GI Scholarships To Cold War Veterans Committee Problem

Washington—UPI—The House Veterans Affairs committee says the big question facing it next year is: should the government provide GI scholarships to veterans of the cold war?

Committee sources said they already have received more spontaneous mail on the subject this year than on any other matter.

Educational benefits are included in a peacetime GI bill which the Senate passed over objections of President Eisenhower last July. The measure is pending before the House committee which plans to hold hearings on it some time after Congress reconvenes in January.

The measure, sometimes called the "cold war GI bill," is patterned after the bill of rights for veterans of World War II and Korea. Although it contains numerous other benefits, committee sources said attention has centered on its allowances for college or other education.

Nearly all of the 2,000 letters the committee has received deal with the educational benefits. Many came from parents or wives of peacetime service men.

The bill would provide a variety of benefits for veterans of 180 days active duty between Jan. 31, 1955, when the Korean War was officially ended, and July 1, 1963, when the draft law is due to expire.

Peacetime veterans would be entitled to one and one-half days of schooling or on-the-job training for each day of service. Veterans would get a monthly education allowance of \$110 if single, \$135 if married, and \$160 if they have more than one dependent.

\$4,000 Scholarship
Thus a veteran with 24 months' active duty could draw an allowance for 36 months of schooling, or enough for a full college education. A committee source said this would amount to a federal scholarship of nearly \$4,000.

Under one provision of the Senate bill, a veteran would lose his educational allowance if his grades fell below the top half of his class. The veteran then could seek a loan, which he would not have to repay if his grades moved back up.

The bill also authorizes vocational training and rehabilitation.

itation, and loans and guarantees for purchase of homes, farm and farm equipment. Backers of the bill contend that the "cold war" GIs are entitled to the benefits because they are subject to the draft and to being sent all over the world, including hardship posts.

Opponents argue that benefits for peacetime veterans are not justified because they do not face the same hazards and difficulties as wartime servicemen.

Iowa Voters To Pick Congressman

Des Moines, Iowa—UPI—Voters went to the polls today to select a congressman in a special election which may show how farm belt sentiment will line up in the 1960 elections.

A fairly light vote was expected in a 14-county district where voters will name a congressman to fill the vacancy created by the death Nov. 4 of Rep. Steven V. Carter (D-Iowa).

Carter became the first Democrat to win election in the corn-and-hog producing area of south-central Iowa. He served a year before his death.

Two relative newcomers to politics were bidding to succeed Carter—Democratic state Sen. C. Edwin Gilmour, 41, a Grinnell College political science professor, and Republican John Kyl, 40, a Bloomfield clothing merchant and radio-TV newscaster.

Makarios Winner In Cyprus Election

Nicosia, Cyprus—UPI—Archbishop Makarios won a sweeping victory in Sunday's election to become the first president of an independent Cyprus republic, a final tally of votes showed today.

The Greek Cypriot archbishop, only a year ago exiled from Cyprus by the British, won the election with 144,000 votes compared to 71,000 for his rival, John Cerides.

A hundred thousand Cypriots gathered beneath a balcony of Makarios' bishopric roared approval for four minutes Monday night when it was officially announced the archbishop had won the election.

Field Man Named By Planning Group

Portland—UPI—Rupert W. Kennedy, The Dalles, has been named as industrial field representative for the State Department of Planning and Development.

Kennedy's first job will be in eastern Oregon where he will work with communities, civic groups and business and industry to assist in all phases of economic development. He has been active in industrial development at The Dalles and was named that city's "Man of the Year" in 1953 by the Chamber of Commerce.
