The Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a Judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Mrs. N. S.—He wants to marry a tramp.
Bob S.—She deserves a chance.

Mrs. N. S.—My husband and I are desperate because our only son has decided to marry a girl who is known as a real tramp in our community.

Bob S. is 20 and just out of the Navy. He got a good job and we were hoping he'd wait a few years before getting married, but it was just a matter of weeks before he started seeing Ina. The first thing we knew he was talking about marriage.

This girl is known as one of the wildest in Bob's high school class. She was away from our community for six months and everyone knows she had an illegitimate child in that time. We cannot understand how a boy from a fine home like ours would want to have a wife like that. Ina is pretty, but that's all that can be said for her on the good side.

Bob S.—Half the things said about Ina are lies. It isn't true that she had an illegitimate child. She stayed at her aunt's home in another state because her stepfather said he didn't want her around any longer. Then her mother got rid of her husband and Ina came home again.

All Ina's problems come from this stepfather of hers. He was always mean to her and as a result she used to run

to her too because she hated Ina's father and used to say she was just like him. Ina never had decent chance.

Since she met me Ina has been different. She said she never before knew anybody who was good to her. I know she hasn't been an angel, but she deserves a chance.

The Council: We agree with Bob that Ina deserves a chance for a decent life, but we cannot tell whether he is the best one to give it to her or whether she is ready for it.

A girl like Ina could have a strong appeal for a fine boy from a good home simply because she has a sympathetic nature. Her helplessness in the face of problems makes a strong appeal to his manliness. Unfortunately, however, helplessness on the part of either partner is not a good sign of preparedness for marriage.

In order to make a good marriage, both partners should have had a little successful experience in dealing with life. They should have the kind of experience that involves building character and independence. Bob's Navy experience may have been good, but more is needed. At 20 he cannot possibly have developed much emotional maturity or wisdom in dealing with difficulties.

So far all of Ina's experience has been bad and destructive. It is possible that she strongly desires a better life, but from Bob's account she hasn't yet done much to acquire it. It is natural for her to think in terms of making a good marriage, but she must realize that the step from harsh experience to a happy life is not quite so simple. Our guess is that Ina needs a couple of years of decent living and honest work before she is prepared for marriage.

We strongly recommend that Bob wait to see if Ina is ready for her chance—and if he is prepared to deal with a marriage that is likely to present some unusual difficulties. (Copyright 1959, General Features Corp.)

Range management techniques were emphasized at a training session for Medford district foresters of the bureau of land management last week.

Leading discussions on range improvement and adjudication of conflicting lease applications were Edward C. Booker and George D. Lea, range specialists in BLM's state office in Portland.

Procedures for the determination of the amounts of forage that can be leased on a sustained-yield basis were reviewed by Mark L. Lawrence, forester in the Medford district's south administrative unit.

John A. Carnegie, assistant district manager in operations, led discussions on grazing lease administration. Rates applicable for next season which are based on 1959 livestock prices will be announced in February.

Administrative unit personnel responsible for range management attended the training school which was arranged by Robert D. Hostetter, assistant district manager in plans, according to District Manager Ross A. Youngblood.

'Short Term' Disability Explained By Jacobson

Temporary disabling injury or illness does not qualify a person for disability payments under the social security program, according to Edward B. Jacobson, district manager of the Medford office of the Social Security Administration.

The office receives frequent inquiries from persons suffering from "short term" disabilities, who are under the impression that they may qualify for temporary benefits. On the other hand, some persons who would meet the disability requirements have failed to apply for benefits because they are not completely incapacitated.

The basic requirements for payments are that the applicant must be 50 years of age, have a disability which prevents "any substantial gainful activity" and is expected to be "of long continued and indefinite duration," Jacobson explained.

In addition, the applicant must have had five years work under social security during the 10 years just prior to becoming disabled. Persons under 50 years of age who meet the disability requirements may apply to have their earnings record "frozen" as of the date they became disabled.

Anyone meeting the work requirements, who has become so disabled that prospects of returning to regular employment are indefinite, is urged to call at the nearest social security office to discuss his or her case. The office serving this area is located at 1005 East Main st., Medford.

NATIONAL FOREST TIMBER

Dry Creek No. 1
Oral auction bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, or his authorized representative at the office of the District Ranger, Forest Office Building, Klamath Falls, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p.m., January 22, 1960, for all merchantable timber marked or designated for cutting on an area embracing 100 acres, more or less, within Section 34, T. 35 N., W. 3 E., W.M., surveyed in the Rogue River National Forest, Klamath County, Oregon. The estimated volume is 1,100 M board feet of pine species, 400 M board feet of white fir and other species. The minimum acceptable bid per M board feet is as follows: pine species \$38.10, white fir and other species \$19.25. This includes the following rates, per M board feet for stumpage including disposal for sale area betterment: pine species \$34.55, white fir and other species \$15.70. Sealed bids will be publicly opened and posted at Room 202, Post Office Building, Klamath Falls, Oregon, at 2:00 p.m., January 22, 1960. All those who submit a satisfactory sealed bid will be permitted immediately to continue auction bidding. A money order or cash, cashier's check or certified check in the sum of \$4,000.00 must accompany each bid. Bids will be applied to the purchase, refunded, or retained for application to any claim for damages, according to the conditions and terms of the purchase contract. If requested by the purchaser, contract terms will permit felling of timber in advance of payment up to the value of the performance bond. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately confirm the oral bid by submitting it in writing on Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Forest Service bid forms for use in submitting sealed bids and full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the District Ranger, Klamath Falls, Oregon, or the Forest Supervisor, Medford, Oregon, before bids are submitted.
