Trend of Factories To Be Away From Cities Expected To Grow

Washington — UPI — The commerce department said today that more and more factories are being set up away from the big cities. It expects the trend to grow.

A majority of industries still are concentrated in or near large population centers. But the department found plants being located increasingly in communities with less than 50,000 population.

The department aired its conclusions in releasing an 86-page statistical study relating 446 industries to city size.

The study, based on the 1954 census of manufacturers, showed that 27.1 per cent of all manufacturing employees worked outside standard metropolitan areas. This compared to 26.7 per cent in 1947.

More Marked Shifts Seen
Officials of the department's office of area development, which prepared the report, expected results of the 1958 census of manufacturers to show further, more marked shifts of factories away from big city areas.

Lloyd Black, of the study's authors, told UPI some of the factors causing the trend included:

—Population growth and the fanning out of suburbs around industrial centers.

—Greater mobility of people, stemming from widespread use of cars and highway improvements, such as the 41,000-mile interstate highway system now under construction. With people willing to drive 40 or 50 miles to work, factories with large labor forces need not be located in densely populated places.

More Space Required
—The desire of manufacturers for more space, to allow for future expansion, and to permit making the work site attractive by landscaping. In addition, there is a growing preference for having a factory all on one level.

—A trend toward smaller production units, with smaller labor requirements.

Black said a good example of the trend toward suburban plant locations was the recent industrialization along highway 128 outside Boston.

Officials said the study should help communities with chronic unemployment problems by giving them an idea of what kind of industry they might attract. Further studies to help such towns are planned.

Industries Listed
Of the 446 industries covered, 74 had more than half their employment outside metropolitan areas. Industries tending to locate in smaller cities and towns included beet sugar, woolen and worsted fabrics, plywood, wood furniture, synthetic fibers, salt, flat glass, primary zinc and aluminum, aircraft propellers, paper and paperboard.

Tending to concentrate in or near large population centers were printing and publishing, rubber products, fabricated metal, instruments, machine tools, prepared meats.
