State Democrats Oppose Sales Tax

Salem — (UPI) — The members of the Democratic State Central committee meeting here Saturday voted to oppose a sales tax in any form.

The committee passed a similar resolution last April. In other action the committee took a step toward resolving years of bickering between the Multnomah County Democratic committee and the state body involving distribution of money from party dinners.

The state committee, including representatives from Multnomah county, agreed to try a formula for six months whereby a different proportionment would go into effect.

Multnomah county Democratic officials have complained in the past its group has not been getting enough money out of state party dinners.

Party Chairman, Sen. Robert Straub, Eugene, said the party will need \$50,000 between now and the general election in 1960 for campaign expenses in Oregon.

The Medical Roundup

WHIP-LASH INJURIES

One of the common complaints today is of pain in the neck and perhaps back of the head — pain followed a so-called whip-lash injury, sustained by someone in a car when it was rammed from behind by another car.

I recently read in the J.A.M.A. a good article on this by Dr. Charles J. Frankel, of Charlottesville, Va. As he said, one of the sad features of this type of injury is that it has become such a football of attorneys in court.

In hundreds of cases, it is hard for even expert orthopedists and neurologists to guess how much of a man's pain is due to the injury and how much is due to his grave anxiety over how his lawsuit is going to come out. His medical and his legal expenses have climbed so high now he says that unless he wins his suit, he'll be left a pauper.

His wife may tell us that he is now walking the floor at night.

What impresses me and my fellow physicians is that if we, who have been trained all

our lives to see our way through such difficult problems, cannot decide how much of the man's pain is due to physical injury and how much to anxiety, how can earth can a jury made up of good people who have absolutely no knowledge of medicine be expected to make the correct estimate? Why should we expect them to be sure, when an old physician like me would hate to hazard a guess?

There is no question, of course that many good sensible people, with a whip-lash injury and no lawsuit to worry them sick, keep suffering severely for months.

But there is no question, also, that many a person who, after the accident gets terribly worried about his lawsuit, gets such an aggravation of symptoms, and perhaps even so much hysteria, that he becomes a very sick man.

What we doctors know is that often such a man-whose honesty we did not question—got well the day his lawsuit was settled in his favor. Another fact that we doctors know is that often a man who can see with x-rays has a severe injury to his neck and who should have terrible pain, does not complain at all. This may be because he is an insensitive person who cannot feel much pain, or he is the type of person who can't be bothered to fuss about his health.

Many a time I have easily talked one of my old friends and patients out of suing for a slight injury after an auto accident.

My argument was that he was such a worrisome person that prolonged litigation over his health might easily throw him into a miserable state of ill health. The man and his wife agreed entirely with me, and hence they did not go to law.
