The bride is the former Nettie Blanche White of Kokoma, Ind. For the ceremony she wore a white silk frock.

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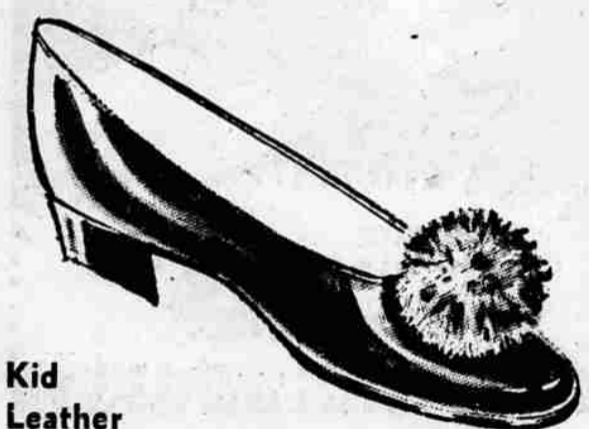

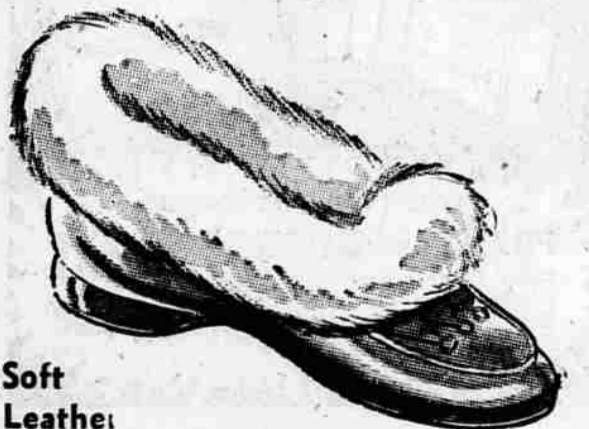

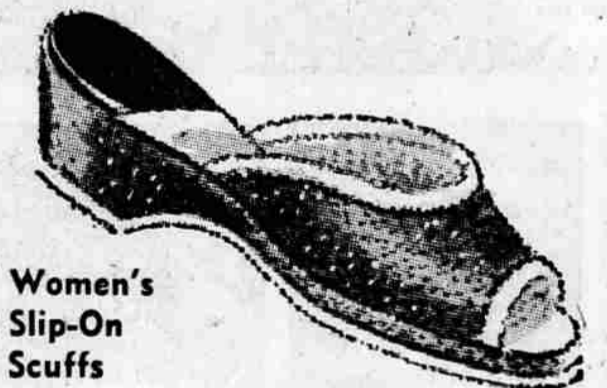
