Baker —(UPI)—Two suspects in an arson case were released Thursday after a 17-year-old ex-MacLaren school inmate changed his story.

The youth was arrested Wednesday in connection with starting a series of fires in the Richmond, Ore., area. He implicated two young persons from Halfway in the burning of three vacant houses and several cars worth an estimated \$8,000.

The youth at a preliminary hearing Thursday admitted he did not tell the truth when he implicated the others. He also denied having anything to do with the fires.

Locigno Indicted In Whalen Slaying

Los Angeles —(UPI)—Sam Frank Locigno, 38, dinner party pal of ex-convict Mickey Cohen, was indicted Thursday by a county Grand Jury for the slaying of Jack (The Enforcer) Whalen.

Whalen was shot to death Dec. 2 in a crowded Sherman Oaks restaurant while Cohen and his party sat less than six feet away.

The panel returned the indictment after a three-day inquiry into the slaying. Locigno, formerly of Cleveland, surrendered to police while the Grand Jury was meeting Tuesday and admitted the killing. He pleaded self defense.

More Railroad Cars For Christmas Mail Washington —(UPI)—The nation's railroads said today they are making available more than 62,000 cars so that Christmas mail and packages can be moved without a hitch.

If the cars were coupled together, they would stretch about 700 miles or roughly the distance between here and Chicago.

The Post Office department expects a 3 per cent hike in holiday mail volume over last year's six billion cards and packages.

One of Nation's 10 Most Wanted Men Captured

Greenville, S. C. —(UPI)—George Lloyd Thomas, 48, one of the FBI's 10 most wanted men, was seized Thursday night, ending a 15-month masquerade as a quiet-living used car salesman in a small community near here.

He was wanted for holding up the Commercial National Bank in Shreveport, La., Feb. 13, 1959. One of his accomplices in the \$34,000 robbery wounded a woman employee, the FBI said.

Changed Name Thomas and his family moved to the crossroads community called "Ware Place," about 20 miles south of here, in September, 1958. He adopted the name George Clark Ashley, grew a mustache, and enrolled his 6 and 13-year-old daughters in school under new names.

He rented an unpretentious frame house for \$40 a month and set up his used car lot next to it. His nearest neighbor lived a quarter of a mile away.

He was placed on the most wanted list Oct. 21.

No Resistance When FBI agents closed in on him Thursday night he had a loaded .38 calibre revolver strapped to the back of his car radio, two hacksaw blades tied to his legs, and \$125 in his shoes, but he put up no resistance.

He was arraigned in Greenville before U. S. Commissioner Jesse M. Ray and held in \$50,000 bond.

Thomas was arrested when he stopped at a gas station to buy an evening paper, as he had done nearly every night for 15 months. The owner of the station said he seemed "a nice, quiet, pleasant person."

U.S.A. Communists Continue Parley

New York —(UPI)—Behind closed doors in the ballroom of the Theresa Hotel in Harlem, delegates of the 17th national convention of the Communist party U.S.A. today grappled with problems ranging from ways to rejuvenate the party to the "struggle for world peace."

The proceedings were carried on more or less in secrecy. Reporters were barred from the ballroom. The 225 delegates and alternates showed green identification cards containing a number, but not a name, as they were admitted.

Cameo men were excluded during the sessions, on the ground that the taking of pictures would "jeopardize" the delegates.

Occasionally a party spokesman emerged from the convention with handouts for the press, or with some individual who was making himself available for an interview. The four-day convention ends Sunday.

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Oregon Poultry Growers Said Not Using Stilbestrol

By United Press International Oregon and Washington poultry industries do not use a synthetic sex hormone which the federal government says has caused cancer in experimental animals, officials of the two states said today.

Arthur Flemming, secretary of health, education and welfare, announced Thursday a voluntary plan to halt sale of chickens treated with the hormone called stilbestrol. He said scientists had found the chemical to be a potential danger to humans.

Flemming said the treated birds constituted less than one per cent of chickens sent to market.

Further Safeguard Dale Stuart, secretary of the Oregon Fryer Commission, said the hormone has not been used by state poultry growers. He added that a further safeguard for Oregon buyers came from the last Legislature which passed a law stipulating that all poultry imported from out of state must be plainly marked as to point of origin.

"To my knowledge no caponizing of any sort is now going on in the state," he said, adding it wasn't economical.

Joe Dwyer, Washington state agricultural director, said producers in that state decided not to use the agent.

"The only possibility of it appearing on Washington markets," he said, "would be had a loaded .38 calibre southern states in frozen form."
