

Three Accidents Reported to State Police in Area

State police today reported three accidents Thursday afternoon and evening. No one was seriously injured, officers said.

A car driven by Howard Lee Brown, 17, of route 4, box 369E, Medford, pulled across the South Pacific highway yesterday afternoon, from Bear Creek Orchards and was struck by a car driven by Duane George Daniels, 18, of 207 First st., Phoenix, which was traveling north on Highway 99, state police said.

Brown was informed a complaint would be filed against him charging improper changing of lanes, officers said.

A second accident occurred yesterday at 7:30 p.m. on Highway 99 three miles north of the Siskiyou summit, officers said. A car carrying four passengers and driven by James Wrevis Swift, 32, of Sacramento, Calif., went out of control in the snow and rolled over.

The car was reported damaged beyond repair and the

family returned to Sacramento by bus.

Another accident also occurred about 7:30 p.m. when two cars collided on the Jacksonville highway in front of Matlack's store, state police said.

Three Injured in Two of Four Auto Accidents in City

Three persons were injured in two of four traffic accidents reported to city police Wednesday and Thursday.

Mrs. Janet Dea Pigg, 18, of 911 Murray st., and her 4-year-old daughter, Debra Kay Pigg, were taken to the Rogue Valley hospital after the car Mrs. Pigg was driving hit a parked wrecking truck on Murray st. between Peach and Hamilton sts.

Wednesday evening about 6:45 p.m., according to city police.

Police said Mrs. Pigg's daughter apparently knocked a box of soap chips off of the car seat and Mrs. Pigg glanced down at the box and hit the truck.

Debra Pigg, suffered a cut leg and mouth and possible other injuries, and Mrs. Pigg suffered a lacerated leg, numerous cuts and possible other injuries police said. Another daughter, riding in the car was uninjured.

The wrecker was registered to a neighbor of the Piggs, Jack Rey Sides, 926 Murray st.

Another accident resulting in an injury occurred at 10:20 p.m. Wednesday night at the intersection of Summit and Clark sts., according to city police.

Archbishop Jaan Kiwit, conducting a special service in Tallinn, urged his congregation to "pray for total disarmament and dedicate our energies to this lofty aim."

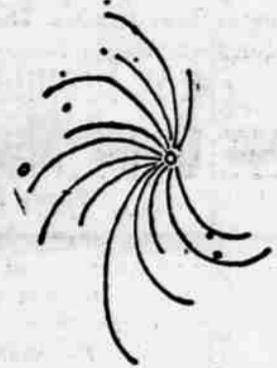
