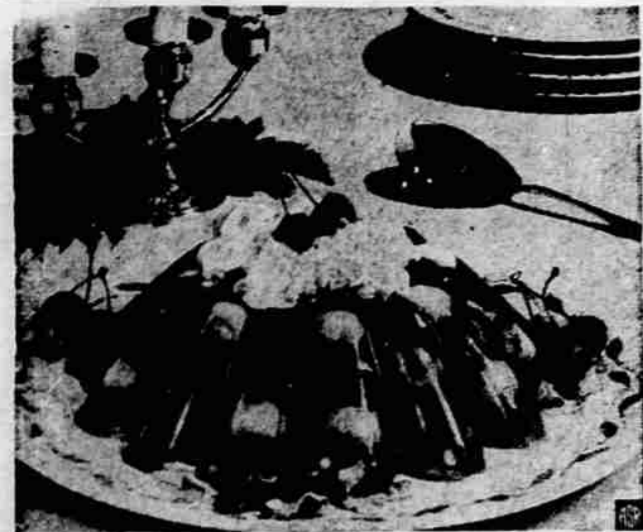


**Santa Will Wash**

**Bing Cherry Salad Supreme**

- 1 package black cherry-flavored gelatin
- 1 cup hot water
- Cherry juice and water to make 1 cup
- 1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese
- 1 cup chopped drained canned Bing cherries
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans
- 1/4 cup sliced stuffed olives

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add juice and cold water. Chill until slightly thickened. Form cheese into small balls. Fold cherries, pecans, olives and cream cheese balls into gelatin. Pour into 1-quart mold or individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve on crisp greens and garnish with whipped cream mayonnaise, if desired. Makes 7 servings.

**Ordination Service Scheduled Monday**

Two men will be ordained to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James W. F. Carman, bishop of Oregon, at St. Mark's Episcopal church Monday.

The Rev. Philip Armour Getchell and the Rev. Duane S. Alvord will receive the imposition of hands by the Bishop and other clergy present during the ordination service at 10:30 a.m.

The Rev. Mr. Getchell, who was a candidate for Holy Orders from the church here, will be presented to the Bishop by the Rev. George R. V. Bolster, rector of St. Mark's. The Rev. Mr. Alvord will be presented by the Rev. George Swift, rector of St. Paul's church, Salem.

Preacher for the service will be the Rev. Robert T. Fortna, professor of New Testament Greek and director of the extension program at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, Calif.

Other clergy During the service, the preface will be read by the Rev. John S. Thompson III, rector of Trinity Church, Ashland. The litanist will be the Rev. Albert J. Sayers, rector of St. Luke's church, Grants Pass. The epistoler will be the Rev. John S. Power, vicar at Prospect and Shady Cove and the Rev. Loren Bush, vicar at Riddle and Myrtle Creek, will serve as gospeller.

The choir of St. Mark's church will sing for the service, augmented by visiting clergymen. The choir, under the direction of John Drysdale, will sing "Let Thy Holy Presence" at the offertory. Mrs. Marguerite Conrad, St. Mark's organist, will play for the service.

The Rev. Mr. Getchell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bayard Getchell, 28 Ashland ave. He attended Stanford university, Fuller Theological seminary, Pasadena, and the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, where he received his bachelor of divinity degree in June.

He is presently serving as curate at St. Matthew's church, Portland.

**Assistant Here** The Rev. Mr. Alvord, who is serving as assistant to the rector at St. Mark's, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank A. Alvord, Oregon City.

He attended Willamette university and the Church Divinity School of the Pacific where he received his degree in June.

Both men were ordained deacons June 17, at St. Stephen's Cathedral, Portland, by Bishop Carman.

Red apple cups make holiday salads festive. Scoop out a delicious, rome or winesap apple, filling it with a tasty fruit salad or chopped apple, white grapes, marshmallows, and chopped nuts. Top with mayonnaise, a sprig of mint.

Tart cooking apples, such as winesaps, hold shape well for red and green Christmas apple rings, so decorative around turkey or ham. Simmer unpeeled apple rings in sugar-water syrup, tinted red or green, until clear and colorful.
