Nixon to Attempt Boost in Aids

Washington—(UPI)—Sen. John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.) has disclosed that Vice President Richard M. Nixon has promised to try to beef up the administration's program of aid to economically depressed areas.

Cooper's appeal to Nixon was a sample of how Republicans are turning to the vice president as the "air-assured" in the GOP hierarchy.

The senator took his case to Nixon on Tuesday. This was three days before President Eisenhower made public his reply to an earlier appeal by Cooper for information on what is being done for areas of chronic unemployment. Eisenhower said federal programs already underway have brought "widespread and substantial" benefits to surplus labor areas.

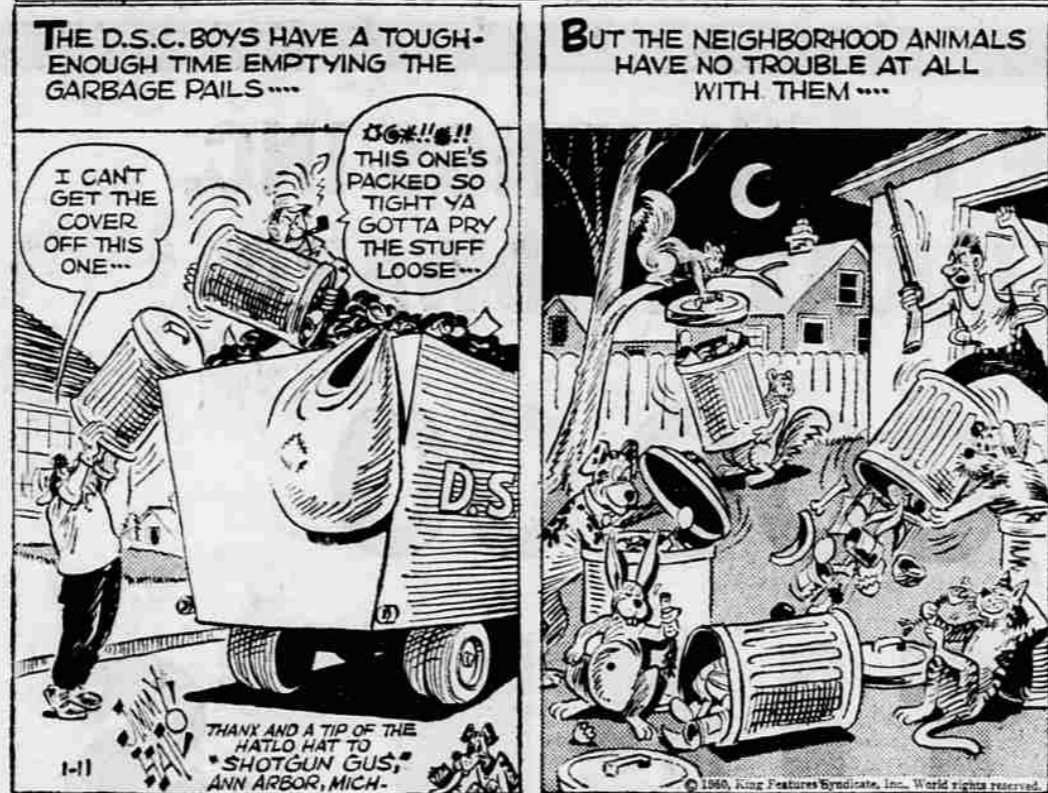

Medford High students were invited to the victory dance at Ashland after the Medford-Ashland game Friday night. The order of the "M", the letterman's club, sponsored a dance after the

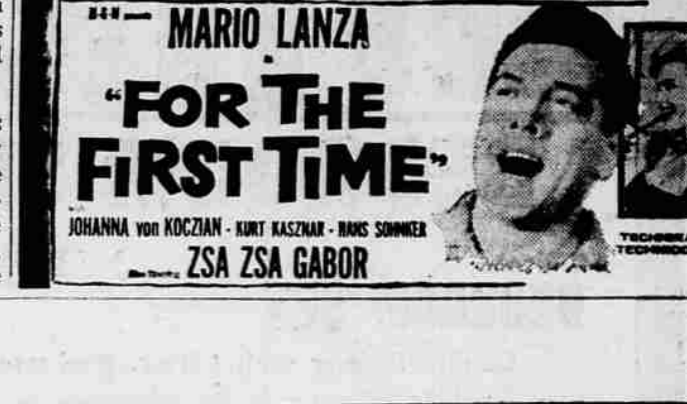
