Psychosomatic Ailments Bother Many Patients

Richmond, Va. (Science Service)—At least 20 per cent of the patients a general practitioner sees are suffering from purely psychosomatic ailments, most of which can be successfully treated with a new antidepressant drug.

This was reported in the December issue of the Virginia Medical Journal by Dr. L. Floyd Hobbs of Alexandria, Va. Dr. Hobbs treated 200 patients with phenelzine, or Nardil. All of these patients had been under his personal care for at least two years.

Of the 200, 96 had no organic disease to account for their symptoms. The other 104 patients did have a proven organic disease, but in all cases the degree and number

of their complaints far outweighed the severity of the organic disease present, Dr. Hobbs noted.

Frustrating Problem

He estimated that the latter group comprised one-third of all patients a general practitioner sees and said that "often the management of these patients presents one of the most frustrating problems a physician can encounter."

The most commonly complained of symptoms, Dr. Hobbs reported, included gastrointestinal upset, sadness, irritability, apathy, insomnia, chronic fatigue, loss of appetite, shortness of breath, palpitations, tremors and dizziness.

Early Improvement

The beneficial effects of phenelzine became apparent within 2 or 3 days, he said, "with maximum improvement invariably occurring in less than one month."

Two months of Nardil therapy produced improvement in 174 of the 200 patients. Dr. Hobbs rated the improvement as excellent in 49 per cent, good in 25 per cent and fair in 13 per cent. The degree of improvement was based on both the doctor's judgement and the patient's own evaluation.

Dr. Hobbs reported a complete lack of toxic effects of phenelzine. Only seven patients, he said, developed side reactions necessitating discontinuing the drug.

At the final stop on his tour, Casablanca, the King of Morocco gave him a double-barreled shotgun with a handsome stock inlaid in gold, rubies and emeralds. Eisenhower took a look at the jewels on the weapon and told King Mohammed V, "I ought to make a necklace out of these."

The Navy doctor, Capt. George Burkley, who did such a fine job of keeping the 83 members of Eisenhower's press entourage relatively healthy and operating during the long trip, is quite a realistic man. Along with his pills

Power Hookup Feasibility Told

Portland — (UPI) — Only one instance where it would be economically practical to supply California power systems with surplus Columbia river power was shown in a report by Bonneville Power Administrator William Pearl.

It would be a 230,000 volt hookup stretching 95 miles between Klamath Falls and Redding, Calif.

The report said this hookup would be financially feasible on the assumption that only power excess to the needs of the Northwest would be marketed at present rates outside the BPA service area.

Alternate proposals vary in economic feasibility and generally show unfavorable benefit-cost ratios, it was indicated.

The report, made by the BPA and the Bureau of Reclamation, has been submitted to the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs.

It noted that the California market for the limited amount of surplus secondary power available appears to be for use to displace steam-generated power in northern Cal.
