Navy Eyes Idea of Eliminating Night

Washington — (UPI) — Navy scientists have been toying with the idea of eliminating night.

This could be done, they say, if man were able to create a thick layer of dust in a region far out from the earth. The layer of dust would be like Saturn's major ring, which is an area of extremely fine particles about 10 miles in depth, located 35,000 miles above that planet.

Drs. Herbert Friedman and James Purcell of the Naval Research Laboratory said there is no night on Saturn because of the continual brightness of the ring.

Friedman said it might take millions of tons of dust to create an effective ring.
