Pickin' Pears

Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon college, was the guest of Manager Henry C. Herzog Dec. 17. His tour of the domiciliary included luncheon and appearance at the Garden club party. Ira L. Pollard, president of the Camp White Garden club, had invited the readers and writers and other interested members to attend the event. He announced a trip scheduled Jan. 22, and mentioned a gift received from Astoria. Another member reported on their "project" saying that 175 potted plants were thriving. Chief Librarian Enid Holmes told of material in the library which would be helpful to flower growers.

Herzog introduced Dr. Stevenson, who discussed the geology of the Rogue River valley, pointing out how the rock and soil formations and former climatic conditions affect the present day animal and plant life. One of the ancient specimens of 60 or 70 millions of years ago was an elephant's tooth. The valley once was a semi-tropical environment, he said. He explained the phenomenon of gold in Jacksonville when the Siskiyou mountains were born 50 or 70 million years ago. About 40 million years ago, he said, volcanoes occurred in the Cascades. Trees thrived between basins and accumulated lakes to the Rocky Mountains were formed on areas of land that tilted. Domesticated or modern horse appeared on the earth. Then lava began to flow and glaciers began to melt and wash the plateau down from Crater lake. Four different glacial periods over a span of a million and a half years washed the valley down from 5,000 feet to its present level. Mt. Mazama stood 16,000 feet high at the beginning of the "washing away" era. Table Rock stands in the valley as evidence of the glacial periods. Dr. Stevenson dramatized the magnitude of his subject by again referring to the Elephant tooth, pointing out its size.
