Ohioan Admits Killing Husband of Ex-Model

Painesville, Ohio - (UPI) - Dec. 23, the day before a bullet fired from 40 feet away shot through the double windows of the Clark's kitchen and struck the model father in the temple, killing him.

The slaying stirred the community and bared Mrs. Clark, a former Miami model, as a cheater who had had affairs with at least five men.

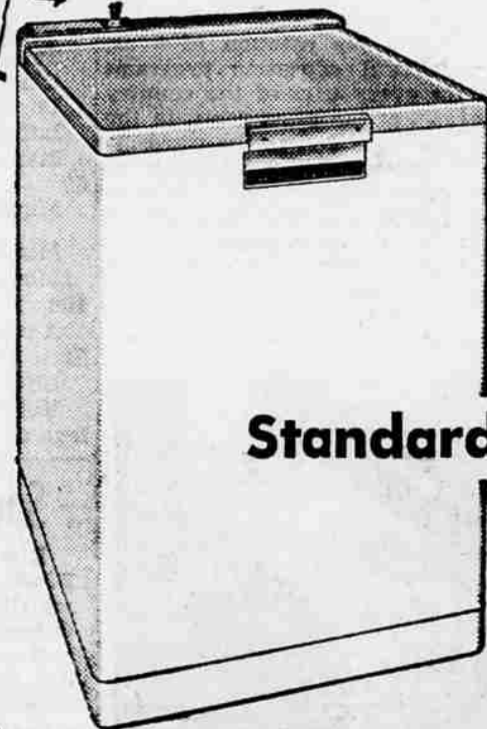

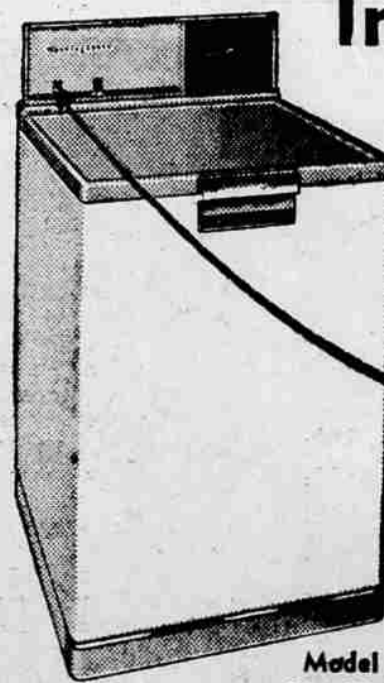
