

Russian-Made Jets Fly Cover as Ike Lands in Afghanistan

Admitted Killer Of Jack Whalen Claims Defense

Los Angeles - (UPI) - The county Grand Jury met today to determine whether the fatal shooting of Jack (The Enforcer) Whalen in a crowded restaurant was in self defense as his admitted killer claims.

Sam Frank Locigno, 38, accompanied by two attorneys and Joe De Carlo, 35, surrendered to police Tuesday and confessed the fatal shooting last Wednesday of Whalen in nearby Sherman Oaks. De Carlo, who was at the restaurant the night of the shooting, was sought for questioning about the slaying.

Persuaded By Cohen

Mickey Cohen, ex-convict and friend of Locigno, said he had talked to Locigno and De Carlo several days ago and persuaded them to give up to police.

"I induced them to come in to save the taxpayers' money and to save some time and problems for some decent members of the police department," said Cohen.

Cohen and his girl friend, model Sandy Hagen, 18, were among witnesses subpoenaed to testify before the grand jury today.

Panel Investigates

De Carlo, former manager of stripper Candy Barr, and Locigno were sitting at Cohen's table the night of the shooting.

De Carlo went before the grand jury Tuesday shortly after surrendering to police and being released. The panel began its investigation of the shooting Tuesday before Locigno admitted the slaying and it then decided to complete its probe, probably late today.

END OUTBREAK

Brussels, Belgium - (UPI) - Colonial troops have succeeded in temporarily ending a new outbreak of fighting between the rival Lulua and Baluba tribes in the Congo town of Luluaubourg but the state of military emergency has been extended, according to reports here today.

De Gaulle Solves Cabinet Dispute

Paris - (UPI) - President Charles de Gaulle, who smoothed over an inter-cabinet dispute over government aid to Catholic schools, prepared today to fly to Senegal in West Africa to preside over a meeting of the Executive Council of the French Community.

De Gaulle and his wife are scheduled to leave tonight in a specially-fitted plane for St. Louis-du-Senegal, the oldest French city of the African continent.

The council of the French community will meet Friday and Saturday. The agenda calls for talks on economic and aid matters.

Premier Michel Debre and other French government officials will leave for St. Louis Thursday evening to join De Gaulle in the discussions.

De Gaulle Tuesday settled a potentially explosive dispute within the cabinet over the question of government as-

sistance to Roman Catholic parochial schools.

The cabinet, like Frenchmen throughout the country, was divided over whether private Catholic schools should receive increased aid or be incorporated into the national school system.

The dispute was placed before de Gaulle after Debre failed to bring about an accord between the rival factions.

De Gaulle listened to his ministers present their views and then produced a "synthesis" of their arguments which won the cabinet's approval, according to information Minister Robert Frey.

Warsaw, Poland - (UPI) - U. S. Ambassador Jacob D. Beam and Communist Chinese Ambassador Wang Ping-nan met for two hours Tuesday in the protracted talks on Formosa. The discussions began in Sept. 1958.

Friendship Told By King Zahir In Welcome Talk

Kabul, Afghanistan - (UPI) - President Eisenhower landed today in this winter-bound mountain nation at Russia's back door on an airfield patrolled by MIG jets of the Soviet-equipped Afghan air force.

King Zahir and other Afghan and foreign officials were waiting to greet Eisenhower when his special jet touched down at 8:22 a.m. (7:52 p.m. Tuesday, p.s.t.) on the mountain-framed airport.

Six Russian-made MIG-17s - improved models of the jet fighter bested by America's Sabrejets over Korea - circled overhead, providing ceremonial air cover for the visiting Chief of State.

Zahir assured Eisenhower of his "genuine friendship and sincere good wishes" in a brief address of welcome.

"I hope the chill of our early winter will be made up for by the warmth and affection with which our people greet your excellency and your honorable companions," the king said.

Eisenhower replied that "true friendship is not only desirable but essential" in a world where jet planes flash from continent to continent at speeds near - or exceeding - the speed of sound.

"All of us live very close together in the 20th century," he said.

Eisenhower traveled the 38 miles from the airfield to this mile-high capital by car. Five hours later, he returned by helicopter to take off for India.

Weather Clear and Crisp

The weather was clear and crisp, with the temperature just above freezing - a sharp contrast to the snow last week, which was so heavy it was uncertain for a time whether the presidential plane could land here.

A dark-blue overcoat, a muffler and a black fedora shielded the President from the cold.

Turbaned, heavily-robed tribesmen lined the road to applaud as the President passed. An arch of red flags over the road where it joined the main highway to Kabul bore the message "welcome to the President of the United States."

Few Women Appear

In Kabul, flag-waving children whose winter vacation was postponed because of the President's visit, joined the crowds. Few women appeared - reflecting the Moslem tradition that women's place is in the home.

Native bands and long-haired, gowned folk dancers entertained the crowds while they awaited the President's arrival.

The Afghan government has been taking aid from both East and West. The United States has poured millions of dollars into such basic items as education, while the Russians have concentrated on more tangible things.

Time did not permit the President to visit the most ambitious U.S. project now under way in Afghanistan - the multi-million-dollar Helmand river development, miles from Kabul.

Portlander Injured When Hit by Train

Portland - (UPI) - A 54-year-old man was struck by an SPAS train in the Beaverton area about 5 p.m. Tuesday and injured seriously.

The victim was identified as J. C. Stone, Portland. The accident occurred about a quarter of a mile south of Denny road near Progress. Stone received head, chest and back injuries. He was taken to St. Vincent hospital here.

Big Manhunt Staged For Escaped Felons

Yanceyville, N.C. - (UPI) - The biggest manhunt in modern North Carolina history was staged today for 19 psychopathic felons who escaped from the Ivy Bluff maximum security prison.

The search for the heavily armed convicts extended over the entire eastern sector of the nation and into the South and Midwest. The FBI also joined in the hunt.

In central North Carolina, posses searched from farmhouse to farmhouse and from barn to barn.

The fugitives include 14 white men and five Negroes.

One Recaptured

The mass break-out Tuesday by 20 convicts was masterminded by Charles "Yank" Stewart. It was so well planned and executed that more than eight hours elapsed from the time the prisoners gained control of the prison until the alarm was sounded.

One prisoner was recaptured later in the day.

Heretofore the maximum security prison had been considered escape-proof and was reserved for the state's most dangerous and incorrigible prisoners.

Stewart, the ringleader, was described by authorities as a short squat, graying man. His crime career dates back to the 1920s when both his father and brother were executed for the slayings of a detective and an FBI agent.

All Dangerous

Stunned prison officials said the 54-year-old Stewart and his cohorts were the worst of the 41 men incarcerated at Ivy Bluff.

"These men are all dangerous," State Prisons Director W. F. Bailey said. "They're all psychopaths" and are armed with eight high-powered rifles, a submachinegun and eight pistols.

Bailey blamed laxity and failure to follow prescribed rules and regulations for the break-out. He fired three guards on the spot.

Stock List Extends Tuesday's Advance

New York - (UPI) - Stocks extended Tuesday's advance today.

Support for the industrials continued but at a slower pace. The industrial stock average Tuesday moved within three points of the all-time high posted Aug. 3.

Drugs, under severe pressure by the congressional investigation of pricing practices, steadied somewhat during the first hour. Schering and Carter Products fell a point or more, while Merck and Parke-Davis dropped fractions. Pfizer firmed.

Steels had some irregularity. U.S. Steel and Bethlehem were off fractionally. Youngstown and Republic were up a bit.

Idaho Power Asks Permission To Bypass Two Spawning Grounds In Conservation Plan

Washington - (UPI) - The Idaho Power Co. asked the Federal Power Commission Tuesday for permission to bypass two spawning grounds of the Snake river in its three-dam fish conservation program.

The company specifically asked that it be permitted to transport steelhead and salmon from below the proposed Hells Canyon dam upstream past the completed Brownlee dam.

African Missionary Receives Boat

Olivet, Mich. - (UPI) - Friends of the Rev. James Barnard report the African missionary has been successful in a "long range" appeal for a boat.

Barnard, former Assembly of God pastor here who now serves in Liberia, broadcast a shortwave request for a boat he could use to navigate the streams around his mission.

The message was picked up by a ham radio operator in Illinois and the request found its way to a New England congregation which raised funds, bought the vessel and shipped it to Africa.
