

Crater High Trims Ashland Grizzlies

Ashland — Crater high's Comets went on top at the finish of a closely contested fourth quarter Friday night to trip Ashland 47 to 43 in a Southern Oregon conference basketball fracas.

The Comets of Central Point worked to a 15-point lead in the third quarter. But Ashland caught up in the fourth panel and went in front briefly before a Chuck Turner bucket put Crater on top for good.

Crater success at the free line made scoring difference. The Comets put in 15 of their 20 gift shot attempts while the Grizzlies made seven of 17. Ashland had an 18 to 16 field goal margin.

Third In League

The victory gave Crater third spot alone after having played every team in the loop once. Ashland, which suffered its fourth loss, has yet to win in the circuit.

Comet gaps were 13 to 4, 24 to 15 and 23 to 28 at the quarters. Denny Edwards set the individual pace for the Central Pointers with 13 points and 14 rebounds. Loy Higginbotham with a perfect

seven at the free line added 11 points for Crater and Turner 12 backboard retrieves. Phil Tucker and Bob Hardy each had 10 points for Ashland. Dave Jackson cleared the backboard 12 times and Tucker retrieved on 11 occasions.

Crater Coach Lloyd Hofline sent reserves into action after Crater built up a 32 to 17 gap and the Grizzlies took advantage while they were in the mix to start an upward climb. Ashland caught Crater at 33-all two minutes into the last canto.

Bob Hardy gave the Grizzlies top position at 35 to 33 but Edwards tied the count with a tip in Jackson made it 37 to 35 for Ashland. Then Dave Sharp canned a jump from free line range and Turner hit a one-handed from the side for Comet lead of 39-37. After a Crater edge of 41 to 40 Higginbotham made four of four free tries for the Comets. Harley Dickerson managed three gifters on five attempts in the last couple of minutes of play for Ashland. The Ashlanders had the ball with Crater ahead 45 to 43 when, with just five seconds on the clock, Turner of the Comets intercepted a pass. He drove for a layup for the last points of the game.

Bob King with 29 points sparked Ashland to a 61 to 47 win in the junior varsity fray. Jim Doster had 14 points for the Grizzlies and Jim Allen 13 for Crater.

Portland Pilots Upset Oregon Webfoots 66-43

Portland — (UPI) — Jim Altenhofen and Bill Garner led the University of Portland Pilots to a 66-43 win over tough Oregon here Friday night, stopping a four-game Duck winning streak.

Tough defense and poor shooting by Oregon told the story of the game. It was only Oregon's third loss in 18 games.

In the first half the Pilots kept Oregon's offense bottled up and the Ducks had to shoot from far outside. Oregon was able to hit only 125 of its shots in the first half on four baskets in 32 attempts.

For the game Oregon managed only a 218 mark on 19 of 87 while Portland shot a red-hot 452 on 19 of 42 attempts.

In the battle of talented sophomores, Portland's 6-9 Garner came out on top of 6-7 Glenn Moore of Oregon. Garner repeatedly slapped shots away from Moore in the first half.

Garner wound up with 16 points to Moore's four. Moore had a 17 plus average going into the game. However, Garner had to give up game scoring honors to Altenhofen who wound up with 18 points.

Stu Robertson was Oregon's only offensive threat as he hit for 13 points.

Trojans 9th Victor Over McLoughlin

South Grants Pass capitalized on a high-powered first quarter Friday to turn back the McLoughlin Junior High Bulldogs 52 to 49 in a ninth grade basketball game at Grants Pass.

The Trojans also took the seventh grade encounter 25 to 24 but McLoughlin won overwhelmingly, 50 to 18, in the eighth grade fust.

South's ninth had a 22 to 6 margin on its Medford foe after one period. It led 26 to 15 at the half and 38 to 30 at the third intermission. Mac in its steady whittling of the difference over the last three quarters, had its deficit down to two points at 49 to 47.

Twenty-four points at the free line helped the Trojans. Mike Pippin scored 15 points and Mike Gibson 12 for the GP club. Dick Deffley recorded 12 for McLoughlin. The Medford quint had some fine backboard work from Jack Lowery and Larry Sander with a cork in the final drive with eight rebounds.

McLoughlin eighth shot off to 21 to 21 first stanza spread and headed 30 to 6 and 43 to 13 at the other automatic rests. Don Kengla and Bill Houston scored nine points each for the Bulldogs.

In the seventh grade battle, the Medford team was in front 9 to 6 at the quarter and 18 to 9 at the half but saw its bulge narrowed to 22 to 21 as South had 12 to 6 scoring edge in the third quarter. The fact that 14 fouls were toted on the Bulldogs and only four on GP proved a handicap to the Medford team. Duchien had 11 points for the Trojans and Larry Stockman and Steve Edmonds each eight for McLoughlin.

"A lot of our trouble was their fault," Prospect mentor Duane Payne remarked in commenting on St. Mary's better work on the boards, its hustle and its defense.

The Medford team put itself in better charge with 15 points in the third quarter to 10 by the Cougars. This helped because the Crusaders managed just five points in the last stanza while Prospect picked up seven.

St. Mary's had quarter advantages of 19 to 13, 27 to 24 and 42 to 34. Lee Williams had 16 points for the Cougars while Bob Evans put in 15 for the Crusaders and Roger Hout and Dick Evans each 10.

Prospect won the junior varsity clash 39 to 38. Dave Rouhier had 17 points for St. Mary's and John Rogers 15 for the Cougars.

Talent — Butte Falls, with Ray Abbott scoring 24 points, rolled over the Talent Bulldogs in Jackson county B league basketball action on Friday. Final score was 51 to 34.
