

### 8 Non-Strikers Jailed in Wilson Plant Dispute

Albert Lea, Minn. — (UP) — Eight non-strikers were jailed today for carrying shotguns, rifles and pistols into Wilson & Co. packing plant, reopened with the lifting of martial law here.

The plant's reopening and the city's return to civil rule after 16 days of martial law came off otherwise without incident.

"Everything went just fine," Sheriff Everett Stovern said. "There was no trouble whatsoever."

National guardsmen, their rifles slung over their shoulders, searched cars as the vanguard of about 500 non-union workers drove past picket lines to get the plant back into operation.

They seized about a dozen guns and at least one knife. The sheriff said the eight workers arrested, along with one more yet to be jailed, will appear before a judge for violation of a restraining order.

An order issued by Judge John Cahill several weeks ago outlawed weapons in the plant vicinity.

At least 150 workers, hired since the strike was called more than nine weeks ago, drove through picket lines this morning. Later this week the company planned to put 350 more men back to work.

The governor's action declaring martial law and closing the plant was overruled by a three-judge federal court.

### Three Americans Waiting Indonesia Court Appearances

Tokyo — (UP) — Free lance flier Allen Lawrence Pope is not the only American facing trial in Indonesia.

Two Californians — Frank C. Starr, 41, and Wesley Broce, 22, of Long Beach — have been in jail in Djakarta since last May on charges of illegally entering the country.

Like the Pope case, which involves a charge of flying bombing missions for the Indonesian rebels, the case of the two Californians is politically embarrassing for the U.S. State Department.

The two claimed they were on an official peace-making mission seeking to bring a rapprochement between the Indonesian government and the rebels when they were captured in the Borneo jungles last May without proper papers.

"Peace With Honor" Both signed statements to the effect they were negotiating a "peace with honor" for the rebels. Starr claimed he had a contract to sell arms to the rebels and admitted a number of other activities which could bring a death penalty if proved.

However, the chances of any charges being pressed on these activities were lessened considerably when the case was turned over to civilian authorities by the military some time ago.

Their case was called this fall at the Djakarta District Court. But it was suddenly postponed after the judge and most of the participants ex-

cept the defendants — had gathered in the courtroom.

The reason given for the postponement was that the prosecutor was ill and was not able to appear. This was more than three months ago.

**Active But Confined** Starr has been active although confined. He has managed to smuggle hundreds of letters from Djakarta's Tjipant prison where he and Broce are being held.

A large number of the letters have been to the American Embassy and to U.S. Ambassador Howard P. Jones. Starr has used extremely bitter language in assailing the Embassy's failure to get him released. He has threatened on several occasions to have the Ambassador fired once he is released.

Starr claims close associates in a number of high places in the United States and Indonesia.

Some of the accusations Starr has leveled against Indonesian Defense Minister and Army Chief of Staff Lt. Gen. Abdul Haris Nasution have caused consternation among Embassy officials. One of the charges accused Nasution of promising the rebels he would pull off a coup d'etat.

Unlike the Pope case, the Starr and Broce case has caused no serious public reaction and has gotten only occasional mention in the Communist press.

But it still is a headache for Embassy officials.

### Teen-Agers Gather In Nation's Capital For Church Program

Washington — (UP) — The nation's capital was invaded today by nearly 10,000 teen-agers from all parts of America, here to prove that there is no necessary link between the words juvenile and delinquency.

The young people, who arrived by special trains and chartered buses, will participate in a three-day convention sponsored by Youth for Christ International.

**Christian Programs** YFC is an interdenominational Protestant organization which conducts programs of Christian evangelism among teen-agers, particularly the four million U.S. high school students who are not members of any church.

Evangelist Billy Graham, who began his career as a member of the Youth for Christ staff in 1945, will speak to the teen-agers at the closing rally of the convention Wednesday.

Other speakers will include Dr. Bob Pierce, missionary-evangelist and president of

World Vision, Inc.; Sen. Frank Carlson (R-Kan.), who is serving as general chairman of the convention; and Dr. Ted W. Engstrom, president of Youth for Christ International.

**Challenge To Teen-Agers** "The aim of this convention," Engstrom said, "is to challenge American teen-agers to appreciate and help preserve the Christian foundations on which this country was built."

"We want them to go back to their homes, schools and churches with a deeper dedication to Christ and a greater appreciation of their American heritage."

### Police Rescue Cowboy Star

London — (UP) — Television cowboy star Robert Horton was rescued Sunday night by police when screaming female fans mobbed him backstage after he appeared at the Palladium Theater in a variety show.

Horton, 35, star of the western series "Wagon Train," was pushed and shoved by the girls who ripped off his tie and then began ripping off his buttons. Police took him to his hotel where he locked himself in and unhooked the telephone.

He was quoted as telling police in his dressing room, "Gee, I'm scared. The girls are sure tough here. They don't go on like this in America."

It was Horton's first appearance on the English vaudeville stage.

### Hatfield Schedules Two Appearances

Salem — (UP) — Gov. Mark Hatfield's schedule this week includes two appearances in Corvallis and a banquet in Portland.

Tuesday at 5 p.m. he will address the Corvallis Kiwanis club. That evening he will present an award to the winner of the Far West Basketball Classic.

Wednesday evening he will attend a dinner at the Sheraton hotel in Portland honoring Dr. Harold M. Erickson, outgoing Oregon state health officer who has accepted a California state health post.

### Increase Expected In Oregon Income

New York — (UP) — The current issue of Business Week estimated that total personal income in Oregon for 1959 will be \$3,838,000,000. This represents an increase of 7.8 per cent over 1958 personal income in Oregon of \$3,557,000,000.

The magazine also offered a "New Year's prediction" of what personal income will be at the end of 1960. For Oregon Business Week predicted the personal income would rise 5 per cent to \$4,028,000,000.

### New Jury Panel In Finch Trial

Los Angeles — (UP) — A new panel of prospective jurors was called today for resumption of the murder trial of Dr. R. Bernard Finch and his red-haired paramour, Carole Tregoff.

Finch, 42, a wealthy physician, and Miss Tregoff, 23, his former receptionist, are accused of the fatal shooting July 18 of Finch's estranged wife, Barbara, 33, outside the Finch \$65,000 home in nearby West Covina.

Questioning of members of an original panel of 100 prospective jurors nearly exhausted the panel by Dec. 17 when the trial was recessed for the Christmas holiday. Trial started Dec. 8.

Defense and state attorneys retained 31 peremptory challenges — 21 for the state — by which prospective jurors may be disqualified without reason. Attorneys for both sides, however, said they expected to seat a jury sometime this week.

### Thornton Rules On County Judge

Salem — (UP) — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton released an opinion today holding that a member of the Oregon Water Resources Board who served as secretary of an irrigation district would be prohibited by state law from holding office as county judge at the same time.

The opinion was requested by Crook County District Attorney James B. Minturn.

Thornton said the Water Board member could not legally be a county judge — if he ran and was elected — because the state constitution forbids a person who serves in one of the state government's three separate branches from exercising any of the functions of the executive-administrative branch. The other branches are legislative and judicial.

### Sweetland Files as Convention Delegate

Salem — (UP) — State Sen. Monroe Sweetland of Milwaukie filed today for delegate to the Democratic National convention at Los Angeles next July.

He predicted that "not less than 60 persons will compete for the 24 state-at-large delegate positions."

Moscow — (UP) — Soviet scientists Saturday claimed discovery of a chemical that has completely eliminated from Russia a species of plant lice that has bothered winegrowers for a century.

### President Visits His Grandchildren

Washington — (UP) — President Eisenhower, who missed seeing his four grandchildren on Christmas Day, drove 160 miles Saturday to spend 75 minutes with them at their Gettysburg, Pa. home.

And the welcome he received was more than enough to make Grandpa Ike break out with his famous grin.

Reports of icy roads between Washington and Gettysburg apparently kept the President from making the trip yesterday. Early Saturday, as soon as the highways were reported clear, he slipped out of the White House without notice and was driven to Gettysburg where the children spent the holiday with their parents, Maj. and Mrs. John Eisenhower. The First Lady remained here.

### Grade A Dairymen To Meet Tuesday

Russell Johnson, Evans Valley, announced today that Grade A dairymen of southern Oregon will meet at the Fruitdale Grange hall, south of Grants Pass on Highway 99, at 11 a.m. Tuesday, Dec. 29.

Producers from the Eugene milk shed south to the California line, including central Oregon and the Klamath Falls area, are expected.

Principal speaker will be Tom Hall, Skamokawa, Wash., president of the Oregon-Washington Milk Sales, Inc., who will furnish general information contained in the by-laws and with the marketing agreement of the corporation. He also will illustrate how they function.

The meeting is expected to be completed by 1 p.m. with the directors to meet following the session.

St. Moritz, Switzerland — (UP) — A Gypsy jig made Harold Krupp of the German industrial family the life of the party at an all-night shindig given here Sunday night by ex-Queen Soraya of Iran.

Krupp, who escorted Soraya to the party, staged a solo demonstration of the Czardas and then led others among the 14 guests in the Hungarian Gypsy dance.

The wealthy German, who appears to have displaced Italy's Raimondo Orsini in the ex-Queen's affections, sat next to her and chatted animatedly through most of the evening, which ended at 2:30 a.m. **Restaurant Bar Rented**

Soraya rented the bar at the Chiesa Veglia restaurant for the occasion, which reciprocated for a party Krupp gave for her Christmas Eve.

Krupp has been a frequent companion of the former Iranian Queen during her stay at this rich man's ski resort, but there has been no confirmation of rumors of a romance.

Shah Mohammed's remarriage in Tehran last week cleared the way for Soraya to remarry. He has been paying her an allowance estimated at \$1,000 a week on condition that she let him remarry first.

### Four More Arrested By Castro Police

Havana — (UP) — Four more "counter-revolutionaries" have been arrested in Havana for planning acts of sabotage, the government announced Saturday.

The arrests were made by secret agents of the national revolutionary police.

The announcement said the four men, all Cubans, had been receiving orders from former Batista regime general Jose Pedraza Cabrera.
