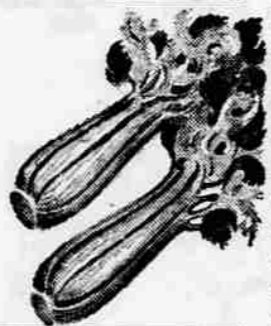

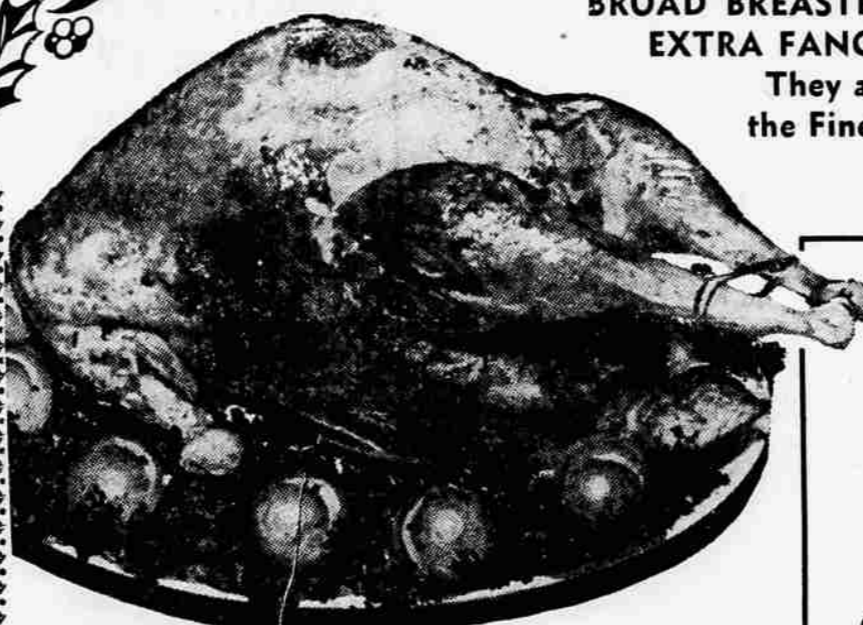

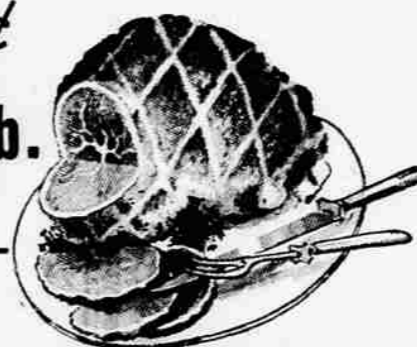

Baker, vice president in charge of research and area development at K-BESTV, who testified on "Commercial Aspects Affecting TV Program Schedules;" Mrs. Randall Perkins, a parent, who testified for the defense and Miss Sue Strong, a sophomore at Butte Falls High school, whose testimony was from the viewpoint of the students concerned.

At the December meeting of the Butte Falls PTA, the group will decide upon a money-making project and the possibility of forming a mothers' singing group. The second and third grades won the room count, both having 50 per cent parent attendance at the meeting. Following the program, refreshments were served in the cafeteria by the third grade mothers.

The Christmas exchange party of the Butte Falls Lions auxiliary was held Dec. 1 at the home of Mrs. Duane Smeltzer. Lady Lions helped the Lions with their Christmas tree project Dec. 6 and served refreshments. Cats and dogs as well as cattle are the main reservoir for ringworm infection in humans, a professor of veterinary medicine told the American Academy of Dermatology and Syphilology meeting here.

In recent years, there has been greater recognition of fungus skin infections, including scabies, in animals. Dr. Frank Kral of the University of Pennsylvania said. So far oral treatment of afflicted animals with griseofulvin tablets has been found quite effective in controlling the infections.

The veterinary school is cooperating with the medical school on this subject of common transmissibility of diseases between man and animals.
