Hoop Classic
Has Afternoon
Deal for Kids

Oregon State College, Corvallis — Several hundred youngsters will help swell crowds for the three afternoon sessions of the Far West Classic in basketball on Dec. 26-28-29, business manager Jim Barratt reported.

A "Kiwanis Kids" day program, whereby grade school and high school students in groups of 10 or more will be admitted to afternoon games at a low rate has been worked out by tournament officials and corresponding groups.

The youngsters will see the first round games of the championship bracket on Saturday afternoon, Dec. 26, with Oregon State opening against Border conference champion New Mexico State university at 2 p.m. The University of Portland plays Idaho in the afternoon finale at 4 p.m.

Organized

Saturday games, not included in the kid's program, will see Washington State playing Hawaii at 7:30 p.m. followed by Oregon and Denver university at 9:30 p.m.

Corvallis businessmen have organized the entire student body sections of Corvallis high and Highland junior high. Youngsters will be sponsored for the Saturday afternoon games by Corvallis merchants, bankers and auto dealers.

Consolation games will be played on Monday and Tuesday afternoons, Dec. 28 and 29, with championship tilts continuing those evenings.

Phone reservations for tickets will be accepted by calling Plaza 3-7501 in Corvallis. This is the first time Classic officials have invited an eight-team field, and Oregon is serving as co-host with Oregon State for the 1959 show.

Medford Downs South Eugene
For 1st Hoop Win of Season

Medford High school's maelstrom aggregation made its home debut a successful one Friday night by bouncing the South Eugene Axemen 67 to 52.

The Black Tornado was on top all the way in the encounter played before a sparse crowd at Hedrick Junior high gym. Heavy fog which blanketed the area kept many fans at home.

Victory was the first in three games this season for the Tornado which dropped a pair on an Oregon coast road trip last week end. Medford, in whipping the Axemen, handed South Eugene its first setback in five engagements.

All-star Jerry Anderson spurred the Black Tornado with his pointmaking and scrap under the back-

boards. Jerry Shults gave Medford added firepower, particularly in the early going and late third quarter. He

Basketball campaigning by the Medford high Black Tornado will continue next Tuesday with a trip to Roseburg.

The Roseburg club nipped Grants Pass 55 to 54 on Friday, erasing a 46 to 39 third period deficit. Score was tied 13 each at the quarter and Grants Pass led 35 to 19 at halftime. Playing on their home court, the Indians were aided by free heaves, making 27 of 42 while Grants Pass managed 10 of 28.

Rex Benner had 17 points for GP and Lynn Baxter 14 for Roseburg with eight on gift tosses.

Ken Durkee contributed some fine floor play and defensive work and the rebounding of Booth Deakins and rugged play of Lowell Dean helped shape the win.

South Eugene had sharper shooting but fired less often than the Black Tornado and were spearheaded by Sandy Nosler, Bo Blair and Nick Carter.

A 22-point third quarter just about determined the issue for Medford. The tabulation gave the Tornado a 50 to 38 margin at the end of the stanza as it doubled the 11-11 margin output of the Axemen. SE cut the difference to 50 to 40 on a Carter rebounder at the start of the final period but Anderson dumped in a rebound shot and Deakins another field goal and a free shot for 55 to 40. Medford led by 15 points on three other occasions after that and its gap was never less than 11.

First quarter of the scuffle ended 16 to 12 with Medford leading. Buckets by Anderson, Bob Quinney and Shults ran it up to 22 to 12 for Medford's widest spread of the first half. Then the Axemen got busy. They cashed in short and long with Dave Toby collecting seven of the points and Nosler six. The Tornado was on top

by a bare 28 to 27 at the half-time horn.

In the third canto Medford hit on all five as Shults put in eight counters and Anderson seven to lead the attack. Dean pushed in a couple of field shots from the side for the good of the cause and Durkee had the other three points of the total.

South Eugene gunners were dangerous through the fracas when given a good opportunity but the aggressive Tornado kept those chances to the minimum, especially disrupting the Axemen attack in the final stages of the evening.

Anderson, whose slick moves were frequent during the evening, potted 20 points for the Black Tornado while Shults totaled 16 before fouling out in the opening seconds of the fourth quarter. Nosler topped the Axemen effort with 17 tallies.

In retrieving the ball from the backboards, Anderson had 14 snares, Nosler 11, Blair nine and Deakins eight.

Medford high sophomores, led by Dick Griffin's 12 points, defeated St. Mary's junior varsity 47 to 26 in the preliminary. The sophs headed 27 to 7 at half-time.

Portland fought its way into the finals with a 63-46 victory over San Diego State and Manhattan stamped itself as favorite by demolishing Gonzaga's Bulldogs, 91-73.

Portland had little trouble with the Aztecs. The Pilots held a 36-22 halftime advantage and Coach Al Negretti used his reserves most of the second half.

Jim Altenhofen was high for the Pilots with 19 points followed by Bill Garner with 12. Jim Doherty had 16 for the losers.

Manhattan struggled with the Bulldogs in the first half and then turned on the steam in the second half. At one point in the second half Manhattan led by 28 points — 87-59.

Bob Mealy topped all scorers with 29 points. Gonzaga's all-American candidate Frank Burgess had 28 points.

Only Bears Win
In Coast Series

Far Western basketball, which has been second to none for the past half-dozen years or so, crumbled Friday night in a series of inter-sectional disasters which saw only a scared University of California quintet manage to come up with a win.

Even the fourth-rated Bears were almost toppled in Friday night's action. They needed all their famed poise to overcome a cold shooting night and a hot-handed Colorado team. Cal won, 51-47.

The Bulls were down 27-21 at half-time, but suddenly exploded to grab a 45-40 lead late in the contest. But veteran forward Bill McClintock sparked a last - ditch Bear comeback by twice stealing the ball. He and an effective full-court press saved the bacon for the Bears.

Elsewhere, the Pacific Coast quintets walked the plank. College of Pacific received for its first setback when it fell before Wyoming, 59-50, at Laramie. Leroy Wright scored 15 for COP while Terry Hapel paced the Cowboys with 19 markers.

UCLA lost a heartbreaker to Purdue as the Boilermakers

surged back from a 14 point deficit to edge the Bruins, 75-74. Junior center John Berberich led the green UCLA club with 19 points. But Jerry Dischinger's 27 points were two too many for the Bruins.

Washington State fell before Utah State, 72-58. It was Utah's fifth win in six starts as Jerry Schofield tossed in 17.

Even the home court advantage could not help the West. Iowa State invaded Washington for two games and won the opener, 60-56. Winnie Brewer took scoring honors with 22 while George Grant paced the losers with 17.
