Oregon Welfare Adopts Project

Portland —UPI— The Oregon Public Welfare Commission Tuesday adopted an experimental work-relief project in Polk county in an effort to reduce the number of men on welfare rolls.

The program involves brush - cutting along county roads in Polk county for which the state will pay 70 per cent and the county 30 per cent.

Members said the program is meant to substitute for welfare payments and not replace any other job.

The project is to start by Jan. 15. Welfare officials said a provision includes that officials may cut off relief to any recipient who refuses the work or fails to do a good job. Workers will be paid \$1 an hour for a 40 hour week.
