Policeman's Killer Sentenced to Death

Redwood City, Calif.—UPI—Alexander Robillard, confessed killer of a Hillsborough, Calif., patrolman, was condemned to death in the gas chamber by a jury Saturday night.

The jury of nine men and three women, deliberating only on whether the 19-year-old slayer should die or receive a life sentence, announced its verdict after a day and a half of deliberation.

The jury was locked up last night after getting the case at noon, telling Judge B. Blum at the time that it was split 9-3 but without saying what verdict it favored.
Robillard pleaded guilty to shooting patrolman Gene Doran to death when the officer stopped him for questioning on a lonely road early the morning of Aug. 5.

Steelworkers' Boss Raps Latest Offer

Cleveland, Ohio—UPI—United Steelworkers President David J. McDonald, labeling management's latest offer "a fake and a fraud," Saturday predicted the steelworkers would overwhelmingly reject it when a secret vote was held.

McDonald, speaking to nearly 1,000 leaders of the 28th district here, charged the steel industry with destroying the good relations with the union.

He predicted that the industry would "never turn the United Steelworkers of America into a company union," adding that management was trying to turn back the clock 20 years.

"I have challenged them (management) before," he said. "I will challenge them again to come out of their ivory towers and get a new contract for the steelworkers."
