with an ankle injury. Thus far the fourth-ranked Buckeyes have scored a total of 1,119 points in 12 games, 10 of which they have won. That total is even better than the 1,111 by top-ranked Cincinnati in the same number of contests and gives Ohio State an average of 93 points per game or better than two points per minute.

In the midst of this cornucopia, the Buckeyes took over sole possession of the Big Ten lead when both Michigan State and Purdue lost Monday night.

The 109 points against Delaware was an all-time high for the Buckeyes, whose previous best was 106 against Miami, Fla. in 1953.

Brings Back Memories
The steady flow of points brought back memories of some of Ohio State's football juggernaut of the 30's under Coach Francis A. Schmidt which ran up such adding machine figures as 85-7 against Drake, 76-0 against Western Reserve and 60-0 against New York university.

While Ohio State was making hay outside the Big Ten Conference, Michigan and Purdue were tumbling into a four-way tie for second-place inside it. Iowa handed Michigan State its first conference defeat, 92-79, at Iowa City, Iowa, and Illinois did the same to Purdue, 81-75, at Lafayette, Ind.

The Buckeyes, led by Don Nelson's 17 points, led 46-33 at halftime but still needed a second-half rally to subdue the Spartans. Illinois prevailed over Purdue despite Terry Dischinger's 43 points for the Boiler-makers.

Cincinnati and second-ranked California both were idle but third-ranked West Virginia rolled to its 13th victory in 14 games with a 94-74 win over William & Mary.

West Leads Mountaineers
All-American Jerry West scored 22 points and picked off 19 rebounds in leading the Mountaineers to their 56th straight Southern conference triumph.

Sixth-ranked Georgia Tech over-powered Mississippi, 92-66, for its 11th victory in 12 games and third straight in Southeastern conference competition.

All other teams in the top 10 enjoyed a night off.

Oklahoma had little trouble downing Iowa State, 65-47, in a Big Eight clash at Norman, Okla. Indiana beat Michigan, 77-72, at Ann Arbor, Mich., and Northwestern defeated Wisconsin, 77-69, at Madison, Wis., in two other Big Ten clashes.

Si Cohen's 26 points paced Kentucky to a 68-42 triumph over Tulane at Lexington, Ky. The loss was the first for Tulane in Southeastern conference competition.

The Internal Revenue Service noted that three recent court decisions have held that such workers are subject to penalties if they fail to include tips in their taxable income.

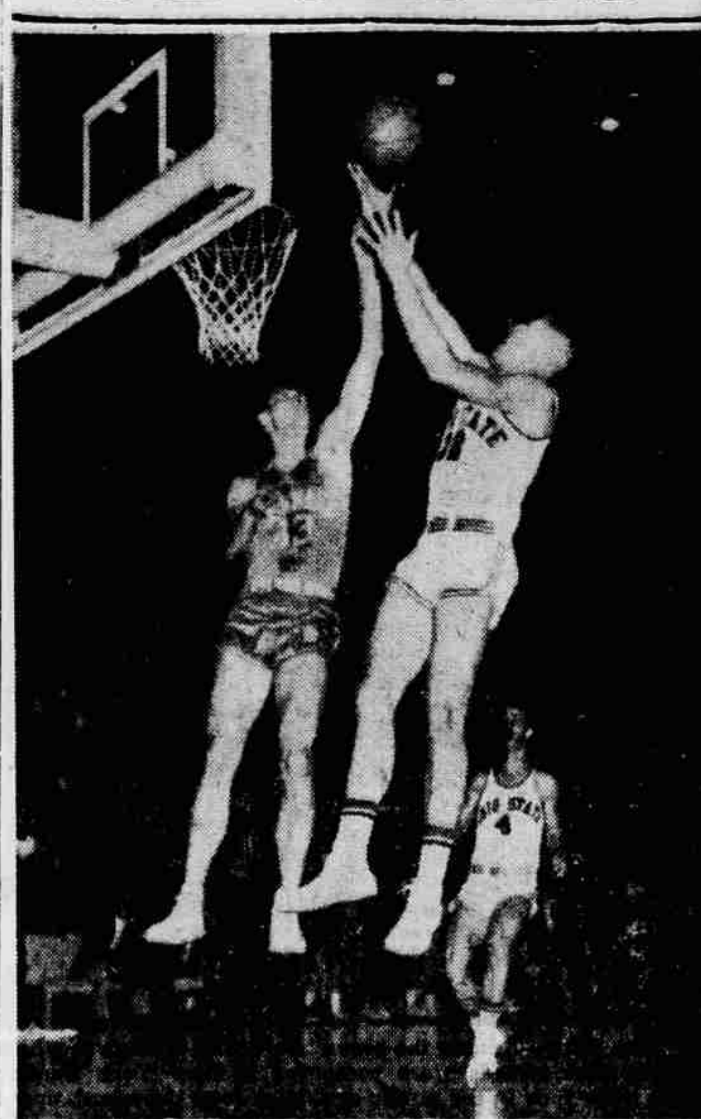
The IRS said that if a taxpayer fails to keep adequate records and under-reports his tips, the service is authorized to estimate them from available information.

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Medford Moves Up To Second Place In Prep Ratings

Marshfield's powerful Pirates still rate as the number one team in the United Press International high school poll.

Again this week the Pirates were voted No. 1 on every one of the eight coaches' ballots for a perfect 80 points.

But there were some changes in the top 10 with one club dropping completely out of the rankings and David Douglas moving into seventh. The Scots polled 20 points and have a season's record of six wins and two losses. They replace Lincoln which dropped a three-point verdict to Wilson last Friday.

Medford, with designs to unseat Klamath Falls as Southern conference champion, moved into the second behind Marshfield with 65 points.

North Bend Drops
The Black Tornado replaced North Bend which added win number eight without a loss over the weekend but still dropped a notch to third.

Jefferson of Portland replaced Klamath Falls as the number four club as the Pelicans dropped to fifth. Hermiton, with a 9-0 mark, remained in sixth spot.

Franklin dropped from fifth to eighth after losing its first game of the season last week to Jefferson. Cleveland and La Grande remained tied for the ninth with 14 votes each.

NCAA Men To Submit Suggestions

Miami Beach, Fla. - (UPI) - A six-man subcommittee submits its recommendations to the NCAA rules-makers today on how to liberalize the present substitution rules and still keep the "iron man" in college football.

Whatever the group suggested, it became almost certain that the demands of the nation's coaches for a return to platoon football would be rejected when the NCAA Rules committee headed by Gen. Bob Neyland of Tennessee takes its final vote Wednesday.

The subcommittee spent the greater part of Monday night studying a compromise between the wishes of the coaches and last Friday's recommendation by the NCAA policy-makers that the rules be left alone.

Herbert O. Fritz Crisler of Michigan, lifetime member-at-large of the NCAA Rules committee, said the planning body was "unanimously agreed" on two objectives:

"To work out some sort of substitution rule whereby the boys would be coached both ways on offense and defense.

"To find some way of reducing the present complicated system of reporting into the game by substitutes."

The subcommittee named to study the problem was made up of Crisler, Dave Nelson of Delaware, Ivy Williamson of Wisconsin, Wally Butts of Georgia, Jess Neely of Rice and Joe Verducci of San Francisco State.

U.S. Skiers In Training

Innsbruck, Austria - (UPI) - The U.S. Alpine national skiing team begins training on the Kitzbuehel Slopes today for three meets here before shoving off for home and the Winter Olympics at Squaw Valley, Calif.

The team, made up of six girls, eight men and four officials, arrived Monday after a stopover in Frankfurt, Germany.

The Hakenkamm meet is the first of the three events to be contested in Austria and it will get underway this week end. The other events are the Megeve and St. Gervais.

The girl's team is coached by Mrs. Andrea Mead Lawrence, a former Olympic winner, who said she was hopeful for the forthcoming races in Europe.

Mrs. Lawrence's husband, Dave, is the men's team coach. He said he believed that his boys stood a good chance to place high in the European races, even though Bud Werner of Steamboat Springs, Colo., the team's top Alpine skier, is home recuperating from a broken leg.

Nixon Hosts Steel Figures at Dinner

Washington - (UPI) - Vice President Richard M. Nixon held a stag dinner at his home Monday night for key figures in the recent steel settlement.

Among those invited were Steelworkers President David J. McDonald, R. Conrad Cooper, chief management negotiator in the drawn-out dispute, and Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell.

Also on the guest list was Roger Blough, board chairman of U.S. Steel Corp., and Arthur J. Goldberg, general counsel to the Steelworkers union.

Sources said the dinner was "purely social."

Nixon and Mitchell have been credited by the administration with playing a major role in getting the Steelworkers and steel management to end their long dispute.
