

Applications Being Taken for Position

Applications for appointment to Sen. Richard L. Neuberger's Washington office as his research assistant, are now being accepted.

The term of appointment will start in September, 1960, and initially run only to Jan. 1, 1961, when Neuberger will be up for reelection. He said if he is reelected he will expand the appointment to September, 1961.

Each year Senator Neuberger offers the appointment to an Oregon college graduate who has demonstrated high ability and a sincere interest in the problems of government. The person selected will intern on his staff for one year at a salary of about \$4,500.

Candidates for this position are nominated by the political science departments of Oregon colleges and universities, and selection is made by a committee that has been appointed by Neuberger for that purpose. Applications should be made by interested students who are seniors in college, in graduate study, or are recent graduates.

Transplanted Heart Dog Put To Death

Stanford, Calif. — (UPI) — A mongrel dog was painlessly put to death Thursday after living eight days with the transplanted heart of another dog.

Doctors who performed the heart transplant at Stanford Medical Center said they decided to end the dog's life when they found an infection in its body. They said they wanted to remove the heart for microscopic study before it was affected.

The surgeons said the dog would have died soon, at any rate—either from the infection or from the host-donor reaction involved in transplanting organs from one animal to another.

The mongrel lived longer than any other animal which had undergone such an operation. The previous record was seven and one-half hours.
