Aviation Museum Has 'Bird Dog'

Ft. Rucker, Ala. - (UPI) - The Army Aviation Center Museum here has a famous "Bird Dog." Its name is "1327."

The Bird Dog is a light single engine observation aircraft.

The Army's first Bird Dog, or L-19, had a notable history during its some 1,600 hours in the air. It was the first model of the L-19 used by the Army and the first to see action during the Korean War.

The "1327" was also the first L-19 to be assigned to the Republic of Korea, in June, 1952, for training and operational flights. It was transferred to the Air Section of the U.S. 9th Corps of the 1st Cavalry Division in June, 1954, and was later transferred to the maintenance depot for overhauling and return to the U.S.

Upon its return to the United States, "1327" was assigned to the Army Aviation School as an instructor aircraft in February, 1958. Recently, the Bird Dog was returned to the Army Aviation Museum.

More Benefits for Elderly Needed

Cleveland, Ohio - (UPI) - A Senate committee aide indicated today that additional benefits are needed to support America's growing elderly population.

At least two and a half million persons retired on social security need financial assistance from other public sources, according to Sidney Spector, staff director of a sub-committee on the nation's aged.

The Senate unit, headed by Sen. Pat McNamara (D-Mich.), has spent eight months touring the country and taking "an overall look" Spector said, at the problems of America's 16 million citizens over 65.

Three of five persons past 65 have annual incomes of \$1,000 or less, he said.

Another major problem of the aged is the rising cost of medical care. The older person requires about two-and-a-half times as much care as the one under 65, he said.

School Textbook Case To Be Heard

Oregon City - (UPI) - The Oregon school textbook law enacted by the 1959 legislature relative to parochial schools using textbooks purchased with tax money will be heard before Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman starting Thursday.

The suit has been brought by William Dickman and others with Oregon City School District No. 62 as defendant. Ann Carlson, whose children attend St. John's Catholic school, which has used the textbooks, is intervening in the case.

Byrd Polar Flight Doubled

Stockholm - (UPI) - A Swedish meteorologist who is preparing a book on polar flights expressed personal doubts today about a pioneer flight over the North Pole credited to Adm. Richard E. Byrd almost 34 years ago.

The flight about which Prof. Goesta Liljequist of Upsala university raised questions was one reported made by the late American explorer on May 9, 1926.

Liljequist said his studies of weather conditions in the Arctic on that date, and various other technical data, indicated that "something is wrong" about the record.

"Byrd reported that he accomplished the flight in 15 1/2 hours and his plane had an average speed of some 75 knots," Liljequist said.

"That means that he had to have a tailwind at an average of some 20 knots, meaning that it should have been a storm helping the plane one way of the route. A study of meteorological data from that day shows that there was fine clear wind and a high pressure area in the Arctic that very day."

"Something is wrong and the best thing would be if an impartial commission of meteorologists, technicians and polar researchers in America made a thorough investigation," Liljequist added.

Tighter Mortgage Credit Predicted

Chicago - (UPI) - Home mortgage credit will be tighter and home loan interest rates higher next year than in 1959, the president of the U. S. Savings and Loan league predicted today.

W. O. Du Vall said the tighter credit will be due to the fact that there are not enough savings to meet all the demands for credit.

"The competition for savings - generated in part by the current prosperity - is more intense than it has been for 30 years," Du Vall said.

"Housing and real estate activity are adversely affected when money is so tight."

Du Vall predicted that activity in the home mortgage field by investors other than savings and loan institutions will show a sharp decline below 1959.

Boat Registration May Be Delayed

Enforcement of newly-required boat registration may be delayed temporarily, since the new state marine board in Salem has been flooded with application forms, Sheriff Joe Walsh said today.

Walsh received a letter from R. F. Rittenhouse of the new board, stating that the board will meet Jan. 19 to decide when enforcement of registering boat numbers, title of ownership and meeting licensing requirements will start. The board and the boat registration regulations were established by the last state legislature.

Rittenhouse recommended to the county sheriffs and state peace officers that they consider these circumstances in enforcement.

The emergency section pertaining to safety regulations became effective July 1, Walsh explained. Ten deputies were appointed from the Rogue Aqua Ski club membership in Jackson county. They provided their own boats and operated them at their own costs, Walsh said. They were accompanied by regular deputies in patrolling water recreation areas.

No serious boating accidents were reported during the past year in Jackson county. Two patrols saved people who were in the water by their overturned boats. Several hundred safety suggestion cards were issued by the sheriff's office and the special deputies, the sheriff said.

17 Degrees Low Here This Morning

Mercury in the thermometer at the U. S. weather bureau station at the Medford airport dropped to 17 degrees this morning, tying a season low.

The same minimum was recorded last Dec. 8. The minimum for the two days were the lowest here in about two years. A low of 11 degrees occurred on Jan. 27, 1957.

Today's 17 was two degrees higher than the record low for this day of the year. Temperature was 15 on Jan. 4, 1919.

Weather bureau forecast indicated a temperature not quite so cold on Tuesday. A minimum of 20 is forecast.

Mid-East Video To Beam To Iraq

Baghdad - (UPI) - The Middle East's first television station is on its way to becoming the most far-flung video enterprise in this part of the world.

Guidance Minister Faisal Samir said plans are under way for bringing TV to 70 per cent of Iraq's nearly seven million people.

The first major step in this direction was the recent switch from a 500-watt transmitter to a new 5,000-watt model by Baghdad Television. Programs which had been seen only in the Baghdad area since the station was inaugurated in May, 1956, can now be viewed more than 82 miles away.

In the past three years television sets have become regular fixtures in homes and hotels. Thousands of Baghdadis gather nightly in outdoor tea and beer gardens around the city to watch their favorite TV programs.

Only two states, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, are considered adequately mapped, according to the U.S. Geological Survey offices.

Some Can Be Helped
