Tips on Holiday Phone Calls Made

Planning to make a Christmas telephone call to the folks back home?

If you are, here are some suggestions to help make sure your call goes through to its destination from Pacific Telephone's Medford Manager, J. H. Creager.

"Make your call on the Sunday preceding Christmas or an evening prior to Christmas Eve. The same low rates that are in effect on holidays apply then also," Creager said.

Voice paths to America's many smaller towns or rural communities are the ones most likely to become clogged by holiday calls. He especially urged calls to these points be made early.

About a third more than the normal number of operators will be on duty throughout Oregon and extra long distance circuits will be used in an effort to meet the Christmas Day rush.

Despite these efforts Creager said many callers on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day will probably meet delays and be disappointed.

Valley Man Retires From Railroad Firm

Guy J. Holman, Valley View rd., retired Nov. 30 after serving 37 years and two months as a car inspector for the Southern Pacific company. Holman, who was born at Clatskanie, Ore., worked the entire period in the valley area.

Following his retirement, other employees who had worked with Holman presented him with a gift of money. Mr. and Mrs. Holman live on a small farm where he plans to spend the majority of his time caring for his sheep and cattle.

Portland Plans Tax Base Boost

Portland - UPI - The City Council Wednesday approved a proposed 10-year plan for a \$3 million tax base increase which will go to the voters in May.

Approval of the increase would mean Portland residents in 1960 would pay an additional \$3.59 for every \$100 on total property tax paid in 1959.

Finance Commissioner Ormond Bean said the increase would raise the tax base from \$11,560,000 to \$14,560,000. He said the new figure is still less than the base would have been if the city had taken the annual 6 per cent increase allowed by law.

The 10-year program, Bean said, would not bind future councils, and would be subject to change. He said however, public hearings would be held if the council plans major deviations from its announced plan.

Eagle Point Scouts Help in Toy Project

Camp White - The repair and painting of toys by disabled veterans in manual arts therapy at the VA Domiciliary was given a spur by the announcement of a new project started by the Boy Scouts of Eagle Point.

The boys of Scout Troop and Cub Pack 43, have signified their cooperation with the domiciliary and local churches in assembling discarded toys and sending them to the Camp White "work shop" after which they will be distributed.

The Eagle Point school and the fire house will receive the toys gathered in by the youngsters.

This project was started a year ago at Camp White as a Yuletide undertaking and has become a continuous operation, depending upon the supply of toys needing repair, Manager H. C. Herzog stated.

Alleys Need to Report Addresses

Portland - An estimated 20,000 aliens will report their address in Oregon in January under the federal alien address program, according to William L. Pattillo, acting district director of the immigration and naturalization service.

He said that 18,221 aliens reported their address during January, 1959. The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, to report their address during each January.

Throughout the United States almost 30 per cent more applications for naturalization are received during January, February and March than during other months.

Aliens not required to make the report are diplomats, those accredited to certain international organizations, and those who have entered temporarily as agricultural laborers.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all post offices and offices of the immigration and naturalization service at Portland during January.

Aliens desiring information concerning naturalization or similar matters should obtain forms at an office of the immigration and naturalization service where they are trained personnel, Pattillo said.
