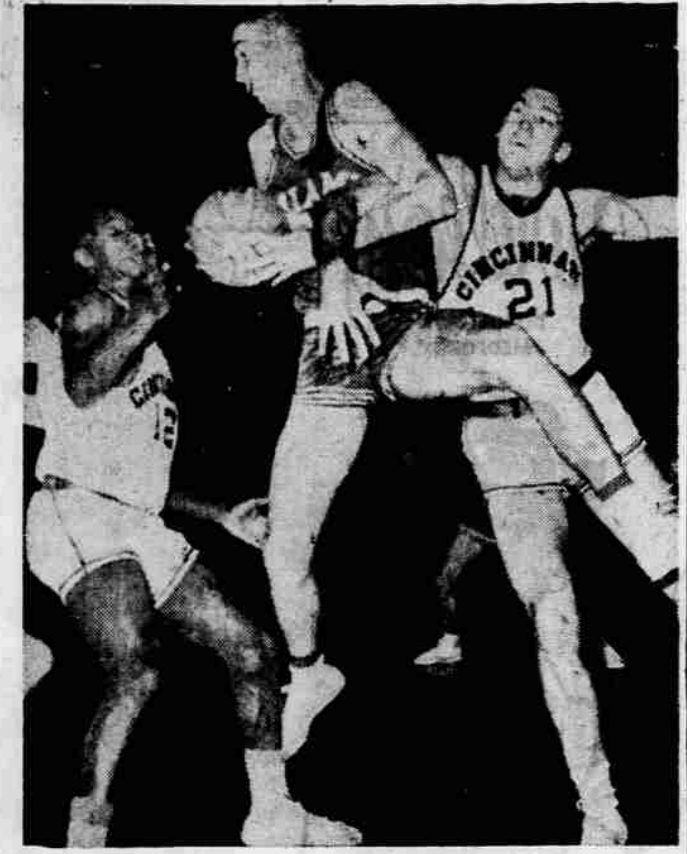
The top-rated Bearcats and fourth-ranked Ohio State are not scheduled to meet during the regular season but they could collide in the NCAA tournament - if they win their respective conference titles.

Meanwhile, Robertson and Lucas are expected to spend their time battling it out for the national scoring championship.

Robertson, who averaged 33.8 points a game while winning the scoring crown the past two seasons, tossed in 36 Monday night as the Bearcats whipped Miami (Ohio), 89-58, while Lucas contributed 26 points in Ohio State's 99-66 victory over Butler.

Although some observers feel Robertson is so good he has lost his desire for the collegiate sport, he still has totalled 124 points in the Bearcats' first three games for a 41.3-point average. And if "Big O" maintains that pace he could erase the major college career of 2,587 points before midterms next month.

Robertson started the new season with a total of 1,962 points. The record he has his sights on was set by Dick Hemric over a four-year span at Wake Forest 1951-55.

49'ers Coach To Pilot West Squad

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Howard (Red) Hickey, coach of the San Francisco Forty Niners football squad, will pilot the Western Division squad for the 10th annual Pro Bowl game Jan. 17.

Hickey's appointment as one of the head coaches for the classic, to be held in the Coliseum, was announced jointly Monday by Paul J. Schissler, managing director of the annual charity game in Los Angeles, and Austin Gunsels, acting commissioner of the National Football league in Philadelphia.

It will mark Hickey's first time as a pro bowl coach. Webb Ewbank of the Baltimore Colts served as the West's coach last year.

Hickey took over as coach at San Francisco when Frankie Albert resigned last year. He formerly had been Albert's No. 1 aide for three years, previously having served on the Los Angeles Rams under Norman Strader.

He was star end for the Rams, both in Cleveland and when they moved to Los Angeles in 1946. The head coach for the Eastern conference team will be named Wednesday.

The West leads the series, 5-4. The East won the ninth game last Jan. 11, 28-21, before 72,500 fans.

Syracuse Rated Top Team; Ole Miss Second, LSU Third

New York - (UPI) - Syracuse university, which compiled major college football's only perfect record in 1959 although it began the season without an experienced quarterback, today was named national champion by United Press International's Board of Coaches.

Syracuse, seriously tested only once en route to a 10-0 record, is the first Eastern school to lead the final balloting for a season since the ratings were inaugurated in 1950. Army's third-place finish last year was the best previous showing by an Eastern team.

Coach Ben Schwartzwalder's Orangemen rolled up 390 points and allowed only 59 although they went through the campaign with two sophomore quarterbacks, Dave Sa-

relle and Dick Easterly.

Ole Miss Second

This performance earned Syracuse 31 first-place votes and a total of 342 points in the final balloting by the 35 leading coaches on the UPI rating board.

Syracuse also received one vote for second, two for third and one for fourth, falling only eight points shy of the maximum possible total of 350. Syracuse posted the third highest point total ever recorded in the final voting by the UPI board. Oklahoma received 346 in 1950 and Michigan State 343 in 1952.

Mississippi received three first-place votes and finished second with 285 points. Louisiana State, named national champion by the coaches last year, placed third with 258. Texas, which will play Syra-

cuse in the Cotton Bowl Jan. 1, was fourth with 247. Mississippi and LSU clash that day in the Sugar Bowl.

Georgia Fifth

Georgia was fifth with 184 points. Wisconsin sixth with 157 and Washington seventh with 121. Washington, Wisconsin's Rose Bowl opponent, received the other first-place vote. Texas Christian was eighth with 103 points, Arkansas ninth with 65, and Penn State 10th with 42.

Syracuse, which ended its regular season last Saturday with a 36-8 triumph over UCLA at Los Angeles, will receive a permanent trophy from UPI.

Clemson headed the second 11 in the final ratings. It was followed in order by Illinois, Alabama, Southern California, Auburn, Michigan State, Oklahoma, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh, Missouri and Florida. Georgia Tech, Navy and Wyoming were the only other teams mentioned on the final ballots.
