

# Tornado Bounces Klamath Pelicans

Crater and Medford high basketball teams, opening night winners in the Southern Oregon conference, collide on Tuesday evening at Hedrick Junior high court here. Game time is 8:15 p.m. following a junior varsity scrap at 6:30 p.m. Ashland makes its 1960 loop debut at Grants Pass on Tuesday.

The Black Tornado of Medford High school stormed into Southern Oregon conference basketball play Saturday night by thundering over 1959 champion Klamath Falls 62 to 46.

And the sharp club from the Bear capital turned the trick by outdoing the KF team on the Pelicans' home court, an always challenging chore. Medford applied its speed and strong defensive traits to advantage and even outbounded the taller Klamath Union gang to accomplish the triumph. It was a "good team effort," according to Tornado Coach Frank Roelandt, who said the Medfords turned in a "fairly consistent" game.

All-Stater Jerry Anderson headed the victory with 18 points and 18 rebounds but the Black Tornado also had three other players in double scoring figures as Lowell Dean, Ken Durkee and Jerry Shults netted 11 each. Dean, with his rugged play, and Shults gave Andy strong support under the boards. Durkee and Ragsdale formed an adept combination at the guard posts, working the ball well on offense and giving the Pels fits with their harassing play on defense.

Medford took the lead for good in the contest at 4 to 3 in the first quarter. It was in front 14 to 10, 21 to 12 and 31 to 25 at the intermissions.

Paul Bishop scored 13 for Klamath and Bruce Brickner 11. Brickner, a 6-6 transfer from Merrill, which took the B crown last year, cracked the Pelican starting lineup after just a week with the team and played most of the game. He looked particularly good on offense and grabbed off seven rebounds.

With Bob Lewis teaming with Brickner the Pels had two 6-6 players in the opening crew. Their shortest starter was Dean Dunson at 6-1. Bishop and Gary Patzke at 6-3 completed the quint. Medford was well short of that overall height with Bob Quinney at 6-4, Dean and Anderson at 6-3, Ragsdale at 5-10 and Durkee at 5-9.

Despite this difference Medford lead in rebounding 41 retrieves to 34.

# Crater Overcomes Grants Pass 57-50

Central Point - Crater high, off to a slow beginning, roused up its play under the hoops in the mid-second quarter and stopped the Cavemen with the exception of Rex Benner in the second half Saturday night to subdue Grants Pass 57 to 50 in a Southern Oregon conference basketball launcher here.

Benner, a 1959 all-conference choice, was the individual star of the night. He flipped in 35 points, 24 of his team's 29 in the second half and grabbed off 15 rebounds. The Cavemen relied heavily on him during the evening. But, the Comets seemed to prove a point - That a club which leans too much on one man may not fare too well in the circuit.

The Comets anticipate a club with a better balanced attack on Tuesday when they play Medford high in a league scrap at Medford. Varsity play will be at 8:15 p.m. after a 6:30 p.m. junior varsity tangle.

Crater built a couple of gaps of six points in the final standing as 21 apiece and Comets were in front 37 to 35 at the third rest halt.

Sharp topped the Crater scoring with 18 points and Loyol Higginbotham had 10. While Benner recorded 35, Dan McIntyre, with seven, was the only other GP cager with more than three points. Turner had 11 rebounds for the Comets and Sharp was next with six. Gary Hugoboom had 10 retrieves for the Cavemen.

In the actual scoring, Crater trimmed the Cavemen at the free toss line. The Comets took advantage of more chances to put in 21 gifts to 14 by Grants Pass. Each team had 18 field goals.

Sharp's fielder, which put Crater ahead for keeps, made the score 34 to 32. Earl Cooper then tossed in two free shots for the Comets. Benner got a GP field bucket and a gift heave to round out the count for the period.

As the fourth panel began Cooper put in a long push and Turner a rebounder while Benner hit a pair of goals from the side. Score went to 40 to 39. Higginbotham sank a brace of free points and then a long pusher for 44 to 39. GP came back on a drive along the base line by Benner and a rebounder by Hugoboom and it was 44 to 43. Sharp got a push from the side and Benner a gift for 46 to 44.

Denny Edwards dunked a free toss for the Comets, drove the length of the floor for a layin and added another free tally for 50 to 44 with 3 1/4 minutes to play. Benner twice from the side and Sharp twice from the foul stripe for 52 to 48 with two minutes to go. A fancy dribbling drive by Sharp took it to 54 to 48. With a minute to play Grants Pass set up a screen in an apparently deliberate effort to draw a foul. Higginbotham ran into McIntyre who made both free tosses for 54 to 50. Sharp put in two gifts, one on a technical action charged to Benner. Cooper completed the scoring with another at the free line.

**GP Gets 10-1 Eadge**  
Grants Pass started much better than the Comets and headed 10 to 1 with three minutes played in the game. After a score of 20 to 14 favoring the Cavemen in the second period, Crater got its surge going which finally caught the Climate city team. Richard Wood threw in a free toss, Higginbotham a long, long pusher and Turner a bucket from the side to make it 20 to 19. Jim Davis plopped a free point for GP but Turner got his goal for the 21-all halfway situation.

Turner and Benner exchanged gift markers to open the second half. Benner gained two goals for 26 to 22 Grants Pass. Sharp and Benner put in baskets for their respective clubs but Crater cut it to 28 to 27 on Higginbotham's long shot and Cooper's free toss. Al Staley got a free counter for GP and Tom White one for Crater.

Then Turner put the Comets in front 30 to 29. Benner's short hook put the Cavemen in the lead again 31 to 30. Woods' two free throws gave Crater 32 to 31 edge but Benner tied the fray at 32-each. Sharp's pusher followed.

Comet play intensified at two particular points during the evening, with the entry of Woods in the second quarter and with the appearance of Edwards in the third. Edwards, Crater's tallest man at 6-3, hurt his knee in practice last Monday. Coach Hoffine sent the rugged backboard man as a test on the knee, which the Comets hope will hold up for the season. Woods made his first start of the season for the Comets.

Crater hit at a 429 average from the field while Grants Pass had a .327 mark with Benner doing most of the firing and making 14 goals in 38 tries.

The Cavemen lost Larry Janssen on foul with 5 1/2 minutes to play and Jim Davis by the same means in the final seconds.

Crater Jayvees won the preliminary from Grants Pass 36 to 34. They led most of the time but lagged 34 to 33 with 1 1/4 minutes to play. Jeff Anhorn got a field goal and a free shot with 40 seconds left. Comet quarter leads were 14 to 10, 21 to 12 and 31 to 25. Mike Millaman had 15 points and Bob Lewellyn 12 for Grants Pass. Dave Foote put in 10 and Jim Allen and Anhorn each nine for Crater.

The junior Comets had a 384 field shooting mark and Grants Pass 270.

Coach Pete Newell's poised Bears started with a 23-14 lead which dwindled to 25-23 at halftime. Then USC sophomores John Rudometkin, Ken Stanley and Chris Appeal took charge, scoring 25 points and putting - the Trojans ahead with 11 minutes to go.

# AAWU Inks Bowl Pact

Pasadena, Calif. - (UPI) - The fledgling Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU) had Rose Bowl security today at the age of less than one year, and made it clear it would be delighted to keep playing the Big Ten in the New Year's Day classic.

The AAWU, the "big five" of the Pacific, concluded a contract Sunday with the Tournament of Roses for the annual game. The door was immediately left open for the somewhat reluctant Big Ten, torn openly on renewal, to join in a new agreement.

The AAWU postponed until March 31 a decision on the method for selecting rival teams. When the Big Ten meets in March to take up the question of renewal, it will do so with the understanding Big Five officials are unanimously in favor of the agreement.

If there is no renewal - and the Big Ten is now split 5-5 on the question - the AAWU and the Tournament of Roses indicate no attempt will be made to negotiate with another league.
