Ashlander 'Operates' On Children's Toys

Ashland—Mrs. Guy Applewhite of 112 Nob Hill, Ashland, may not have attended medical school, but she's a skilled surgeon when it comes to restoring life to children's dolls and teddy bears.

During the past five months, Mrs. Applewhite "operated" on nearly 130 dolls and about 50 stuffed toys

which will be distributed to needy children in the Ashland area as part of an annual American Legion project.

Mrs. Applewhite, an Ashland resident since 1924, has helped with the Legion's Christmas project for the past 15 years, she said, but never before has she repaired so many toys.

Delivery Christmas Eve
Cooperating in other phases of the project are members of the Ashland fire department, who repair toys, and residents of Camp White veterans' domiciliary, who paint them. On Christmas eve, Legion members will deliver the toys, dolls and stuffed animals to more than 150 children who otherwise probably would receive no gifts.

Some of the dolls and stuffed animals donated to the project and turned over to Mrs. Applewhite seemed to have little life left in them, she said, but she started from scratch and made most of them look as good as they did when they were on display in toy departments.

Often she had to use pieces—arms, legs, heads and bodies—from several mutilated dolls in order to make one presentable one.

She also removed the stuffing from each padded animal, laundered the "hide" and added new stuffing.

The freshly-washed "hides" hanging on the clothes line caused considerable curiosity among their neighbors, according to Mrs. Applewhite's husband, Guy.

"They wondered what kind of stew we were having for dinner," he chuckled.

Labor-Employer Group to Check Strike-Breakers

Salem — (UPI) — The Legislative Interim committee on Labor - Management Relations Friday voted to look into the matter of the "use of professional strike-breakers" in Oregon.

The vote was unanimous and there was no discussion.

The motion was made by Senate President Walter Pearson (D-Portland), who suggested the committee investigate the situation at its next meeting.

Although the Portland newspaper strike was not named in the motion, that dispute was taken to be the reason for the action.

Immediate Action

Pearson said he believed the question came within the jurisdiction of the committee and was a problem that had to be looked into "immediately."

"This problem does not necessarily involve the Portland newspaper strike," Pearson said, "but all segments of the industry. Representatives of other news media should be invited to the hearing so that the question can be properly discussed."

Brown Is Witness

George Brown, political director of the AFL-CIO in Oregon, was the only witness.

He said he did not expect the committee to go into "the merits or demerits of the strike in Portland involving newspapers." But he said the question that the committee should consider "is whether professional strike-breakers are to be used in Oregon."

Involves All Industry

Brown said the matter "involves future relations between labor and management in Oregon, in all industry."

Two committee members were absent. They were Professor Richard Jones of Portland and the industry representative, Hilman Luddemann, Portland. Other members of the committee besides Pearson are Sen. Harry Boivin (D-Klamath Falls), chairman; House Speaker Robert Duncan (D-Medford); Rep. Ed Whalan (D-Portland); Sen. Robert F. White (R-Salem); Rep. William J. Callagher (R-Portland), and Carl Gilson of Portland, labor representative.

PUC Commissioner Asks More Lawyers

Salem — (UPI) — Oregon Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill said Saturday what he wants most of Christmas are some more qualified lawyers for the PUC staff.

He said more "highly competent" lawyers are needed to augment his staff to try a backlog of cases now pending before the PUC. Hill said that the Civil Service commission list of examiners had been exhausted.

New Boating Laws Stated for Jan. 1

Salem (UPI) — A synopsis of the new Oregon boating laws which go into effect Jan. 1 is available now to the public, according to the Oregon Marine board.

The board said that the forms for identifying boat number, annual boat license and certificate of title were available at the offices of county sheriffs, state motor vehicle field offices and various boat dealers throughout the state.

As of Jan. 1, the Coast Guard will discontinue issuing boat numbers to Oregon boats and only those issued by the State Marine board will be valid. The Oregon laws apply to vessels 11 feet and longer and to those having motors of 10 horsepower or more, regardless of size.
